Water Topics Overview Committee

The Water Topics Overview Committee held its first meeting on September 18. The committee is charged with several statutory duties, including holding any necessary discussions with adjacent states on water topics and receiving and reviewing any request anticipated to be submitted to the State Water Commission or to the next Legislative Assembly for which the state cost-share is estimated to be \$10 million or more.


The committee received testimony on the mission, vision, values, functions, and responsibilities of the Water Resources Department; an overview of the state-owned water projects and estimated completion dates of these projects; the department's budgeting and cash management strategy; and the department's internal studies relating to the project cost-share policies and future management of state-owned projects.

The committee is required to study the feasibility and desirability of assigning management authority for the waters of the state to the area located in the naturally occurring watershed, rather than assigning management authority based on political subdivision boundaries. The Department of Water Resources provided information about how the state currently manages water and identified other states managing water on a watershed basis.

The committee also is required to study funding for stormwater projects in the state, including current funding sources, and the feasibility and desirability of establishing a wastewater project fund to provide grants for upgrading, constructing, or replacing wastewater infrastructure. The committee received background information regarding the roles of the legacy infrastructure loan fund, the clean water state revolving loan fund, and the drinking water state revolving loan fund in providing funding for wastewater and stormwater projects in the state. The State Water Commission provided testimony relating to the instances when the State Water Commission or the Department of Water Resources conducts an economic analysis on water projects in the state. The next committee meeting is tentatively planned for mid-December.
