Budget Basics



Historically, before serving on the appropriations committees, legislators would serve on policy committees to gain valuable experience. With term limits becoming effective, there will be less time for legislators to develop a deep understanding of policy and the budgeting process. Legislative leadership and the Legislative Council implemented two measures during the 2023-24 interim to assist legislators with the learning process, particularly with gaining a more thorough understanding of the state budget and preparing for the 2025 legislative session.

The Legislative Council produced a series of 10 <u>Budget Basics</u> publications. The first edition of the series provided an overview of the state budget and the budgeting process. Subsequent editions provided overviews and summaries of general fund revenues, oil and gas tax revenues and allocations, appropriations, and

sources and uses of funds. After presenting background information, the Budget Basics focused on six of the largest state agency budgets--the Department of Public Instruction, the University System, the Department of Health and Human Services, the Information Technology Department, the Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation, and the Department of Transportation.

The second initiative was expanding the work of the Budget Section to include appropriation division meetings after each Budget Section meeting. The division meetings included members from each of the appropriations standing committee divisions from the last legislative session. In addition, legislative leaders from each chamber met as a leadership division. The division meetings focused on receiving background information, including information on the purpose of funding included in agency base budgets, and updates regarding major budget areas. This preliminary work helped legislators be better prepared for the demands of addressing budgets during the 2025 legislative session. The Legislative Council remains committed to finding methods to provide legislators with the information and data needed to perform their constitutional duty of appropriating money for the operations of state government.
