House Bill 1442 - Government Efficiency Task Force

Senate Finance and Taxation Committee- Fort Totten Room 9:30 A.M. - Wednesday – March 5th, 2025

Chairman Weber, members of the Senate Finance and Taxation Committee, for the record I am Mark J. Hardy, PharmD, Executive Director of the North Dakota State Board of Pharmacy. I appreciate the opportunity to be here to speak to you today about House Bill 1442.

The Board of Pharmacy certainly supports the concept of this bill which creates a task force to examine state government entities for efficiencies to make a more effective government for our citizens. I am here to simply point out for the committee's consideration that we believe there is a duplication with this legislation specific only to licensing boards between this bill and Senate Bill 2308 which also creates a task force to examine efficiencies for licensing boards in the state. The task force in SB2308 would have representation from the legislature and is meant to explore very similar charges as those set forward in this legislation. I have included a copy of the current section of SB2308 relevant to this which passed the Senate.

As you know, licensing boards in the state oversee various professions. They do not receive general funds and are constrained to operate largely on licensing fees from those regulated. Those fee structures are set by the legislature in each board's practice act. They are typically run on very limited budgets with limited staff by those members appointed by the Governor.

Our office would request that the committee consider removing "Boards" from this legislation (page 2, lines 5 and 6) to remove the duplication that is likely to occur resulting in an inefficient use of state resources. We are certainly supportive of the broader goal of this bill. I appreciate your consideration and would be happy to answer any questions.

21	SECTION 10. A new section to chapter 54-07 of the North Dakota Century Code is created		
22	and enacted as follows:		
23	Boards review task force - Report to legislative management.		
24	<u>1. I</u>	Γhe	office of the governor shall provide staffing and administrative services to the
25	boards review task force. The task force shall:

1 In addition to the governor or the governor's designee, who shall serve as the 2 presiding officer of the task force, the task force must include: 3 A member of the senate, appointed by the senate majority leader. 4 <u>b.</u> A member of the house of representatives, appointed by the house of 5 representatives majority leader. 6 A representative of an organization representing cities, appointed by the <u>C.</u> 7 governor. 8 A representative of an organization representing counties, appointed by the d. 9 governor. 10 A representative of the business community, appointed by the governor. e. 11 f. A member of an occupational licensing board, appointed by the governor. 12 A member at large, appointed by the governor. 13 A member of the task force who is not a state employee is entitled to reimbursement <u>3.</u> 14 for mileage and expenses as provided by law for state officers and employees, to be 15 paid by the office of the governor. A state employee who is a member of the task force 16 is entitled to receive that employee's regular salary and is entitled to reimbursement 17 for mileage and expenses to be paid by the employing agency. A member of the task 18 force who is a member of the legislative assembly is entitled to receive per diem 19 compensation at the rate provided under section 54-35-10 for each day performing 20 official duties of the task force. The legislative council shall pay the per diem 21 compensation and reimbursement for travel and expenses as provided by law for any 22 member of the task force who is a member of the legislative assembly. 23 Before October 1, 2026, the task force shall provide a report of its findings and 24 recommendations and any proposed legislation necessary to implement the 25 recommendations to the legislative management. 26 SECTION 11. AMENDMENT. Section 54-54-05 of the North Dakota Century Code is 27 amended and reenacted as follows: 28 54-54-05. Duties of council. 29 The duties of the council are: 30 To stimulate and encourage throughout the state the study and presentation of the 31 performing and fine arts and public interest and participation therein.
