# Testimony by Jennifer Greuel, NDANO Executive Director Senate Political Subdivisions Committee In Support of SB 2138 January 21, 2021

Chairman Burckhard and members of the Committee, my name is Jennifer Greuel, and I am the executive director of the North Dakota Association of Nonprofit Organizations (NDANO). I am here to express support for SB 2138.

NDANO is the statewide membership association for the North Dakota nonprofit sector. Our members work in all mission areas, from human services and the environment to education and the arts, and represent all sizes, from small volunteer-run nonprofits to multi-million-dollar organizations, in all corners of the state. NDANO educates, advocates and connects to strengthen nonprofits.

When the pandemic hit in March, many nonprofits were faced with immediately needing to reschedule their annual meetings, which are required in statute to be held to maintain nonprofit status, or to change processes and hold the meeting remotely. However, many nonprofits encountered a statutory obstacle that does not allow organizations' annual meetings to be held remotely without a change to their bylaws, hindering their ability to conduct business as usual. Depending on the process each organization has chosen to amend bylaws, this can be a difficult undertaking. Some organizations may be unaware of the language in statute about remote annual meetings, and may be unknowingly not following Century Code. This wordage change would allow for annual meetings to be held by remote means and allow nonprofits to continue efficiently serving the state.

In addition, I serve on the governing boards of several nonprofit organizations including the Theodore Roosevelt Presidential Library Foundation.

Many Lutheran congregations in North Dakota were established a century ago, and many of the remaining congregations have not amended or updated their articles of incorporation for decades (if ever).

Also, all ELCA Lutheran congregations are governed by a constitution and bylaws. The ELCA was established in 1988 when several Lutheran denominations merged into the current organizational structure. Again, many congregations have not amended or updated their constitutions and bylaws in recent years (and some congregations have not updated the governing documents since 1988).

Section 10-33-75 presents a serious problem for many church organizations and other nonprofit corporations. During this pandemic, many nonprofit organizations are unable to safely or legally conduct in-person meetings of the members to amend the articles of incorporation or bylaws to allow membership meetings by means of remote communication.

This bill, if enacted, would solve the problem. It would allow a nonprofit organization to conduct membership meetings by remote communication UNLESS prohibited by the organization's articles of incorporation or bylaws (or, for Lutheran churches, their constitution).

Accordingly, I urge this committee to vote a "do pass" recommendation for the bill.

Many Lutheran congregations in North Dakota were established a century ago, and many of the remaining congregations have not amended or updated their articles of incorporation for decades (if ever).

Also, all ELCA Lutheran congregations are governed by a constitution and bylaws. The ELCA was established in 1988 when several Lutheran denominations merged into the current organizational structure. Again, many congregations have not amended or updated their constitutions and bylaws in recent years (and some congregations have not updated the governing documents since 1988).

Section 10-33-75 presents a challenge for many church organizations and other nonprofit corporations. During this pandemic, many nonprofit organizations have been unable to safely or legally conduct in-person meetings of the members to amend the articles of incorporation or bylaws to allow membership meetings by means of remote communication.

This bill, if enacted, would solve the problem. It would allow a nonprofit organization to conduct membership meetings by remote communication UNLESS prohibited by the organization's articles of incorporation or bylaws (or, for Lutheran churches, their constitution).

This bill, if enacted, would also allow greater member participation in annual meetings of nonprofit organizations. For example, this year, even though I could not attend in person, I participated in two nonprofit organization annual meetings by remote communication.

Accordingly, I urge this committee to vote a "do pass" recommendation for the bill.
