1 HB1514 – Relating to the Threshold for Passing a Bond in a Municipality

2 Mandan Public Schools – Dr. Mike Bitz, Superintendent

3 Good afternoon Chairman Longmuir and members of the House Political  
4 Subdivisions Committee. For the record, my name is Mike Bitz. I am  
5 fortunate to serve as the superintendent for Mandan Public Schools. I am  
6 here today in opposition to HB1514. I will be brief.

7 My dad is 87 years old, and he still shows up to work every day. Despite  
8 only having an 8<sup>th</sup> grade education, he is the best teacher I ever had. One  
9 of the lessons he taught me is that the world is run by the people who show  
10 up. As legislators, you know this, you are sitting here in elected office  
11 because you showed up, and your supporters showed up at a district  
12 meeting. In many cases, less than 100 people of the 16,000+ that you  
13 represent, showed up to a district meeting and voted for your nomination.  
14 According to the ND Secretary of State's website, since 2014, statewide  
15 turnout in the June primary elections has ranged from 17% to just over  
16 27%. If you applied the same standard to your elections that this  
17 legislation is requiring from municipalities, none of you would have even  
18 advanced to the Nov. general election. The world is run by those who show  
19 up and elections have consequences. This is not a bad thing. It allows our  
20 municipalities and our state to move forward.

21 I live in Dist. 34, and I am a Republican. I have attended several of the  
22 Dist. 34 meetings. I may be biased, but I think the Dist. 34 legislative team  
23 is one of the best in the state. As great as they are, in the 2020 primary  
24 Senator Larsen received 1,411 votes, Representative Porter receive 2,140

1 votes, and Representative Toman received 2,024 votes. Less than a year  
2 later, the same people voted in a Mandan School District Referendum and  
3 2,551 voted yes, while 726 voted no. 78% of Mandan voters approved  
4 an \$84 million bond issue. If the legislature is concerned about low turnout  
5 on an \$84M municipal project, I trust that you will be equally concerned  
6 about even lower turnout at primary elections that send people to the  
7 legislature to make decisions on billions of dollars.

8 I urge you to vote NO on HB1514, and I would be happy to answer any  
9 questions you may have.

**RE: Opposition HB 1514**

Mr. Chairman and committee members, I’m Donnell Preskey with the North Dakota Association of Counties. In that role, I serve as executive director for the North Dakota County Auditors Association. County Auditors want to make sure you are aware of some of the issues that will arise with HB 1514 regarding utilizing the pollbooks to establish the threshold of votes needed for approval of a bond election.

We realize the intent with this bill is to raise the threshold for approval of bond measures. However, using pollbook data is problematic for the following reasons:

- Pollbook data represents a snapshot in time.
- ND does not have voter registration and we do not require action from the voter when the voter moves within the State or outside the state to notify the county auditor. Therefore, the voter records in the Central Voter File are only as good as the information the voters provide regarding their address or updating their address with the Department of Transportation.
- County Auditors would seek clarification on 30% of qualified voters. Does this mean active voters which includes those that voted in the last 4 election cycles. Or total of active and inactive voters in CVF?
- The 30% requirement could delay election night results reporting due to calculation of “30% of qualified voters”.

If the goal of this bill is to have a greater percentage of voters voting on these community issues, a better recommendation may be to move these elections to the general or primary election.
