






For crimes other than Violent or Sex released on parole in 2024









Prison Population Truth-in-Sentencing

The average sentence length for Truth-In-Sentencing (TIS) has doubled from 8 years in 2014 to 16.56 years in 2023. The number of inmates having 85% TIS is about the same hovering around 300 which is 6% lower than the high of 318 in 2014.
