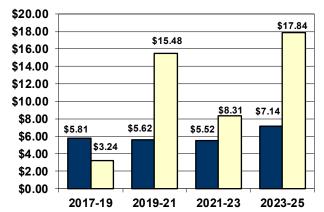

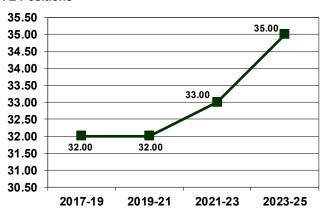

Deficiency Appropriations

There are no deficiency appropriations for this agency.

Significant Audit Findings

The State Auditor reported the Secretary of State did not appropriately reconcile revenue from various fees when it was recorded in the state's accounting system.

Agency Fees

As reported to the Legislative Management, pursuant to North Dakota Century Code Section 54-35-27, this agency has 456 fees. The agency reported there is a need to simplify the current fee structure, but did not recommend any changes to the fees.

SECTION 1. APPROPRIATION. The funds provided in this section, or so much of the funds as may be necessary, are appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, and from special funds derived from federal funds and other income, to the secretary of state for the purpose of defraying the expenses of the secretary of state and public printing, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2025, and ending June 30, 2027, as follows:

The amount of \$6,000,000 appropriated from federal funds derived from the state fiscal recovery fund for the purposes of an election management system and to upgrade FirstStop in Section 1 of Chapter 34 of 2023 Session Laws is not subject to section 54-44.1-11 and is available to the agency for the biennium beginning July 1, 2025, and ending June 30, 2027.

SECTION 6. EXEMPTION – STRATEGIC INVESTMENT AND IMPROVEMENTS FUND. The amount of \$1,500,000 appropriated from the strategic investment and improvements fund for the purpose of a new campaign system, contracted website redesign, and information technology enhancements in Section 1 of Chapter 34 of 2023 Session Laws is not subject to section 54-44.1-11 and is available to the agency for the biennium beginning July 1, 2025, and ending June 30, 2027.

SECTION 7. AMENDMENT. Section 54-09-05 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

Section 54-09-05. Salary of secretary of state. The annual salary of the secretary of state is ene hundred thirty five thousand two hundred dollars through June 30, 2025 and one hundred forty thousand six hundred eight dollars through June 30, 2026 and one hundred forty four thousand eight hundred twenty seven dollars thereafter.

Office of the Governor House Education and Environment Appropriations Testimony, January 17, 2025

Testimony of Roz Leighton In Support of 2025 House Bill 1001 Office of the Governor Presented to House Appropriations Education and Environment Committee Representative Nathe, Chairman Friday, January 17, 2025

Chairman Nathe and members of the Education and Environment Committee, I am Roz Leighton serving as Chief of Staff for the Governor and am here to ask for your support for the budget recommendation for the Office of the Governor.

Salaries and Wages

- This request would continue funding our office at current compensation levels and takes into account the proposed Executive Compensation Plan and fully funded health insurance for state employees.
- Additionally, our request includes an additional \$20,000 for temporary salaries, for a total of \$50,000. Our goal is to develop a robust internship program and take advantage of the OMB matching program for interns. Over six years in Congress, we had 32 interns participate in our office's program. Participants went on to work at the Pentagon, attend law school, and even work for the State of North Dakota. We want to continue investing in the future of North Dakota's workforce and demonstrate firsthand the benefits of public service and being a part of State Government.
- Finally, there is a \$272,000 request for the compensation package for a Fargo-based employee. We have the open FTE but currently not the funding for salary and benefits. The request includes \$192,000 in salary and \$80,000 in fringe benefits. In keeping with the theme of the Governor's State of the State "Trying New Things," we would like to establish a branch of the Governor's Office in the state's most populous metro. To again reflect on the Governor's time representing the entire state in Congress, we found it extremely beneficial to have our State Director based in Fargo ensuring that the office had a presence at events and meetings on the eastern side of the state. Our State Director was able to represent the Congressman and engage with constituents when the Congressman was unable to attend due to commitments in Washington and other parts of the state. Our office prides ourselves on accessibility, and a Fargo office would ensure that people outside of Bismarck were also afforded that accessibility.

Governor's Salary

For the past three bienniums, the Governor's salary was a separate line item in the budget while
the fringe benefits were included in the Salaries and Wages line item. The increase in this budget

is to bring the entirety of the Governor's compensation package onto the same line for efficiencies and transparency. This additional \$112,085 increase reflects moving the fringe benefits for the Governor from the regular salary and wages line to the Governor's salary line.

Operating Expenses

- Our request includes an additional \$35,000 in travel, for a total of \$100,000. In the interest of transparency to the legislature and the public, we are requesting additional funding to accurately reflect the travel costs for all members of the Governor's Office.
- We have included a new request of \$30,000 for rent for the office in Fargo I described earlier.
 This amount was an estimate provided by the Office of Management and Budget based on similar state rental contracts in Fargo.
- We are requesting an additional \$21,000 for NDIT costs for licensing and monthly user fees for Copilot and Chat GPT. These AI tools will increase productivity and efficiencies for our team in research, managing workflow, summarizing legislation, and drafting communications.
- Finally, we have requested an additional \$15,000 in professional development opportunities. We are a new administration with a new staff, and we are committed to performing at the highest level possible. During the pandemic, most of these opportunities were virtual. However, those virtual options are becoming more limited, and while in-person options are more readily available, there is an increased expense. These opportunities include conferences such as Western Governors' Association and National Governors Association. Many states face similar issues as our own, and these development opportunities allow states to come together and find solutions to our most pressing problems.

Contingency

There is no change requested to this amount from the 2025-27 Base Level.

Children's Cabinet

- The North Dakota Children's Cabinet, established by 2019 Senate Bill 2313, coordinates care for children across state agencies and tribal nations. The Cabinet takes a cross-system approach to addressing gaps and collaborating on services related to early education, physical and behavioral health, child welfare and juvenile justice. In addition to fulfilling its statutory duties, the Cabinet recognized the need for a strategic plan and technical assistance for long-term success. In fall 2023, North Dakota joined the Forum for Youth Investment's Children's Cabinet Network, and with the proposed legislation, Senate Bill 2176, there is intent to move the administration and programming within the Office of the Governor. While the Cabinet has made progress in improving outcomes for children and families and providing this budgetary support, it will allow the work to continue by ensuring the youth-serving systems are working as one to support children and families.
- We propose a one-time \$65,000 appropriation for facilitation experts, and \$35,000 ongoing appropriation to Cabinet members, for a total of \$100,000 this biennium.

Roughrider Awards

 The budget for the Roughrider Award has been funded at \$10,800 per biennium for at least four bienniums. With an estimated two inductees per biennium, it is a challenge to cover the cost of the portrait for the Hall of inductees, duplicate for the inductee, framing, the Theodore Roosevelt bust, and travel costs for the recipient if necessary. We propose the budget be increased \$4,200 to a total of \$15,000 to catch up on inflationary costs.

Mr. Chairman and members of the Education and Environment Subcommittee of Appropriations, I ask for your favorable consideration of our budget and am available, along with Office of Management and Budget staff, to answer any questions you may have. Thank you.

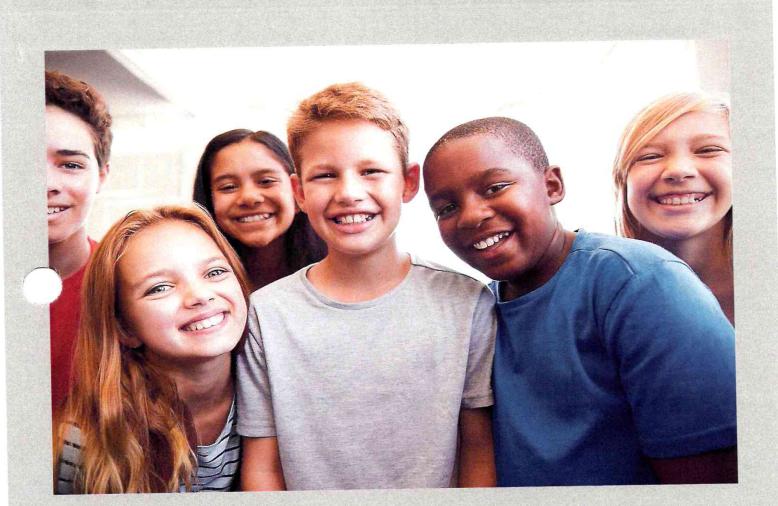

Executive Summary

North Dakota's Children's Cabinet was created by 2019 Senate Bill No. 2313 to assess, guide and coordinate care for children across North Dakota branches of government and tribal nations. The Cabinet meets monthly to receive information and collaborate on strategies that address gaps and the full continuum of care and delivery of services regarding early care and education, medical and behavioral health, community, child welfare, and juvenile justice issues. This year's annual report describes that work and captures the progress and momentum towards improving outcomes for North Dakota's children and families.

In addition to the work of the North Dakota Children's Cabinet in meeting its statutory responsibilities and planning for the long-term future of our children, the Cabinet identified that a strategic plan and technical assistance was critical to its future success and sustainability. North Dakota became a member of the Forum for Youth Investment's Children's Cabinet Network in the fall of 2023 and the second portion of this report documents its 2024 planning work with the Forum for Youth Investment in helping to illuminate a path forward.

Enabling Statute

N.D. Cent. Code § 50-06-43.1. Children's cabinet - Membership - Duties - Report

- 1. The children's cabinet is created to assess, guide, and coordinate the care for children across the state's branches of government and the tribal nations.
- 2. The children's cabinet consists of the following members:
 - a. The governor, or the governor's designee;
 - b. The chief justice of the supreme court, or the chief justice's designee;
 - c. A member of the house of representatives from an even-numbered legislative district and a member of the house of representatives from an odd-numbered legislative district appointed by the majority leader of the house of representatives to serve two-year terms;
 - d. A member of the senate from an even-numbered legislative district and a member of the senate from an oddnumbered legislative district appointed by the majority leader of the senate to serve two-year terms;
 - e. The superintendent of public instruction, or the superintendent's designee;
 - f. The director of the committee on protection and advocacy, or the director's designee;
 - g. The commissioner of the department, or the commissioner's designee.
 - h. A representative of the tribal nations in the state, who is appointed by the governor; and
 - i. Four individuals representing parents, private service providers, or other community interests, who are appointed by the governor to serve a term of two years, at the pleasure of the governor, and who are entitled to reimbursement from the department for travel and lodging at the same rate as provided for state officers and employees.
- 3. The chairman of legislative management shall appoint one of the legislative members to serve as the presiding officer of the cabinet. The children's cabinet shall select one of its members to serve as the vice-presiding officer. The cabinet shall meet at least quarterly. Additional meetings may be held at the discretion of the presiding officer.
- 4. The children's cabinet shall:
 - a. Coordinate broad-based leadership across programs, agencies, branches of government, and tribal nations to meet the needs of children;
 - b. Develop strategies to address gaps or needs regarding early care and education, medical and behavioral health, community, child welfare, and juvenile justice;
 - c. Develop strategies to provide for the full continuum of care in the delivery of services, including promotion, prevention, early identification and intervention, service delivery, and recovery;
 - d. Seek to engage cooperation across public and private service providers;
 - e. Provide a comprehensive vision for how and where children are best served, attending to children in a respectful and relevant manner;
 - f. Seek strategies to provide services to children without consideration of prior engagement with juvenile services;
 - g. Provide for the active participation of consumers and providers statewide on advisory committees;
 - h. Receive information and recommendations from the department of health and human services, department of corrections and rehabilitation, and other state agencies; and
 - i. Provide an annual report to the legislative management and governor regarding the activities and findings of the cabinet.
- 5. The department shall provide the children's cabinet with staffing and administrative services.
- 6. A member of the cabinet who is not a state employee is entitled to reimbursement for mileage and expenses as provided by law for state officers and employees, to be paid by the department. A state employee who is a member of the cabinet is entitled to receive that employee's regular salary and is entitled to reimbursement for mileage and expenses to be paid by the employing agency.

A member of the cabinet who is a member of the legislative assembly is entitled to receive per diem compensation at the rate provided under section 54-35-10 for each day performing official duties of the cabinet. The legislative council shall pay the per diem compensation and reimbursement for travel and expenses as provided by law for any member of the cabinet who is a member of the legislative assembly.

Appendix B: The Forum for Youth Investment's Children's Cabinet Network

No single support or program is enough to ensure children and youth are on track developmentally, educationally, socially, and emotionally. Children's Cabinets are systematically changing the fragmented ways that state and local governments do business for children and youth. Since 2004, The Forum for Youth Investment has engaged with these coordinating bodies to support their operation and share lessons learned with the youth development field.

Unfortunately, the manner in which rules, regulations and government structures are crafted makes it difficult for leaders to create and implement coordinated programs and services that address the comprehensive needs of young people. But there is much that can be done to simplify and untangle the patchwork of polices and funding streams so they are more efficient and effective.

The Forum's policy staff support Children's Cabinets, also known as councils, commissions or P-20 councils. Children's Cabinets are typically made up of the heads of all government agencies with child- and youth-serving programs. They meet regularly to coordinate services, develop a common set of outcomes, and collaboratively decide upon and implement plans to foster the well-being of young people.

Members of this network receive technical assistance, share best practices and learn more about tools that bring efficiency and effectiveness to their efforts to improve outcomes for young people. Below are the states currently engaged in the Children's Cabinet Network.

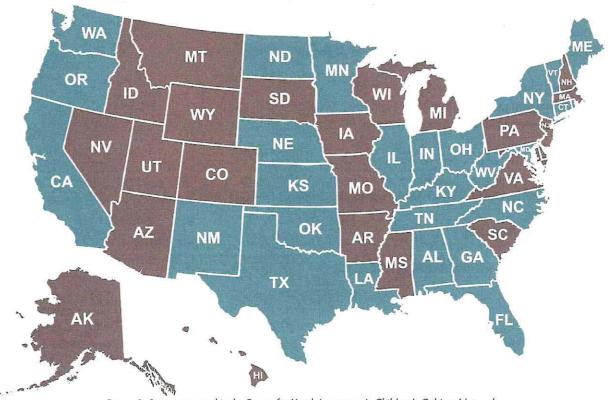


Figure 1. States engaged in the Forum for Youth Investment's Children's Cabinet Network.

Upon the receipt of other funds under this section, the governor's office shall provide a report to the budget section regarding the source, amount, and purpose of the funds received. Executive Summary

North Dakota's Children's Cabinet was created by 2019 Senate Bill No. 2313 to assess, guide and coordinate care for children across North Dakota branches of government and tribal nations. The Cabinet meets monthly to receive information and collaborate on strategies that address gaps and the full continuum of care and delivery of services regarding early care and education, medical and behavioral health, community, child welfare, and juvenile justice issues. This year's annual report describes that work and captures the progress and momentum towards improving outcomes for North Dakota's children and families.

In addition to the work of the North Dakota Children's Cabinet in meeting its statutory responsibilities and planning for the long-term future of our children, the Cabinet identified that a strategic plan and technical assistance was critical to its future success and sustainability. North Dakota became a member of the Forum for Youth Investment's Children's Cabinet Network in the fall of 2023 and the second portion of this report documents its 2024 planning work with the Forum for Youth Investment in helping to illuminate a path forward.

Enabling Statute

N.D. Cent. Code § 50-06-43.1. Children's cabinet - Membership - Duties - Report

- 1. The children's cabinet is created to assess, guide, and coordinate the care for children across the state's branches of government and the tribal nations.
- 2. The children's cabinet consists of the following members:
 - a. The governor, or the governor's designee;
 - b. The chief justice of the supreme court, or the chief justice's designee;
 - c. A member of the house of representatives from an even-numbered legislative district and a member of the house of representatives from an odd-numbered legislative district appointed by the majority leader of the house of representatives to serve two-year terms;
 - d. A member of the senate from an even-numbered legislative district and a member of the senate from an oddnumbered legislative district appointed by the majority leader of the senate to serve two-year terms;
 - e. The superintendent of public instruction, or the superintendent's designee;
 - f. The director of the committee on protection and advocacy, or the director's designee;
 - g. The commissioner of the department, or the commissioner's designee.
 - h. A representative of the tribal nations in the state, who is appointed by the governor; and
 - i. Four individuals representing parents, private service providers, or other community interests, who are appointed by the governor to serve a term of two years, at the pleasure of the governor, and who are entitled to reimbursement from the department for travel and lodging at the same rate as provided for state officers and employees.
- 3. The chairman of legislative management shall appoint one of the legislative members to serve as the presiding officer of the cabinet. The children's cabinet shall select one of its members to serve as the vice-presiding officer. The cabinet shall meet at least quarterly. Additional meetings may be held at the discretion of the presiding officer.
- 4. The children's cabinet shall:
 - a. Coordinate broad-based leadership across programs, agencies, branches of government, and tribal nations to meet the needs of children:
 - b. Develop strategies to address gaps or needs regarding early care and education, medical and behavioral health, community, child welfare, and juvenile justice;
 - c. Develop strategies to provide for the full continuum of care in the delivery of services, including promotion, prevention, early identification and intervention, service delivery, and recovery;
 - d. Seek to engage cooperation across public and private service providers;
 - e. Provide a comprehensive vision for how and where children are best served, attending to children in a respectful and relevant manner;
 - f. Seek strategies to provide services to children without consideration of prior engagement with juvenile services;
 - g. Provide for the active participation of consumers and providers statewide on advisory committees;
 - h. Receive information and recommendations from the department of health and human services, department of corrections and rehabilitation, and other state agencies; and
 - i. Provide an annual report to the legislative management and governor regarding the activities and findings of the cabinet.
- 5. The department shall provide the children's cabinet with staffing and administrative services.
- 6. A member of the cabinet who is not a state employee is entitled to reimbursement for mileage and expenses as provided by law for state officers and employees, to be paid by the department. A state employee who is a member of the cabinet is entitled to receive that employee's regular salary and is entitled to reimbursement for mileage and expenses to be paid by the employing agency.

A member of the cabinet who is a member of the legislative assembly is entitled to receive per diem compensation at the rate provided under section 54-35-10 for each day performing official duties of the cabinet. The legislative council shall pay the per diem compensation and reimbursement for travel and expenses as provided by law for any member of the cabinet who is a member of the legislative assembly.

Appendix B: The Forum for Youth Investment's Children's Cabinet Network

No single support or program is enough to ensure children and youth are on track developmentally, educationally, socially, and emotionally. Children's Cabinets are systematically changing the fragmented ways that state and local governments do business for children and youth. Since 2004, The Forum for Youth Investment has engaged with these coordinating bodies to support their operation and share lessons learned with the youth development field.

Unfortunately, the manner in which rules, regulations and government structures are crafted makes it difficult for leaders to create and implement coordinated programs and services that address the comprehensive needs of young people. But there is much that can be done to simplify and untangle the patchwork of polices and funding streams so they are more efficient and effective.

The Forum's policy staff support Children's Cabinets, also known as councils, commissions or P-20 councils. Children's Cabinets are typically made up of the heads of all government agencies with child- and youth-serving programs. They meet regularly to coordinate services, develop a common set of outcomes, and collaboratively decide upon and implement plans to foster the well-being of young people.

Members of this network receive technical assistance, share best practices and learn more about tools that bring efficiency and effectiveness to their efforts to improve outcomes for young people. Below are the states currently engaged in the Children's Cabinet Network.

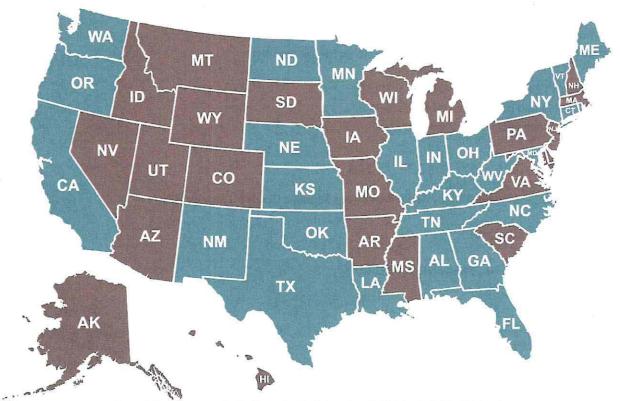


Figure 1. States engaged in the Forum for Youth Investment's Children's Cabinet Network.

SECTION 3. NEW AND VACANT FTE POOL - LIMITATION - TRANSFER REQUEST. The governor's office may not spend funds appropriated in the new and vacant FTE pool line item in section 1 of this Act, but may request the office of management and budget to transfer funds from the new and vacant FTE pool line item to the salaries and wages line item in accordance with the guidelines and reporting provisions included in House Bill No. 1015, as approved by the sixty-ninth legislative assembly.

SECTION 4. ADDITIONAL INCOME - APPROPRIATION - GOVERNOR'S OFFICE - BUDGET SECTION REPORT. Subject to the limitations of this section, in addition to the amounts appropriated in section 1 of this Act, there is appropriated to the governor's office, any additional income from other funds, excluding federal funds, which may become available to the governor's office, for the period beginning July 1, 2025, and ending June 30, 2027. Any other funds received under this section must be used for the specific purpose intended for the funds or transferred to the appropriate state agency or institution. Upon the receipt of other funds under this section, the governor's office shall provide a report to the budget section regarding the source, amount, and purpose of the funds received. Federal funds which may become available to the governor's office may be accepted by the governor's office. Federal funds accepted by the governor's office may not be spent until authorization is received from the legislative assembly or from the emergency commission and budget section under chapter 54-16.
