**Item Description**

**FTE position changes** - The Legislative Assembly approved 23.50 FTE positions for the Department of Career and Technical Education (CTE) for the 2023-25 biennium, a decrease of 26.80 FTE positions from the 2021-23 biennium. The Legislative Assembly added 2 FTE program supervisor positions and transferred 28.80 FTE Center for Distance Education positions to its own separate state agency under the supervision of the Superintendent of Public Instruction pursuant to Senate Bill No. 2269 (2023).

**Targeted market equity** - The Legislative Assembly appropriated \$82.5 million, of which \$45.1 million is from the general fund, to OMB for a targeted market equity pool to be distributed to state agencies.

**New and vacant FTE funding pool** - The Legislative Assembly reduced \$543,726 of 2023-25 biennium appropriation authority for CTE for the new and vacant FTE funding pool, of which \$394,874 was for new FTE positions and \$148,852 was for estimated vacant salary savings. Of the total, \$524,832 was from the general fund and \$18,894 was from federal funds.

**One-time funding** - The Legislative Assembly appropriated one-time funding of \$98.3 million for CTE for the 2023-25 biennium, as follows:

**Status/Result**

The 28.80 FTE Center for Distance Education positions were transferred on July 1, 2023. Of the 2 FTE program supervisor positions, one individual started in August 2023 and another individual has been hired with an anticipated start date of June 2024.

The Department of Career and Technical Education received \$109,588 for targeted market equity increases, of which \$92,691 is from the general fund and \$16,897 is from federal funds. Equity increases were provided to 22 employees.

Through January 2024, CTE received \$181,838 from the new and vacant FTE funding pool to fill 1 new FTE position and had estimated vacant FTE position savings of \$134,742. The department used \$56,968 of the savings for other purposes, including accrued leave payouts, reclassifications, and temporary salary funding. The number of vacancies in the agency has ranged from 2 to 5 with an average monthly vacancy rate of 3.3 FTE positions.

The following is a summary of the status of CTE's one-time funding items:

**Workforce training grants** - In House Bill No. 1019, the Legislative Assembly appropriated \$2.5 million from the general fund to CTE for grants to the institutions of higher education assigned primary responsibility for workforce training in the state.

In Senate Bill No. 2122 (2023), the Legislative Assembly provided for a Legislative Management study of the workforce training center funding distribution model. The bill provided the study must include the funding distribution model, statewide integration and alignment across workforce training centers, and awarding college credit for workforce training center-offered training.

**Work-based learning coordinators** - In House Bill No. 1019, the Legislative Assembly appropriated \$1.5 million from the general fund to CTE for grants to schools for work-based learning coordinators to develop work-based learning opportunities for students. During the 2023 legislative session, it was estimated the appropriation would fund approximately

Through March 2024, CTE has distributed \$1.1 million of grants to four institutions of higher education. The department anticipates awarding the entire \$2.5 million appropriation by the end of the biennium and has allocated the funding as follows:

The Legislative Management assigned the workforce training center funding study to the Workforce Committee. The Department of Career and Technical Education has recommended changing the workforce training grant allocation from a covered employment calculation to an outcome-based calculation that includes 60 percent of appropriated funds being distributed equally to the four community colleges, 20 percent distributed based on training hours, and 20 percent based on unduplicated participants. The State Board for Career and Technical Education is in the process of developing a workforce training funding policy. Through March 2024, the Workforce Committee has not made any recommendations regarding the study.

Through March 2024, CTE has not spent any funding for grants to schools for work-based learning coordinators. The funding will be distributed to schools on a reimbursement basis at the end of each fiscal year. The department is allowing up to 50 percent of coordinator salaries to be paid with grant funds, rather than 100 percent, resulting in 15 coordinators being hired at schools and area career

8 coordinators across the state, primarily located at area career and technical centers.

**Statewide area career center initiative grant program** - During the 2021 regular legislative session, the Legislative Assembly created a statewide area career center initiative grant program in House Bill No. 1015 (2021) and appropriated \$70 million from the federal Coronavirus Capital Projects Fund.

During the November 2021 special legislative session, in House Bill No. 1505 (2021), the Legislative Assembly amended House Bill No. 1015 and adjusted the appropriation to **\$88,276,228 for a statewide area career center initiative grant program, of which \$68,276,228 is from the Coronavirus Capital Projects Fund and \$20,000,000 is from the federal State Fiscal Recovery Fund**. The department was required to establish the application process and develop eligibility requirements for the grant program.

During the 2023 regular legislative session, the Legislative Assembly in **House Bill No. 1199** provided a one-time appropriation of **\$68,276,228 from a Bank of North Dakota line of credit** to CTE for providing grants to entities approved by the State Board for Career and Technical Education during the 2021-23 biennium to build career academies through the statewide area and a career center initiative grant program through the 2023-25 biennium. The department is required to repay the line of credit from funds available from the Coronavirus Capital Projects Fund. Section 1 of the bill includes a one-time appropriation of **\$2,000,000 from the general fund** to the department for **paying accrued interest on the line of credit**. The Bank was required to provide the line of credit at the prevailing interest rate charged to North Dakota governmental entities. House Bill No. 1199 was declared an emergency measure.

Section 3 of House Bill No. 1199 provided the department an exemption to continue the \$68,276,228 appropriated from the Coronavirus Capital Projects Fund during the November 2021 special legislative session into the 2023-25 biennium. The section authorizes the department to provide the funding to foundations that are working with school districts on career academy projects approved by the State Board for Career and Technical Education.

In subsection 2 of Section 7 of House Bill No. 1543 (2023), the Legislative Assembly provided a one-time appropriation of **\$26.5 million from SIIF** to CTE for the purpose of defraying **inflationary costs of existing projects** approved under the statewide area career center initiative grant program during the 2021-23 biennium. The department is required to distribute the funding to existing career academy projects proportionally based on funding allocations provided to each project during the 2021-23 biennium. If funding approved in this subsection is provided for a career academy project and the funding becomes uncommitted during the 2023-25 biennium, the department may redistribute the funding for existing projects under the program during the

and technical centers. Grant funding may not be used for a position that is not performing work-based learning coordinator duties at least 50 percent of the position's time. The department anticipates spending the entire appropriation by the end of the 2023-25 biennium.

During the 2021-23 biennium, CTE received 17 project applications totaling \$117 million.

The State Board for Career and Technical Education awarded funding from the State Fiscal Recovery Fund in January 2022 and funding from the Coronavirus Capital Projects Fund in March 2022 to successful applicants. The entire \$88.3 million appropriated during the 2021-23 biennium was awarded for 13 projects as follows:

The department utilized the Bank of North Dakota line of credit beginning in March 2023. The United States Department of the Treasury approved North Dakota's state grant plan to utilize funding from the Coronavirus Capital Projects Fund for costs associated with career academies in June 2023. The funding was received in August 2023. The department used \$9,959,586 from the line of credit, which was repaid in August 2023. The department spent \$165,547 from the general fund for interest on the line of credit, of which \$71,709 was paid during the 2021-23 biennium and \$93,838 was paid during the 2023-25 biennium. Through March 2024, CTE has distributed \$38.3 million of the \$68.3 million from the Coronavirus Capital Projects Fund to the career academy projects.

Through March 2024, CTE has distributed \$9 million of the \$26.5 million from SIIF for inflationary costs.

In March 2024, the Treasury approved North Dakota's state grant plan amendment to allow funding from the Coronavirus Capital Projects Fund be used for career academies rather than broadband infrastructure grants. The amount

2023-25 biennium. The department is required to report to the Legislative Management during the 2023-24 interim and to the Appropriations Committees of the 69<sup>th</sup> Legislative Assembly regarding the amount of inflationary funding provided for each project and the construction status of each project.

In Section 4 of House Bill No. 1019, the Legislative Assembly provided CTE an exemption to continue the \$20 million appropriated from the State Fiscal Recovery Fund during the November 2021 special legislative session for the statewide career center initiative grant program into the 2023-25 biennium.

In Section 5 of House Bill No. 1019, the Legislative Assembly provided an exemption to allow CTE to redistribute the \$68,276,228 appropriated from the Coronavirus Capital Projects Fund and the \$20,000,000 appropriated from the State Fiscal Recovery Fund during the November 2021 special legislative session for existing projects under the program if any of the funding becomes uncommitted after December 31, 2022.

Section 10 of House Bill No. 1021 (2023) requires OMB to **transfer any uncommitted Coronavirus Capital Projects Fund appropriation authority from the Information Technology Department for broadband infrastructure grants to CTE for career academy inflationary costs** during the 2023-25 biennium. The funding may only be spent by CTE if the federal government approves a state plan amendment on the planned use of money in the fund. If the state plan amendment is not approved, OMB shall transfer the uncommitted funding to ITD for broadband infrastructure grants. The Department of Career and Technical Education is required to report to the Legislative Management on the use of this funding and OMB is required to report to the Legislative Management regarding appropriation authority transferred pursuant to this section. Section 12 declares Section 10 to be an emergency measure.

transferred to CTE was \$6,319,473. Through March 2024, CTE has not distributed the repurposed funding.

Funding awarded by CTE from SIIF and repurposed Coronavirus Capital Projects Fund authority for inflationary costs of the 13 career academy projects is as follows:
