DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES

The Department of Human Services (DHS) merged with the State Department of Health in September 2022 to create the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) pursuant to the provisions of House Bill No. 1247 (2021). The Department of Health and Human Services administers several programs that aid individuals. The department provides in-person services through eight regional human service centers, the State Hospital, and the Life Skills and Transition Center (LSTC).

For the 2025-27 biennium, the DHHS budget is proposed to be comprised of the following five budget subdivisions:

MEDICAID PROGRAM

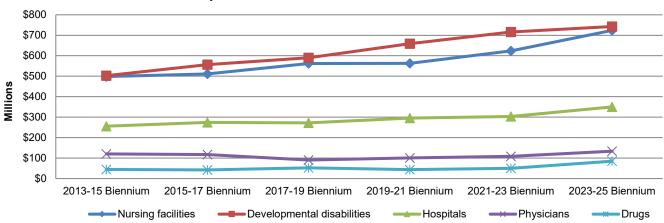
The Medicaid program provides health coverage to qualifying individuals, including families and children with low incomes, older adults, and people with disabilities. During state fiscal year 2023, over 130,000 North Dakotans received assistance through either the traditional Medicaid program, Medicaid Expansion program, or CHIP.

Federal Medical Assistance Percentage

The federal medical assistance percentage (FMAP) is the rate used to determine matching funds required by states for the Medicaid program. The federal medical assistance percentage is determined by comparing each state's 3-year average per capita income to the national 3-year average per capita income. The minimum FMAP a state may receive is 50 percent. For federal fiscal year 2025 (October 2024 through September 2025), North Dakota's FMAP rate is 50.97 percent. Certain medical assistance programs, including the Medicaid Expansion program and CHIP, use an enhanced FMAP rate which is 90 percent for the Medicaid Expansion program and 65.68 percent for CHIP for fiscal year 2025.

Major Medicaid Costs

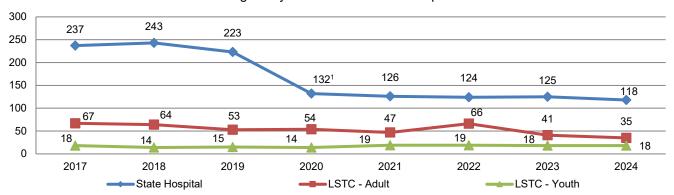
The chart below summarizes major Medicaid costs since the 2013-15 biennium.



STATE HOSPITAL AND LIFE SKILLS AND TRANSITION CENTER

The Department of Health and Human Services operates the State Hospital in Jamestown and LSTC in Grafton. The State Hospital provides inpatient mental health and addiction treatment services. The Life Skills and Transition Center provides residential and other services to individuals with an intellectual disability.

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COUNTY SOCIAL AND HUMAN SERVICES PROJECT

Senate Bill No. 2124 (2019) provided for the delivery of social services from human service zones rather than counties. The bill authorized the transfer of 140 employees from counties to DHS. The human service zones' local offices in the counties (*formerly known as county social service offices*) assist individuals in need of services and supports under the supplemental nutrition assistance program, temporary assistance for needy families, heating assistance, Medicaid, including children's health services; 1915i home- and community-based services; basic care assistance; child care assistance; child welfare (foster care, child protection services); and other local resources and programs.

The county social and human service project provides for state funding to be distributed to human service zones for the delivery of human services programs previously paid through county property tax levies. The schedule below provides the funding for the 2023-25 biennium.
