

The North Dakota Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation (DOCR) maximum operational capacity for males is 1624. The female operational capacity increased from 224 to 262 on October 1, 2023, when a female treatment and recovery unit opened. The operational capacity for men and women includes the North Dakota State Penitentiary, James River Correctional Center, Missouri River Correctional Center, Heart River Correctional Center, Dakota Women's Correctional and Rehabilitation Center (DWCR), contractual treatment, transitional/community housing facilities, and contract beds in county and regional correctional facilities. When the average daily inmate population, specific to gender, for a discrete month exceeds the maximum operational capacity, the DOCR will implement the inmate admission prioritization plan the following month. The daily inmate population has exceeded operational capacity for the men since July 2023, however the DOCR has not implemented the inmate admission prioritization plan. Factors outside of agency control will continue to be the main determinate of DOCR prison population levels.

Month End Count & Operational Capacity





The DOCR provides a weekly DOCR prison population report to sheriffs, correctional facility administrators, States Attorney Association, and other interested parties. In addition, when admission prioritization is in effect, admission approval reports are provided to sheriffs and correctional facility administrators on weekly basis. This report specifically identifies the person approved for admission to DOCR custody.

Prioritization was implemented for female admissions beginning March 2023 until the maximum operation capacity was recalculated on October 1, 2023. As a result of the increased operational capacity and implementing a strategic approach of admitting the remaining deferred status women into DWCR, the DOCR exited the inmate admission prioritization plan in March 2024.


The DOCR continues to take action to mitigate population levels. Many of North Dakota's local county jails and correctional facilities are at or near their maximum operational capacities. Recruitment and retention of correctional officers is a major concern across the state worsening the situation for finding available space with our county partners. To avoid implementing prioritization and creating additional

capacity issues for our local corrections centers, we have partnered with McKenzie County Correctional Center to house approximately 50 male and 5 female residents. Due to continued population growth in 2024, we have also partnered with Heart of America Correctional and Treatment Center in Rugby, ND to house approximately 20 male residents as a second unit to meet the correctional demands on the DOCR. This decision has kept the male and female population out of prioritization keeping DOCR facility bed availability to the counties for those sentenced to the DOCR. This is a temporary solution to a rapidly growing issue.




We have spent the past several months trying to determine what has changed since 2020 attributing to the population differences.

Admissions have outpaced releases four of the past five years with the exception of 2020 when we were responding to COVID. This was not the case in the previous five years where releases outpaced admissions.



The average length of stay for controlling sentences has increased to over three years for the first time in a decade.


Average Court Imposed Sentence Length


While over 85% of new admissions over the past decade have court-imposed sentences of 5 years or less, that percentage is declining. New Admissions with court-imposed sentences of 5 years or more has increased 20%, from nearly 12% to 14.2% over the decade.

Most new admissions have sentences less than 5 years, but the percentage with 5 years or more has increased by 20% over the last decade from 11.9% to 14.2%.

ND DOCR Percentage of New Admissions with Court Ordered Sentences of 5 Years of More




The average sentence length for Truth-In-Sentencing (TIS) has doubled from 8 years in 2014 to 16.56 years in 2023. The number of inmates having 85% TIS is about the same hovering around 300 which is 6% lower than the high of 318 in 2014.

85% Truth-in-Sentencing Residents as of 12/31


Average Sentence Length

*The percentage change in 2020 was due to COVID and the population reduction plan to keep residents and team members safe inside our prisons.

Over the last decade, non-sexual violent offenders are the only group to see an increased percentage in admissions from 21.4% in 2014 to 33.8% in 2023.

The DOCR continues to compensate the counties as required by NDCC for all DOCR sentenced individuals that are being held in local correctional centers. The fiscal impact of the quick and unexpected growth of DOCR incarceration is having a significant impact on the DOCR's budget. We are projecting being deficient before the end of the current biennium. We anticipate the incarceration rates in North Dakota will continue to rise based on current trends and will be asking for a significant increase in our 2025-2027 budget to cover the cost associated with overflow housing in county jails due to exceeding our operational budget capacity.

We would like to express our gratitude to our local correctional partners for assisting the DOCR by partnering and providing reentry opportunities for individuals, cooperating during prioritization, and providing additional beds for overflow due to current population counts.
