North Dakota farmers invest in the future of the soybean industry through the soybean checkoff. For more than 30 years, the soybean checkoff has delivered the support necessary for the growth of the soybean industry. That investment has helped transform soybean production in North Dakota.

When the North Dakota Soybean Growers Association (NDSGA) was formed 40 years ago, soybeans were only being grown in about four counties in southeastern North Dakota. Early on, the NDSGA leaders recognized that, if soybeans were going to become a larger part of the state's agricultural portfolio, there needed to be a means to support research and market development. The soybean checkoff comes in to fill that need.

The North Dakota Soybean Council oversees the investment of checkoff funds into key areas, including research. By supporting research about breeding and improved production practices, soybeans can and have been grown in every North Dakota county. Checkoff supported efforts at North Dakota State University have resulted in the development of high yielding soybean

varieties that are adapted to the state's challenging conditions. Research has also helped farmers to better understand the disease and pest challenges that they face along with the production practices that help farmers achieve maximum yields.

As soybean productivity and production grow in North Dakota, so does the need for broader markets. The soybean checkoff supports efforts to build and to sustain the demand for soy products, both here at home and around the world. As a result of visionary investments, North Dakota maintains its place as one of the top soybean producing and exporting states in the nation.

Now, we're seeing the fruit of those previous checkoff investments with the expansion of soybean processing in the state. Those developments likely would not have happened without the previous investments which were made over the decades.

The soybean checkoff also supports outreach and educational efforts to help our friends and neighbors better understand agriculture in North Dakota.

The state's soybean industry has grown due to the vision of the farmer-leaders who made wise investments. The checkoff ensures that the soybean industry remains viable and pays dividends for years to come.


