Testimony on HB 1099

Chairman Klemin and Members of the House Judiciary Committee:

I am submitting this testimony in support of HB 1099.

I have worked as a primary, special, and general election judge in Fargo for the past three years. In the recent November 2024 General Election, I served as an election judge at the Cass County Courthouse in Fargo for the entire early-voting and election-day period. For the first time as a poll worker, I had to assist individual voters who had trouble finding a candidate's name on the ballot. In all cases, it had to do with a presidential candidate. One of these voters was an elderly gentleman who asked me to assist him and said to me several times "I can't find her name." I asked him a few questions until it was clear he was trying to find Kamala Harris' name. He knew her by "Kamala," not Harris. Two other voters who appeared to be new citizens also had difficulty finding "Kamala's" name on the ballot (they knew her first name but not her last). While three voters are a small sample size, it made me wonder how many other voters, at the courthouse or elsewhere, were confused by the "Harris" name on the ballot.

When a presidential candidate is well known by a last name, such as "Trump," but another presidential candidate is well known by a first name, such as "Kamala," the current North Dakota law requiring only the presidential candidate's surname obviously privileges the candidate with the well-known last name. The current law could also be confusing if two or more presidential candidates had the same last name. Ensuring that the ballot offers all candidates' first and last names will eliminate voter confusion and inadvertent state privileging of candidates.

I want to thank Representative Conmy for sponsoring this bill, and I thank the Judiciary Committee for its attention to my testimony. **I urge the Committee to give HB 1099 a Do Pass recommendation.**

Chair Klemin, Vice Chair Karls, Vice Chair Vetter, and members of the Judiciary committee,

For the record, I am Representative Liz Conmy, from District 11 in Fargo.

I'm here to present House Bill 1099, which is a bill relating to the printing of presidential candidate names on the general election ballot.

Let me explain how this came up. In the past election, only the surnames of the presidential candidates were on the ballot: Oliver, Harris, and Trump. The first names were omitted, because currently, in section two of 16.1-06-07.1., the statute states that the surname of the presidential candidate must be placed in line with an oval. The Secretary of State followed what was written, and only the surnames were on the ballot. For every other office, both first and last names were included. Several election judges told me after the election that some voters were confused, because they were looking for the first names, particularly Kamala and Donald. When I spoke to Secretary of State Michael Howe, he stated that although we could probably add the full name, we should probably do it by changing the statute to specify simply, name, which could then include a candidates full name.

First and last names should be required on the ballot in order to avoid confusion. And, it is in the voter's best interest that the presidential candidates be represented by their full name on the ballot.

This would apply both to electronic and paper ballots.

This change is supported by the North Dakota Secretary of State's office and election judges around the state.

That concludes my remarks and I welcome any questions you may have.

1 A BILL for an Act to amend and reenact section 16.1-06-07.1 of the North Dakota Century
2 Code, relating to the printing of presidential candidate names on a general election ballot.

3 **BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:**

4 **SECTION 1. AMENDMENT.** Section 16.1-06-07.1 of the North Dakota Century Code is
5 amended and reenacted as follows:

6 **16.1-06-07.1. Arrangement of names on ballot - Presidential electors.**

- 7 1. In presidential election years the ballot provided for in section 16.1-06-05 must include
8 the designation of the office of president and vice president as the first listing of the
9 continuous listing of the designation of each office to be voted for. The names of
10 presidential electors, presented in one certificate of nomination, must be arranged in a
11 group enclosed in brackets under the designation of the office of president and vice
12 president on the right side of the ballot column.
- 13 2. To the left and opposite the center of each group of electors' names must be printed in
14 bold type the ~~surname~~first and last name of the presidential candidate represented
15 and in line with ~~such surname~~the candidate's first and last name must be placed a
16 single oval. A mark within ~~such an~~ oval by the voter must be designated as a vote for
17 all the electors. The appropriate party designation must appear, in smaller type, under
18 the ~~surname~~first and last name of the presidential candidate represented.
