Selected Bill Sections Recommended in the Executive Budget

Highway tax distribution fund - Section 3 would provide for \$11,989,604 of special funds from the highway tax distribution fund to be used for Highway Patrol operations.

Motor carrier electronic permit fund - Section 4 would provide for \$1,448,955 of special funds from the motor carrier electronic permit fund to be used for Highway Patrol operations.

Highway Patrol officer per diem - Section 5 would provide for Highway Patrol officer per diem of \$200 per month during the 2023-25 biennium, the same as provided during the 2021-23 biennium. The per diem payments are in lieu of reimbursement for meals and other expenses while in travel status within the state.

Continuing Appropriations

Highway Patrol assets forfeiture fund - North Dakota Century Code Section 39-03-18 - Consists of funds obtained from seized assets that may be used for paying expenses associated with the inventory and selling of seized assets, to pay for overtime relating to certain investigations, for purchasing equipment related to criminal interdiction, or to be used to match federal funding for certain programs.

Motor carrier electronic permit transaction fund - Section 39-12-02 - An additional fee of up to \$15 is charged for issuing an oversize or overweight vehicle permit electronically. The additional fee is deposited in the motor carrier electronic permit fund and deposits in the fund are appropriated on a continuing basis to the Highway Patrol for the maintenance of the online electronic permitting system.

Deficiency Appropriations

No deficiency appropriations are being requested for the Highway Patrol.

Significant Audit Findings

There are no significant audit findings for the Highway Patrol.



The funds provided in this section, or so much of the funds as may be necessary, are appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, and from special funds derived from federal funds and other income, to the highway patrol for the purpose of defraying the expenses of the highway patrol, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2023 and ending June 30, 2025, as follows:

The 2023-25 one-time funding amounts are not a part of the entity's base budget for the 2025-27 biennium. The highway patrol shall report to the appropriations committees of the sixty-ninth legislative assembly on the use of this one-time funding for the biennium beginning July 1, 2023 and ending June 30, 2025.

SECTION 3. SPECIAL FUNDS TRANSFER – HIGHWAY TAX DISTRIBUTION FUND. The estimated income line item in section 1 of this Act includes the sum of \$11,989,604, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, from the state highway tax distribution fund which may be transferred at the direction of the superintendent of the highway patrol for the purpose of defraying the expenses of the highway patrol during the biennium beginning July 1, 2023 and ending June 30, 2025.

SECTION 4. MOTOR CARRIER ELECTRONIC PERMIT TRANSACTION FUND. The estimated income line item in section 1 of this Act includes \$1,448,955 from the motor carrier electronic permit transaction fund for the purpose of defraying various expenses associated with the issuance of permits and other nonenforcement motor carrier and administrative activities.

SECTION 5. PAYMENTS TO HIGHWAY PATROL OFFICERS. Each patrol officer of the state highway patrol is entitled to receive from funds appropriated in section 1 of this Act an amount not to exceed \$200 per month for the biennium beginning July 1, 2023 and ending June 30, 2025. The payments are in lieu of reimbursement for meals and other expenses, except lodging, while in travel status within the state of North Dakota or while at their respective home stations. The amounts must be paid at the time and in the same manner as salaries are paid to members of the highway patrol and may be paid without the presentation of receipts or other memorandums.

Motor carrier electronic permit fund - Section 4 provides for \$1,648,955 of special funds from the motor carrier electronic permit fund to be used for Highway Patrol operations.

Highway Patrolmen's retirement fund transfer - Section 5 transfers \$2 million from the motor carrier electronic permit fund to the Highway Patrolmen's retirement fund.

Highway Patrol officer per diem - Section 6 provides for Highway Patrol officer per diem of \$200 per month during the 2023-25 biennium, the same as provided during the 2021-23 biennium. The per diem payments are in lieu of reimbursement for meals and other expenses while in travel status within the state.

Continuing Appropriations

Highway Patrol assets forfeiture fund - North Dakota Century Code Section 39-03-18 - Consists of funds obtained from seized assets that may be used for paying expenses associated with the inventory and selling of seized assets, to pay for overtime relating to certain investigations, for purchasing equipment related to criminal interdiction, or to be used to match federal funding for certain programs.

Motor carrier electronic permit transaction fund - Section 39-12-02 - An additional fee of up to \$15 is charged for issuing an oversize or overweight vehicle permit electronically. The additional fee is deposited in the motor carrier electronic permit fund and deposits in the fund are appropriated on a continuing basis to the Highway Patrol for the maintenance of the online electronic permitting system.

Deficiency Appropriations

There are no deficiency appropriations for this agency.



Colonel Brandon Solberg, Superintendent

Introduction

Good afternoon, Mr. Chairman and members of the House Government Operations Division. My name is Brandon Solberg, and I proudly serve as the superintendent of the North Dakota Highway Patrol.

The North Dakota Highway Patrol was founded in 1935, and the agency's primary statutory authority and responsibility comes from North Dakota Century Code Chapter 39-03. The highway patrol is comprised of two major components: field operations and administration. Field operations consists of four geographical regions and motor carrier operations. Administration consists of the administrative services division, the support services division, and finance.

Our emphasis as an agency has been on public safety through education and enforcement activities. Educating motorists to make the right decision is preferred over having to take enforcement action but enforcing traffic and criminal laws remains our primary function. Educating the public and trying to prevent crashes and traffic violations from ever occurring is a continual cycle. Every day that the department of transportation is open, a batch of new drivers hits the road. If troopers are called to a crash or make a traffic stop, then it's too late – a violation already occurred – so we continue to explore ways to dedicate more time and energy to prevention efforts.

The highway patrol's primary focus is traffic safety, and there continues to be three major contributing factors to serious injury and fatality crashes. Those are speeding, not wearing a seatbelt, and driving impaired. If we could eliminate those three violations, we'd save a lot of lives. Speeding alone is a contributing factor in approximately ¼ of all fatality crashes, but it's such a common violation that many don't recognize the true danger of it. Distracted driving continues to be an issue as well, but it's a more difficult violation to identify, especially after a crash occurs.

The highway patrol fully supports the Vision Zero initiative because reducing crashes and unnecessary injuries and deaths on our roadways has been the agency's goal since 1935. In addition to traffic safety, the highway patrol assists local law enforcement agencies with emergencies and calls for service, especially when resources are limited. Many law enforcement agencies in North Dakota are smaller, and peace officers work together and help each other out regardless of the color of their uniform.

North Dakota has the opportunity to become the safest state in the nation. Most of us who reside here feel safe in our communities, and it's one of the reasons people choose to live in North Dakota. Maintaining a sense of safety wouldn't be possible without solid partnerships between federal, state, tribal, and local law enforcement agencies, and the highway patrol is grateful for all the first responders and dispatchers who work toward a common goal of providing public safety.

The highway patrol's mission is to make a difference every day by providing high quality law enforcement services to keep North Dakota safe and secure. If you were to ask our employees for one word that summarizes the agency, many of them would say professionalism. Our past and present employees are respected in their communities, and we are fortunate to have strong public support. We're committed to enhancing that public trust by being transparent and continually searching for opportunities to strengthen our relationships with stakeholders even further.

The citizens of North Dakota count on our employees to be responsive and proactive. Our employees enforce traffic laws, investigate crashes, provide safety presentations, help stranded motorists, and assist other agencies and community members during times of crisis. Our employees take pride in performing their duties and serving the citizens of this great state. Our officers are proud to wear the uniform of a North Dakota state trooper, and I appreciate the courage and commitment displayed by our entire team.

Current Biennium Accomplishments

- Signed law enforcement mutual aid agreements with MHA and Spirit Lake Nations to clear up jurisdictional complexities
- Implemented an unmanned aerial vehicle program with UAVs available statewide for crash investigation and search & rescue operations
- The NDHP, DOT, DES, and Parks & Rec received the Roaming Bison Award for a combined response to the historic spring storm in April of 2022
- Received 11th accreditation award from the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies – accredited since 1989

State troopers cover approximately 80% of all serious injury and fatality crashes and approximately 20% of all other crashes.

Audit Findings

Finding 2020-01

Condition: Terminated Employees Could Bypass Capitol Security

Recommendation:

- Perform monitoring procedures by routinely reconciling terminated employees to access within systems that control building security and disable access for terminated employees; or,
- Coordinate with human resource agencies to automate, if possible, building access for employees according to employment status.

Highway Patrol Response/Corrective Action Plan

Response:

We agree with the finding. Agencies are currently directed under OMB Policy 108 to collect cards upon termination (end of employment). We do not have reason to believe that this isn't consistently being done. The NDHP will, however, clarify communications to agencies ensuring they notify NDHP Security to deactivate the ID card access of terminated employees in a timely manner. We will enhance our current internal control process by collaborating with OMB to explore possibilities within personnel records to build a better method of reconciling ID card access based on current employment status.

Corrective Action:

- Update the human resource process and communicate to agencies that use key access on the capitol complex. ServiceNow is the required method for agencies to notify the NDHP within 10 days (or sooner) of termination of employment.
- The NDHP will utilize OMB employment status records to reconcile requests as a failsafe measure.
- NDIT has a request for Security Expert software in their budget to enhance the current software package used for the electronic card access system.

Finding 2020-02

Condition: Contractors Could Bypass Capitol Security

Recommendation:

- Consistently limit or automate expiration of building access for one year or less for non-employees and require agencies to renew access requests annually.
- Provide guidance to agencies to limit contractor access to contract needs for routine access with a maximum of the contracted period of services.
- Implement a required field on the Access Card Authorization Request form be used to identify when contractor access is to be revoked.

Highway Patrol Response/Corrective Action Plan

Response:

We agree with the finding. The NDHP agrees to implement procedures to terminate access for individuals working under a specific contract in conjunction with the contract end date. We will also seek a process to ensure regular validation of employees of companies who are not under a state contract and currently doing regular business at the Capitol (ie. USPS, Fed-Ex, UPS).

Following the issuance of the final audit report, the NDHP will form an internal audit review committee to address each issue, identify possible solutions, and implement an action plan.

Corrective Action:

- Requests for contractor access through ServiceNow require an expiration date and state contract number to be added when requesting key access.
 Agencies are required to collect the card at the expiration date or end of the contract work period and notify the highway patrol to deactivate access.
- Contractor cards expire after one year unless the contract period is shorter in duration.
- NDIT has a request for Security Expert software in their budget to enhance the current software package used for the electronic card access system.

Additional Appropriation Considerations

Currently, the highway patrol has three sections listed in our appropriations bill that we'd ask for your consideration to carry over into next biennium. The first is a transfer of highway tax distribution funds totaling approximately 14% of our appropriation. A transfer of \$9,346,781 in highway tax distribution funds was included in the executive budget.

The second section is related to a transfer of special funds from the motor carrier electronic permit transaction fund. This fund has been used to cover expenses related to the online permits system in addition to expenses for permits office staff, field administrative assistants and crash assistance program members. The requested amount from the permits fund would be \$1,724,244. This amount was included in the executive budget.

The third section is related to an unvouchered expense of \$200 per month that is provided to sworn officers in lieu of processing individual reimbursement requests for expenses such as meals and lodging while officers are traveling in-state. This expense has been authorized for decades, and the current level of \$200 has been in place since the 2009 legislative session. This amount was included in the executive budget.

Additional considerations include the following base budget limit adjustments that were factored into the executive budget recommendation:

- NDIT rate increases \$173,840
- Cost to continue salaries \$358,926
- 2023-25 PERS employer contributions \$260,520
 - Two 0.5% employer increases on January 1 of 2024 and 2025
- \$8,100,000 to replace coronavirus relief funding during the 2021-23 biennium for sworn officer salaries
 - \$6,966,000 in general funds
 - \$1,134,000 in special funds

The highway patrol is also requesting consideration for the following budget submission corrections due to our error:

- One-time equipment costs for 10 of the sworn officer positions included in the executive budget were inadvertently omitted
 - o Only five sworn officers were funded appropriately for one-time costs
 - \$53,000/officer = \$530,000 total
 - \$369,198 general; \$100,700 federal; \$60,102 special funds (one-time)
- Two of the criminal interdiction team members are supervisors
 - Inadvertently entered at trooper salary level
 - Additional biennial sergeant salary = \$58,915 each or \$117,830 total
 - \$101,344 general; \$16,496 special (*ongoing*)
- Unvouchered expenses were inadvertently left out
 - \$200/month/officer is the current rate

- 13 new non-supervisory positions = \$62,400 total
- \$53,412 general; \$8,988 special (ongoing)
- Total requested correction: \$710,230
 - General funds \$523,944
 - Special funds \$100,700
 - Federal funds \$85,586





 - Factoring upcoming rate increases, the highway patrol fund is still 16% below the "actuarially required rate" for contributions.
 - The funded ratio is currently around 70% and is projected to be around 40% by the year 2062.
 - Several options have been discussed including a one-time infusion and vacancy fund transfers.





Highway Patrol PERS Plan

The highway patrol plan is not unique in the PERS system. Currently, PERS oversees the following plans:

- Main
- Judicial
- Job Service
- Public Safety (Peace Officers, Firefighters, National Guard Security Officers)
- State Law Enforcement (Bureau of Criminal Investigation)
- Highway Patrol

PERS service credits may also be earned in the North Dakota Teacher's Fund for Retirement and the Teachers Insurance and Annuity Association.

Multiplier

There are other multipliers in place such as the judicial retirement plan which is 3.5% for the first 10 years, 2.8% for the second years, then 1.25% for any years over 20.

During this legislative session, BCI is requesting a multiplier increase for their plan from 1.75% to 3% for the first 25 years then 1.75% thereafter (HB 1309) while remaining in the social security system.

Social Security Credit

Of all the plans under PERS, the highway patrol is the only plan in which members do not participate in social security. NDCC 39-03.1-27 covers the legislative intent of the highway patrol plan and states, "...because of the increase in state contributions... the members of such system shall not obligate the state to additional payments for federal social security benefits..."

Not participating in social security results in a combined 12.4% contribution savings (6.2% for the employer and 6.2% for the employee). The downside is that highway patrol members do not earn any social security credit and will not get the benefits of social security's annual cost of living adjustments. For example, social security benefits increased 8.7% in 2023 and 5.9% in 2022.

The highway patrol plan has no cost-of-living adjustment, and that's the number one issue expressed by retirees who are drawing from the system. Past and present employees acknowledge that the highway patrol retirement plan is excellent, but it doesn't take long for benefit levels in retirement to be impacted by inflation.

Highway Patrol Fund Status

The highway patrol's PERS fund is projected to become insolvent based on the most recent actuarial report from October of 2022. The funded ratio is currently around 70% and is projected to be around 40% in 40 years.

The highway patrol fund experienced a contribution rate increase during the 2021 legislative session which was 0.5% employee and employer increases on January 1 of 2022 through 2025 for a total of 4%. The highway patrol is requesting \$390,142 in ongoing funds to cover the employer increases which means that employees have "skin in the game" with a similar increase.

Even after factoring those increases, the most recent actuarial report indicated the fund is 16% below the "actuarially required rate" for monthly contributions.

Proposed Recommendations

There are several options to consider to get the highway patrol plan back on a path to solvency.

- A cash infusion which would match a strategy for the main plan.
 - A potential source to explore is the motor carrier electronic permit fund with a projected ending balance of \$7.6 million this biennium.
- Authorization to transfer appropriated employer contributions for all sworn officers including vacant positions.
 - o Historical vacancy rate: 5-6 troopers/month
- An employer contribution increase which would match a strategy for the public safety plan as authorized by the PERS Board.

By January of 2025, sworn officers working for the highway patrol will be contributing over 11% of their monthly pay into the PERS plan.

Ongoing Appropriation Expenses:

- In the 2017-19 biennium, the NDHP was given ongoing appropriation to utilize the fund for permit staff salaries and administrative assistant salaries.
- In the 2019-21 biennium, the NDHP was given ongoing appropriation to utilize the fund for the purchase of body armor, taser cartridges, and AED pad replacements (\$163,066).
- In the 2021-23 biennium, the NDHP was given ongoing appropriation to convert two administrative assistant and one permit technician positions to one records management and two crash assistant program positions.
- In the 2021-23 biennium, the NDHP was given ongoing appropriation of \$19,550 for the state share of CVIEW maintenance costs.

One-Time Expenses:

- In the 2019-21 biennium, the NDHP was given one-time appropriation for the construction of a classroom addition onto the indoor range facility (\$1,729,100).
- In the 2019-21 biennium, the NDHP was given one time appropriation for the purchase of UAV's (\$96,000).

- In the 2021-23 biennium, the NDHP was given one time appropriation for the purchase of new hard body armor which is on a 5-year replacement cycle (\$265,000).
- In the 2021-23 biennium, the NDHP was given one time funding for body and in-car video cameras (\$1,158,000).

Sworn Officer Priority List

Twenty-seven sworn officers were requested by the highway patrol. These were all specialized positions rather than traffic enforcement positions, but some of the specialized roles would free up time for traffic troopers.

The sworn officers were requested based on the following priorities:

- 1. Backfill the five-member criminal interdiction team created in 2021
- 2. Two officers to enhance security/protection duties and investigate threats
- 3. Five officers for the criminal interdiction team to cover the NW/NE regions
- 4. Two officers to enhance high-risk training for all peace officers statewide
- 5. One officer to conduct criminal investigations on state property
- 6. Two size and weight enforcement officers to increase from six to eight total
- 7. One planning officer for strategic planning, tech research, and visioning
- 8. One dedicated recruiter to build relationships and locate quality candidates
- 9. Two safety and education officers for community outreach statewide
- 10. One additional officer dedicated to crash analysis and reconstruction
- 11. One statewide coordinator for DRE and field sobriety testing programs
- 12. Four additional Motor Carrier Safety Assistance Program (MCSAP) officers

Fifteen (15) officers were approved in the executive budget recommendation:


- Ten (10) officers for the criminal interdiction team (5 backfill, 5 new)
- Two (2) officers for security and protection
- One (1) statewide DRE/SFST coordinator (100% NHTSA funded)
- Two (2) MCSAP officers (95% federal and 5% state for eligible expenses)

If two additional MCSAP officers were approved, they would likely be stationed in Williston and Bismarck.

Use of Force and Pursuit Incidents

The highway patrol noticed an increase in use of force and pursuit incidents in 2020 and numbers have gradually started to come back down.


If a trooper codes an incident as a use of force, it indicates that the officer had to use a higher level of force such as a takedown, a knee strike, or a Taser to take a violent or resistive subject into custody.



High-Speed Violations

The highway patrol noticed an increase in high-speed violations in 2020 as well. High speeds and fleeing vehicles were common issues among many states.

The highest speed cited by the highway patrol in 2022 was 150 mph on Highway 46.



Highway Patrol Vehicle Types

The highway patrol owns 14 vehicles that are used for pursuit intervention technique training at the driving pad.

The highway patrol leases 175 vehicles from DOT fleet services:

- 85 Ford Police Interceptor Utility
- 54 Chevrolet Tahoe
- 26 Ford F-250
- 10 Dodge Charger

State Fleet Insurance

All state fleet services vehicles (including NDHP vehicles) are covered for liability under the North Dakota Risk Management fund. Previous commentary discussed the North Dakota Insurance Reserve Fund (NDIRF) which is similar coverage as the risk management fund but is for cities and counties. North Dakota Risk Management operates pursuant to NDCC 32-12.2.

When a highway patrol vehicle is damaged and there is a responsible 3rd party, NDDOT will pursue a claim for damages. In the event a highway patrol vehicle is damaged and there is no 3rd party involvement, the repair and/or replacement costs are realized in the state fleet rate. The majority of NDHP vehicles are in group 7. A select few vehicles that are not used in a law enforcement capacity are assigned to the NDHP from other groups.

Highway Patrol Asset Forfeiture Fund

The highway patrol's asset forfeiture fund is explained in NDCC 39-03-18:

- Deposits may not exceed \$300,000 within a biennium.
- Any deposits in excess of \$300,000 must be deposited in the general fund.
- The fund is a continuing appropriation for the following:
 - Expenses related to securing/selling seized property
 - o Drug-related overtime compensation
 - o Equipment for criminal interdiction
 - Drug-related matching grant funds
- The superintendent and director of OMB must personally approve all requests for use of the fund.

NDCC 19-03.1-36 governs forfeitures, and NDCC 19-03.1-36.8 requires that law enforcement agencies notify the attorney general's office about every civil asset forfeiture that is \$50 or greater in value. The attorney general then submits an annual summary to legislative management and the governor.

Previous purchases out of the asset forfeiture fund include rifles, canines, and training uniforms.

Fargo Regional Office Garage Addition


In preparation for budget reductions during the 2021-23 biennium, the highway patrol moved out of regional office space in Bismarck and Fargo and into office space owned by DOT.

This resulted in substantial cost-savings because DOT agreed to charge the highway patrol no rent for office space in Dickinson, Bismarck, and Fargo. The total savings was \$454,000 for the biennium which included the following:

- Fargo office \$137,000
- Bismarck office \$287,000

Unfortunately, the available space in Fargo turned out to be less than originally projected, and our agency does not have sufficient storage or garage space.


A preliminary estimate received in March of 2022 showed the cost to construct a 1,323 square foot garage addition onto the Fargo NDDOT building at \$722,700 or \$546.25/sq ft.



Bismarck Warehouse

The current leased space that the NDHP has is 7,462 square feet and the current rate is \$7.32 per square foot. We are requesting funding to lease the other half of the building which approximately the same square footage and is currently available for rent. Additional space is needed for the following reasons:

- Ability to pre-purchase equipment based on availability due to supply chain issues
- Ability to store critical emergency response equipment and vehicles in a controlled setting
- Ability to store equipment in a manner allowing easier access





Evidence Destruction Guidelines

Late in 2018 the Highway Patrol, Department of Environmental Quality, and Bureau of Criminal Investigation began discussions to come up with a solution and guidance for law enforcement agencies to use for the destruction of evidence in the safest manner with the least environmental impact.

Prior to the discussions, evidence disposal in North Dakota was inconsistent across law enforcement agencies around the state. The process brought together individuals from the solid waste program, air quality, law enforcement, and landfills. One of the driving factors of seeking a standardized method of destruction was the fact that an incinerator available in the eastern part of ND became unavailable.

Through the process, it was learned that incineration is not the desired method to destroy evidence and there are no incinerators in the state permitted to safely destroy evidence.

A memo dated January 28, 2022, was sent by the Division of Waste Management to all law enforcement agencies and municipal solid waste landfills that provided methods of destruction which are approved by North Dakota's Department of Environmental Quality for evidence including alcohol, animal carcasses, various drugs, infectious waste, vehicle parts, and weapons.

Handheld Narcotic Tester

Correction to prior testimony: The one-time cost of \$60,000 would be for *two* narcotic handheld testing devices rather than one.

The international drug problem is increasing, with trafficking of methamphetamines, heroin, and emerging threats like fentanyl and carfentanil impacting communities worldwide, to include communities across North Dakota. Our officers need to quickly identify suspected narcotics in the field to help keep drugs and suppliers off the streets. Being able to identify an unknown substance is crucial evidence to help develop probable cause and make an arrest.

The TruNarc Handheld Narcotics Analyzer enables officers to scan more than 498 suspected controlled substances in a single, definitive test. With these machines, officers can scan suspected narcotics in the packaging, without having to directly handle them. This significantly lowers officer risk of exposure.

Body Armor Donations

The highway patrol and several other North Dakota law enforcement agencies donated expired body armor to support Ukraine. A letter from the President of Ukraine Rises dated September 9, 2022, thanked our agency for our "incredibly generous donation of much-needed personal protective equipment for Ukraine."

The letter stated, "We have received your most recent shipment of life-saving gear in our Houston warehouse and will forward it to Ukraine immediately upon receipt of the necessary export license."

The highway patrol donated 483 ballistic helmets, plates, and panels and coordinated the gathering and packaging of all law enforcement donations.

Ammunition Cost Savings

An e-mail from June of 2016 indicated that transitioning from .357 to 9mm ammunition would save an estimated \$18,000 per biennium. Shortly after, the highway patrol completed a procurement process and purchased 9mm firearms.

Currently, ammunition of any type is difficult to obtain, but 9mm is more available than .357. The ammunition vendors on state contract don't specify an exact price but rather list "20% over cost." This is likely due to ongoing price fluctuations and availability.

Criminal Interdiction Team Justification

Overdose deaths are now exceeding traffic fatalities in North Dakota, and the supply of lethal drugs like fentanyl are being transported up and down our state's highways.

State troopers are in a unique position to interrupt this supply network, but dedicated resources are needed to cover around 14,000 miles of paved roads in our state.

Every highway patrol agency in our bordering states have over two dozen officers dedicated to criminal interdiction. Up until this biennium, our agency had no dedicated officers.

The executive budget recommendation would backfill five post locations that were closed to start our agency's first criminal interdiction team. Five additional officers would allow the team to expand into the northwest and northeast regions.

These northern regions include three tribal nations that are requesting law enforcement assistance due to the drug trafficking trends and harmful outcomes.

Security & Protection Team Justification

During the 2021 legislative session, the highway patrol turned back two non-sworn capitol security positions in order to meet the executive budget guidelines.

These two positions were not restored and have reduced the level of service provided to the public officials, state team members, and visitors at the capitol.

At one point the highway patrol had two full-time sworn officers assigned to capitol security, but 13 sworn officer positions have been removed from the highway patrol's budget since 2017 so remaining positions have been re-prioritized over time.

FTE Cost Breakdown

The cost breakdowns for the 15 positions included in the executive budget recommendation are below:

• Five (5) Criminal Interdiction Team Members – Backfill

- \$1,420,420 ongoing state funding at \$284,084 per position
 - 86% General: \$1,221,560
 - 14% Highway Tax Distribution Fund: \$198,860
- o \$265,000 one-time at \$53,000 per position for initial equipment

Chairman Sorvaag and members of the Senate Education and Environment Division,

My name is Dey Muckle, and I am the Sheriff of Golden Valley County. I am reaching out to you in support of HB 1011, which addresses the funding of the North Dakota Highway Patrol. Golden Valley County is located in the southwest part of the State, and is the fourth smallest County in the State by population. My Sheriffs Office has four POST certified officers, including myself. Golden Valley County contains 21.5 miles of Interstate 94, which is the main basis for this letter of support.

During times of severe inclement weather, it is not uncommon for the Golden Valley County Sheriffs Office to have multiple calls for service on Interstate 94. Those calls mainly consist of motorists assists calls for vehicles that have left the roadway, but also include different degrees of motor vehicle crashes, traffic hazard calls for vehicles stuck on the roadway, and stranded motorists. With an increase of drivers failing to use common sense while travelling, calls for service during severe inclement weather have begun to overwhelm my Department. Being a small, rural Sheriffs Office, there is usually only one person on duty at a time. During the multiple blizzards of 2022, I had to call on the Highway Patrol for assistance, as we were not able to keep up with the emergency calls on Interstate 94. This took an already limited number of Troopers for our region, and divided them even more. At times, I had most of my Department on Interstate 94 responding to calls, plus I had to go as far as using the Beach Fire Department to respond to motorist assists, and assist with traffic coordination as we closed Interstate 94.

I am in full support of the Highway Patrol's request for 15 additional Troopers, as in my opinion, the field operations side of Highway Patrol is significantly under staffed. The Highway Patrol has always done their best to provide assistance when requested, however, during widespread weather events, the calls for service outnumber them too, forcing the Troopers to put calls in pending, until they can be responded to. I believe that the Highway Patrol could easily justify more Troopers than the 15 that they are requesting, but I appreciate them being conservative, and seeing where 15 gets them.

Colonel Brandon Solberg, Superintendent

Introduction

Good afternoon, Mr. Chairman and members of the Senate Education and Environment Division. My name is Brandon Solberg, and I serve as the superintendent of the North Dakota Highway Patrol (NDHP).

The highway patrol was founded in 1935, and the agency's primary statutory authority and responsibility comes from North Dakota Century Code Chapter 39-03. The highway patrol is comprised of two major components: field operations and administration. Field operations consists of four geographical regions and motor carrier operations. Administration consists of the administrative services division, the support services division, and finance.

Our emphasis as an agency has been on public safety through education and enforcement activities. Educating motorists to make the right decision is preferred over having to take enforcement action but enforcing traffic and criminal laws remains our primary function. Educating the public and trying to prevent crashes and traffic violations from ever occurring is a continual cycle. Every day that the department of transportation is open, a batch of new drivers hits the road. If troopers are called to a crash or make a traffic stop, then it's too late – a violation already occurred – so we continue to explore ways to dedicate more time and energy to prevention efforts.

The highway patrol's primary focus is traffic safety, and there continues to be three major contributing factors to serious injury and fatality crashes. Those are speeding, not wearing a seatbelt, and driving impaired. If we could eliminate those three violations, we'd save a lot of lives. Speeding alone is a contributing factor in approximately ¼ of all fatality crashes, but it's such a common violation that many don't recognize the true danger of it. Distracted driving continues to be an issue as well, but it's a more difficult violation to identify, especially after a crash occurs.

The highway patrol fully supports the Vision Zero initiative because reducing crashes and unnecessary injuries and deaths on our roadways has been the agency's goal since 1935. In addition to traffic safety, the highway patrol assists local law enforcement agencies with emergencies and calls for service, especially when resources are limited. Many law enforcement agencies in North Dakota are smaller, and peace officers work together and help each other out regardless of the color of their uniform.

North Dakota has the opportunity to become the safest state in the nation. Most of us who reside here feel safe in our communities, and it's one of the reasons people choose to live in North Dakota. Maintaining a sense of safety wouldn't be possible without solid partnerships between federal, state, tribal, and local law enforcement agencies, and the highway patrol is grateful for all the first responders and dispatchers who work toward a shared goal of providing public safety.

The highway patrol's mission is to make a difference every day by providing high quality law enforcement services to keep North Dakota safe and secure. If you were to ask our employees for one word that summarizes the agency, many of them would say professionalism. Our past and present employees are respected in their communities, and we are fortunate to have strong public support. We're committed to enhancing that public trust by being transparent and continually searching for opportunities to strengthen our relationships with stakeholders even further.

The citizens of North Dakota count on our employees to be responsive and proactive. Our employees enforce traffic laws, investigate crashes, provide safety presentations, help stranded motorists, and assist other agencies and community members during times of crisis. Our employees take pride in performing their duties and serving the citizens of this great state. Our officers are proud to wear the uniform of a North Dakota state trooper, and I appreciate the courage and commitment displayed by our entire team.

- Signed law enforcement mutual aid agreements with MHA and Spirit Lake Nations to clear up jurisdictional complexities
- Implemented an unmanned aerial vehicle (UAV) program with UAVs available statewide for crash investigation and search & rescue operations

Audit Findings

Finding 2020-01

Condition: Terminated Employees Could Bypass Capitol Security

Recommendation:

- Perform monitoring procedures by routinely reconciling terminated employees to access within systems that control building security and disable access for terminated employees; or,
- Coordinate with human resource agencies to automate, if possible, building access for employees according to employment status.

Highway Patrol Response/Corrective Action Plan

Response:

We agree with the finding. Agencies are currently directed under OMB Policy 108 to collect cards upon termination (end of employment). We do not have reason to believe that this isn't consistently being done. The NDHP will, however, clarify communications to agencies ensuring they notify NDHP Security to deactivate the ID card access of terminated employees in a timely manner. We will enhance our current internal control process by collaborating with OMB to explore possibilities within personnel records to build a better method of reconciling ID card access based on current employment status.

Corrective Action:

- Update the human resource process and communicate to agencies that use key access on the capitol complex. ServiceNow is the required method for agencies to notify the NDHP within 10 days (or sooner) of termination of employment.
- The NDHP will utilize OMB employment status records to reconcile requests as a failsafe measure.
- NDIT has a request for Security Expert software in their budget to enhance the current software package used for the electronic card access system.

Finding 2020-02

Condition: Contractors Could Bypass Capitol Security

Recommendation:

- Consistently limit or automate expiration of building access for one year or less for non-employees and require agencies to renew access requests annually.
- Provide guidance to agencies to limit contractor access to contract needs for routine access with a maximum of the contracted period of services.
- Implement a required field on the Access Card Authorization Request form be used to identify when contractor access is to be revoked.

Highway Patrol Response/Corrective Action Plan

Response:

We agree with the finding. The NDHP agrees to implement procedures to terminate access for individuals working under a specific contract in conjunction with the contract end date. We will also seek a process to ensure regular validation of employees of companies who are not under a state contract and currently doing regular business at the Capitol (ie. USPS, Fed-Ex, UPS).

Following the issuance of the final audit report, the NDHP will form an internal audit review committee to address each issue, identify possible solutions, and implement an action plan.

Corrective Action:

- Requests for contractor access through ServiceNow require an expiration date and state contract number to be added when requesting key access.
 Agencies are required to collect the card at the expiration date or end of the contract work period and notify the highway patrol to deactivate access.
- Contractor cards expire after one year unless the contract period is shorter in duration.
- NDIT has a request for Security Expert software in their budget to enhance the current software package used for the electronic card access system.

Additional Appropriation Considerations

Currently, the highway patrol has three sections listed in our appropriations bill that we'd ask for your consideration to carry over into next biennium. The first is a transfer of highway tax distribution funds totaling approximately 14% of our appropriation. A transfer of \$11,989,604 in highway tax distribution funds was included in the executive budget.

The second section is related to a transfer of special funds from the motor carrier electronic permit transaction fund. This fund has been used to cover expenses related to the online permits system in addition to expenses for permits office staff, field administrative assistants and crash assistance program members. The requested amount from the permits fund would be \$1,448,955. This amount was included in the executive budget.

The third section is related to an unvouchered expense of \$200 per month that is provided to sworn officers in lieu of processing individual reimbursement requests for expenses such as meals and lodging while officers are traveling in-state. This expense has been authorized for decades, and the current level of \$200 has been in place since the 2009 legislative session. This amount was included in the executive budget.

Additional considerations include the following base budget limit adjustments that were factored into the executive budget recommendation:

- 2023-25 PERS employer contributions \$260,520
 - Two 0.5% employer increases on January 1 of 2024 and 2025
- \$8,100,000 to replace coronavirus relief funding during the 2021-23 biennium for sworn officer salaries
 - o \$6,966,000 in general funds
 - \$1,134,000 in special funds

The highway patrol is also requesting consideration for the following budget submission corrections due to our error:

- One-time equipment costs for 10 of the sworn officer positions included in the executive budget were inadvertently omitted
 - o Only five sworn officers were funded appropriately for one-time costs
 - \$53,000/officer = \$530,000 total
 - \$369,198 general; \$100,700 federal; \$60,102 special funds (one-time)
- Two of the criminal interdiction team members are supervisors
 - Inadvertently entered at trooper salary level
 - Additional biennial sergeant salary = \$58,915 each or \$117,830 total
 - \$101,344 general; \$16,496 special (ongoing)
- Unvouchered expenses were inadvertently left out
 - \$200/month/officer is the current rate
 - 13 new non-supervisory positions = \$62,400 total
 - \$53,412 general; \$8,988 special (ongoing)

- Total requested correction: \$710,230
 - o General funds \$523,944
 - Special funds \$100,700
 - o Federal funds \$85,586





 - Factoring upcoming rate increases, the highway patrol fund is still 16% below the "actuarially required rate" for contributions.
 - The funded ratio is currently around 70% and is projected to be around 40% by the year 2062.
 - Several options have been discussed including a one-time infusion and vacancy fund transfers.












Speeds 100+ MPH


RESOURCE ANALYSIS & DEPLOYMENT STUDY

- Resource analysis & deployment study completed December 2022
- Analyzed data from July 1, 2020, through June 30, 2022
- Results indicated a need for 14 additional sworn officers to cover all obligated time (the existing workload) and unobligated time
 - Desired unobligated time: 30 minutes of every hour
 - Recommended sworn officers: 173 (+14)

FEDERAL ASSET FORFEITURE

Current language:

39-03-18. Highway patrol - Assets forfeiture fund - Purpose - Continuing appropriation.

There is created a fund to be known as the highway patrol assets forfeiture fund. The fund consists of funds obtained from moneys, assets, and proceeds seized and forfeited pursuant to section 19-03.1-36, amounts received through court proceedings as restitution, and amounts remaining from the forfeiture of property after the payment of expenses for forfeiture and sale authorized by law. The total amount of deposits into the fund may not exceed three hundred thousand dollars within a biennium and any moneys in excess of that amount must be deposited in the general fund. The funds are appropriated as a continuing appropriation to the highway patrol for the following purposes:

- For paying expenses necessary to inventory, safeguard, maintain, advertise, or sell property seized, detained, or forfeited, pursuant to section 19-03.1-36, or of any other necessary expenses incident to the seizure, detention, or forfeiture of the property.
- For paying overtime compensation incurred as a result of investigations or violations of any state criminal law or law relating to the control of drug abuse.
- For purchasing equipment related to criminal interdiction.
- For paying matching funds required as a condition for receipt of funds from a federal government program awarding monetary grants or assistance for the investigation or apprehension of persons violating the provisions of chapter 19-03.1.

The superintendent of the highway patrol, with the concurrence of the director of the office of management and budget, shall establish the necessary accounting procedures for the use of the fund and shall personally approve, in writing, all requests for the use of the fund.

FEDERAL ASSET FORFEITURE

Proposed Language Options:

NEW: Highway patrol – Federal assets forfeiture fund – Purpose – Continuing appropriation.

There is created a fund to be known as the highway patrol federal assets forfeiture fund. The fund consists of funds obtained through federal asset forfeiture sharing programs. Funds received through federal sharing programs shall not be deposited in the same account as other assets forfeited pursuant to 39-03-18. Deposits in excess of three hundred thousand dollars within a biennium must remain in the fund until appropriation authority is granted during the subsequent legislative session. The funds, up to three hundred thousand dollars are appropriated as a continuing appropriation to the highway patrol. Funding shall only be used for eligible purchases as outlined by the US Department of Justice and US Department of Treasury.

The superintendent of the highway patrol, with the concurrence of the director of the office of management and budget, shall establish the necessary accounting procedures in accordance to the federal asset sharing program for the use of the fund and shall personally approve, in writing, all requests for the use of the fund.

PER DIEM FOR NEW POSITIONS

- Section 6 of HB1011 includes \$200/month per diem for troopers
- We would need to add that amount for each additional trooper.
 With the (9) additional positions in the house version, the amount of per diem is \$43,200.
- The amount would increase/decrease by \$4,800 per trooper FTE added or removed

ON-CALL AND OVERTIME PAY

- 67th Legislative assembly provided funding with a goal of 1/4th pay for on-call
- Implementation was at 1/5th pay rate while on-call
- Additional funding needed to maintain 1/5th on-call rate and overtime rate with increases in salary adjustment packages
- Additional funding will be needed to maintain 1/5th rate and overtime rate increases if equity bill through OMB passes

Do most troopers retire at age 50?

- Early retirement would result in a 6% reduction per year in benefits prior to age 55 (e.g., 30% less at age 50 absent the rule of 80)
- The mandatory retirement age is 60

Can troopers retire early with full benefits?

- Troopers are vested after 10 years of service (versus 3 years for Main/Public Safety plans)
- Retirement benefits are calculated using the multiplier which is 3.6% for the first 25 years and then 1.75% thereafter

Do troopers get social security benefits?

- Troopers do not pay into social security there are no employee/employer contributions
- Troopers do not earn social security service credits

 - Only 3% went to the NDHP



WORKFORCE ISSUES

- 7th place in top pay among law enforcement agencies in ND
 - Used to be one of the most competitive
- High education and training requirements
 - Bachelor's degree or 60 semester hours/two years experience
 - 4-5 month hiring cycle
 - 6-month training academy
 - 2 months of field training
- Statewide post locations with limited initial offerings

WORKFORCE ISSUES

- Negative portrayals and attitudes toward law enforcement across the nation
- Unpredictable and dangerous profession
 - Various physical and mental health factors such as violent altercations, vehicle pursuits, hypervigilance, cumulative stress, vicarious trauma, poor sleep cycles, extreme weather, etc.
- FTEs reduced by 10% from 215 to 193 (205 in 1985)
 - North Dakota's population has increased by 15% since 1985
 - Vehicle miles traveled have increased by 67% since 1985







Current language for state asset forfeiture funds:

39-03-18. Highway patrol - Assets forfeiture fund - Purpose - Continuing appropriation.

There is created a fund to be known as the highway patrol assets forfeiture fund. The fund consists of funds obtained from moneys, assets, and proceeds seized and forfeited pursuant to section 19-03.1-36, amounts received through court proceedings as restitution, and amounts remaining from the forfeiture of property after the payment of expenses for forfeiture and sale authorized by law. The total amount of deposits into the fund may not exceed three hundred thousand dollars within a biennium and any moneys in excess of that amount must be deposited in the general fund. The funds are appropriated as a continuing appropriation to the highway patrol for the following purposes:

- For paying expenses necessary to inventory, safeguard, maintain, advertise, or sell property seized, detained, or forfeited, pursuant to section 19-03.1-36, or of any other necessary expenses incident to the seizure, detention, or forfeiture of the property.
- For paying overtime compensation incurred as a result of investigations or violations of any state criminal law or law relating to the control of drug abuse.
- 3. For purchasing equipment related to criminal interdiction.
- For paying matching funds required as a condition for receipt of funds from a federal government program awarding monetary grants or assistance for the investigation or apprehension of persons violating the provisions of chapter 19-03.1.

The superintendent of the highway patrol, with the concurrence of the director of the office of management and budget, shall establish the necessary accounting procedures for the use of the fund and shall personally approve, in writing, all requests for the use of the fund.

FEDERAL ASSET FORFEITURE FUNDS

Proposed language to cover federal asset forfeiture funds:

NEW: Highway patrol – Federal assets forfeiture fund – Purpose – Continuing appropriation.

There is created a fund to be known as the highway patrol federal assets forfeiture fund. The fund consists of funds obtained through federal asset forfeiture sharing programs. Funds received through federal sharing programs shall not be deposited in the same account as other assets forfeited pursuant to 39-03-18. Deposits in excess of three hundred thousand dollars within a biennium must remain in the fund until appropriation authority is granted during the subsequent legislative session. The funds, up to three hundred thousand dollars are appropriated as a continuing appropriation to the highway patrol. Funding shall only be used for eligible purchases as outlined by the US Department of Justice and US Department of Treasury.

The superintendent of the highway patrol, with the concurrence of the director of the office of management and budget, shall establish the necessary accounting procedures in accordance to the federal asset sharing program for the use of the fund and shall personally approve, in writing, all requests for the use of the fund.

PER DIEM FOR NEW SWORN OFFICERS

- Section 6 of HB1011 includes \$200/month per diem for troopers
- Request to add that amount for each new trooper
- House version: Nine new positions would be \$43,200
- Amount would increase/decrease by \$4,800 per new sworn officer position that is added or removed

DN-CALL AND OVERTIME PAY





I apologize for not attending the last Senate Appropriations hearing when the highway patrol's budget was finalized in committee. Senator Dever asked a question related to \$3 million for remodeling the Law Enforcement Training Academy (LETA), and an amendment was added on the Senate floor to carry over some of that funding.

There are two additional carry-over items that were recently brought to my attention following that floor vote. I will share these with Representative Mock as well because he carried the highway patrol's budget bill on the House side.

- Statewide Interoperable Radio Network (SIRN) Project
 - The highway patrol was appropriated \$2,612,000 in one-time funding from the State Fiscal Recovery Fund for SIRN.
 - Most of the equipment has been purchased and received, but there are some items and installation costs that will not be completed this biennium.
 - The highway patrol is requesting that \$628,750 be carried over into the 2023-25 biennium.
 - \$165,750 for vehicle installations
 - \$28,000 for command center radio and installation
 - \$110,000 for initializing and programming costs (NDIT, vendors)
 - \$120,000 for office base stations
 - \$40,000 for miscellaneous equipment and supplies
 - \$165,000 for 10 additional sworn officers
- LETA SiteLogIQ Repairs
 - The highway patrol was appropriated \$246,000 in ARPA funding for two projects:
 - Energy management (building automation) \$88,000
 - Pneumatic controls \$158,000

- o Both of these projects are being done in conjunction with the larger \$3 million remodel which may not be completed until the fall of 2023.
- o The highway patrol is requesting that \$246,000 be carried over into the 2023-25 biennium.

I'm hoping these additions can be added to the bill during a future conference committee. I can share this information with legislative council and OMB as well. If you need any further information, please let me know!



<u>39-03-18.1. Highway patrol - Federal assets forfeiture fund - Continuing appropriation.</u>

There is created in the state treasury the highway patrol federal assets forfeiture fund. The fund consists of moneys received through federal asset forfeiture sharing programs. Funds received through federal sharing programs may not be deposited in the same account as assets forfeited pursuant to section 39-03-18. Up to three hundred thousand dollars is appropriated from the fund on a continuing basis each biennium to the highway patrol. Funding may be used only for eligible purchases identified by the federal department of justice and federal department of treasury. The superintendent, with the concurrence of the director of the office of management and budget, shall establish the necessary accounting procedures in accordance with the federal asset sharing program for the use of the fund. All expenditures of moneys in the fund must be approved by the superintendent.

SECTION 9. DEFERRED MAINTENANCE - UNEXPENDED

APPROPRIATIONS. Pursuant to section 54-44.1-11, the highway patrol may submit a request to the chairmen of the appropriations committees of the senate and house of representatives of the legislative assembly and office of management and budget to continue unexpended appropriation authority transferred to the agency for deferred maintenance under subsection 10 of section 1 of chapter 550 of the 2021 Special Session Session Laws."

One-time funding of \$159,000 is also added for equipment costs for the positions. These 3 new FTE positions were also added by the Senate and are in addition to the 9 FTE trooper positions added by the House including 7 FTE criminal interdiction troopers, 1 FTE drug recognition trooper, and 1 FTE motor carrier trooper.

⁴ Funding is added for \$200 per month per diem payments for new trooper positions consistent with per diem payments for existing trooper positions, the same as the Senate. The House did not include this funding.

- Ongoing funding of \$129,000 is added, including \$110,940 from the general fund and \$18,060 from the highway tax distribution fund, to provide total funding of \$225,320. The House and Senate provided \$133,000, including \$114,380 from the general fund and \$18,620 from the highway tax distribution fund.
- One-time funding of \$113,200 is added by decreasing funding from the general fund by \$146,200 and by increasing funding of \$259,400 from the motor carrier electronic permit fund to provide total funding of \$283,200. The House and Senate provided \$146,200 from the general fund and \$23,800 from the highway tax distribution fund.

This amendment also:

- Increases the transfer from the motor carrier electronic permit fund to the Highway Patrolmen's Retirement Fund by \$1 million, from \$2 million to \$3 million. The House provided for a transfer of \$2 million, and the Senate included a transfer of \$3 million.
- Includes a section added by the Senate to create a federal assets forfeiture fund with a continuing appropriation of up to \$300,000 per biennium to the Highway Patrol for eligible purchases. The House did not include this provision.
- Includes an exemption added by the Senate allowing unexpended 2021-23 biennium federal funding to continue into the 2023-25 biennium for the Commercial Vehicle Information Exchange Window system. The House did not include this exemption.
- Includes an exemption added by the Senate to allow 2021-23 biennium appropriations for the Law Enforcement Training Academy project to be continued into the 2023-25 biennium. The House did not include this exemption.
- Adds an exemption to allow 2021-23 biennium appropriations for radio equipment to be continued into the 2023-25 biennium. Neither the House or Senate included this exemption.
- Adds a section authorizing the agency to submit a request allowing 2021-23 biennium appropriations for deferred maintenance to continue into the 2023-25 biennium. Neither the House or Senate included this provision.

⁵ Funding is added for on-call and overtime pay to account for employee salary increases and equity adjustments, the same as the Senate. The House did not include this funding adjustment.

⁶ One-time federal funding is added for the motor carrier Commercial Vehicle Information Exchange Window system. The House did not include this funding, but the Senate added this funding.

⁷ Funding for technology enhancements is adjusted as follows:
