

Other Sections in Bill

Appropriation - 2013-15 biennium - Section 3 added by the Senate provides a \$1 million appropriation from the general fund to the Attorney General for the remainder of the 2013-15 biennium for early hiring of FTE positions.

Continuing appropriations - Section 4 provides the Attorney General may retain the balance in the Attorney General refund fund on June 30, 2015, rather than transferring the balance to the general fund.

Exemption - Grants to law enforcement agencies - Section 5 added by the Senate provides an exemption from North Dakota Century Code Section 54-44.1-11 for funds appropriated by the 2013 Legislative Assembly for grants to law enforcement agencies for the 2013-15 biennium.

Oil-impact county law enforcement grants - Section 6 provides that \$20 million in grants from the oil and gas impact grant fund is for law enforcement agencies in oil-impacted counties where crime-related activities have increased or in other counties if the crime-related activities in oil-impacted counties originated in any of those other counties. The Senate modified this section to identify \$24,487,085 of the law enforcement grants line item from the oil and gas impact grant fund of which \$4,487,085 is designated for 19.5 new FTE positions and operating expenses, \$20 million is to provide grants to law enforcement agencies in oil-impacted counties, of which the Attorney General may use up to 10 percent for administration of the grants.

Exemption - Law enforcement grants - Section 7 added by the Senate provides an exemption from Section 54-44.1-11 for funding appropriated in the law enforcement grants line item for the 2015-17 biennium.

Amendment - Lottery operating fund - Section 8 added by the Senate amends Section 53-12.1-09 increasing the continuing appropriation from \$50,000 to \$100,000 each quarter to be deposited in the compulsive gambling prevention and treatment fund. This change results in a \$400,000 reduction to 2015-17 biennium general fund revenues.

Criminal justice data information sharing system - Section 9 added by the Senate creates a new section to Chapter 54-12 to transfer the criminal justice data information sharing system from the Information Technology Department to the Attorney General's office.

Salary of Attorney General - Section 10 provides for the statutory changes necessary to increase the Attorney General's salary. The Senate provided a 3 percent increase in compensation each year of the 2015-17 biennium. The Attorney General's annual salary will be \$152,436 effective July 1, 2015, and \$157,009 effective July 1, 2016.

Amendment - Tobacco settlement trust fund - Section 11 added by the Senate amends Section 54-27-25 relating to the tobacco settlement trust fund to allow an appropriation to the Attorney General for the purpose of enforcing the Master Settlement Agreement and any disputes with the agreement.

Repeal - Section 12 added by the Senate repeals Section 54-59-21 relating to the criminal justice data information sharing system within the Information Technology Department.

Continuing Appropriations

Assets forfeiture fund - Section 54-12-14 - To pay costs related to law enforcement activities of the Attorney General's office.

Lottery operating fund - Section 53-12.1-09 - To pay costs of operating the lottery.

Refund fund - Section 54-12-18 - To pay costs of the Consumer Protection and Antitrust Division and the Gaming Division.

Special operations team reimbursement fund - Section 54-12-23 - To reimburse city and county governments that provide special operations team services to rural areas.

Sobriety program fund - Section 54-12-29 - To pay costs of administering and operating the sobriety program.

Multijurisdictional drug task force fund - Section 54-12-26 - To provide support for the narcotics enforcement efforts of the state.

Deficiency Appropriation

The executive budget recommendation includes a deficiency appropriation of \$50,000 from the general fund in Senate Bill No. 2023 for prosecution witness fees.

Significant Audit Findings

The operational audit for the Attorney General's office conducted by the State Auditor's office during the 2013-14 interim identified no significant audit findings.

Major Related Legislation

Senate Bill No. 2107 - Creates Chapter 12.1-41 relating to the Uniform Act on Prevention of and Remedies for Human Trafficking, provides a penalty, and authorizes the Attorney General to grant or contract with service providers to develop or expand service programs for victims of human trafficking.

Senate Bill No. 2199 - Provides an appropriation of \$1 million to the Attorney General from the general fund to implement a human trafficking victim's treatment and support services pilot project during the 2015-17 biennium.

Senate Bill No. 2202 - Provides a continuing appropriation and amends Section 53-06.1-12 reducing the gaming tax on gross proceeds exceeding \$25,000 from 1 percent to .75 percent, creates the gaming regulation and enforcement fund, and changes the deposit of gaming taxes, monetary fines, and related interest and penalties collected to the gaming regulation and enforcement fund, of which 13 percent of total taxes, less refunds shall be deposited into the gaming tax allocation fund, reducing general fund revenue.

Senate Bill No. 2219 - Authorizes the Attorney General to establish the human trafficking commission to develop and coordinate a plan to provide human trafficking victims support services, collect and evaluate data on human trafficking, promote public awareness about human trafficking, and coordinate training on human trafficking prevention and victim services.

Senate Bill No. 2314 - Amends Section 53-06.1-10.1 regarding raffles is amended to allow licensed organizations that support amateur collegiate athletics to conduct a fifty-fifty raffle.

House Bill No. 1003 - Provides an appropriation of \$1,604,500 to the Attorney General from the general fund to provide legal services for the State Board of Higher Education and institutions and entities under the control of the board. The Attorney General is authorized 6 FTE positions to provide legal services to the State Board of Higher Education and institutions and entities under the control of the board.

House Bill No. 1053 - Excludes the Attorney General from required use of centralized desktop support services.
