A Year Like No Other

Farmers know that success in agriculture requires the ability to adjust to circumstances beyond our control. Weather and shifting commodity markets are two major variables that farmers contend with daily.

In 2020, there was an additional variable that few of us could have anticipated. The COVID-19 outbreak has fundamentally changed how the world operates. Farmers, agribusinesses and farm organizations aren't immune from coronavirus effects. COVID-19 has become another major factor that requires adjustment and adaption.

For the North Dakota Soybean Council (NDSC), the new reality of a COVID-19 world has changed the means by which some of our business gets done, but the mission is still the same. Our board is committed to being innovative to expand partnerships, markets, and opportunities for the success of North Dakota soybean growers. In 2020, that work has meant the NDSC has had to think outside the box.

Despite the global pandemic, the NDSC and our checkoff programs continue working to deliver a return to North Dakota soybean farmers in real ways, even if many of our activities have transitioned.

Soybean exports are a vital part of our soybean markets. Ordinarily, trade teams from around the world would travel to North Dakota during the harvest season to gather insights on the volume and quality of the crop. This year, those activities occurred virtually.

NDSC participated in international trade shows that were also forced to move to a virtual platform. While nothing beats face-to-face conversations, the virtual trade shows opened the door for more companies from around the world to participate.

Statewide outreach and education efforts remain a hallmark of what NDSC does, and those events continued in 2020, just in different forms. We continued holding production meetings virtually, including the Getting it Right Seminars, the Best of the Best in Soybean and Wheat workshops, and other soybean production research and educational opportunities. Our annual Soybean Trading and Risk Management seminars went on as planned, just in a virtual format. Even the annual Midseason Market Outlook took place virtually, with attendance and participation far outpacing past years.

Production research is one of the most important efforts NDSC supports. The soybean

breeding program at NDSU is releasing early maturing Glyphosate resistant varieties, such as ND17009GT, with good disease resistance. This variety is a good fit for the northern areas of North Dakota at a low cost. NDSU's Soybean Cyst Nematode research is tracking the expansion of this pest and continues to provide management techniques to minimize yield losses through research funded by NDSC.

The NDSC-funded research for a soybean-based dust retardant has been patented and is in the final stages of commercialization. Through research, NDSC is committed to helping develop new products made from soybeans, creating another market for bushels each year.

We are all longing for the day when we, again, greet one another with handshakes, and can be face-to-face and in-person with our friends and customers around the world. You can trust the NDSC is steady in our commitment to finding new and innovative ways to leverage checkoff investments to better North Dakota's soybean farmers, no matter what changes await in 2021.




