Good afternoon Chair Schauer and GVA Committee:

Today, I stand before you to introduce House Bill 1180, a piece of legislation rooted in housekeeping but with significant implications for our dedicated veterans. Our intent on this bill is simple yet crucial: to clear up language in the North Dakota Century Code (NDCC) to reflect the verbiage used in VA letters on combined service-connected evaluations and Individual Unemployability (IU).

Intent of the Bill

We aim to align our state laws with the federal terminology used by the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA). This bill seeks to eliminate the ambiguities and misinterpretations that arise due to differences in language.

Need for the Bill

While the main offices of the North Dakota Department of Transportation (DOT), the Tax Commissioner's office, and several others currently understand and differentiate between these laws, local staff and new employees may not be as familiar. This discrepancy occasionally results in veterans spending hours on phone calls and discussions to clarify their eligibility, delaying or even denying them their earned benefits.

Current Challenge

The verbiage used by our government employees sometimes conflicts with the VA's language, particularly regarding disability letters. For instance, the term "...a resident disabled veteran who has a one hundred percent service-connected disability as determined by the department of veterans' affairs, or a resident disabled veteran who has an extra-schedular rating to include individual unemployability that brings the veteran's total disability rating to one hundred percent as determined by the department of veterans' affairs..." needs to be better understood at all levels.

Clarifications on VA Disability Ratings

- **Service-Connected Disability:** A condition incurred or aggravated during military service for which the veteran receives VA benefits.
- Combined Service-Connected Evaluation: The aggregate rating for all service-connected disabilities.

• Individual Unemployability (IU): This allows veterans to be compensated at the 100% rate even if their combined service-connected evaluation is not 100%, as their conditions prevent them from maintaining gainful employment.

For clarity, VA ratings add each disability individually, combining them for an overall rating, which is then rounded to the nearest 10%. Using VA math, it would require five disabling issues rated at 50% to equal a total 100% disability.

Outcome of the Bill

The outcome we seek is to align the NDCC language with that of the federal VA, reducing confusion and ensuring our veterans receive the benefits they have earned without undue hassle. Importantly, this bill does not introduce new benefits but ensures the fair and accurate delivery of existing ones.

In conclusion, House Bill 1180 represents a step forward in streamlining our processes, honoring our commitment to veterans, and ensuring they receive the respect and clarity they deserve. I urge you all to support this bill and help us make this necessary adjustment to better serve our veterans.

Please accept this testimony in support of HB 1180.

Intent of bill:

Housekeeping. Clear up NDCC language to reflect verbiage on VA letters on combined service-connected evaluation and **Individual Unemployability (IU)**.

Need for bill:

While the ND DOT main office, the ND Tax Commissioners office, and many others currently understand and agree with the differentiation of the laws, many times the local staff or new employees are unaware of how the VA letters are written. This occasionally causes hours of phone calls and discussion to clarify and delays or denies veterans their earned benefits.

The verbiage "...a resident disabled veteran who has a one hundred percent service-connected disability as determined by the department of veterans' affairs, or a resident disabled veteran who has an extra-schedular rating to include individual unemployability that brings the veteran's total disability rating to one hundred percent as determined by the department of veterans' affairs..."

(VA IU does <u>not</u> bring a combined service-connected disability to 100%. IU leaves the combined service-connected % rating but increases the benefit to 100% rate through the "extra schedular rating").

VA disability rating explanation.

VA rates each disability individually. Adds (combines) the disabilities for a combined service-connected disability rating. This number is rounded up and ratings are at 10% increments.

With VA math it would take five (5) 50% disabling issues to equal a 100% disability.

VA definitions (found on back of VA benefits letter):

- SERVICE-CONNECTED DISABILITY: A condition incurred during or aggravated by military service, for which the Veteran is receiving VA benefits.
- COMBINED SERVICE-CONNECTED EVALUTION: The Veteran's disability rating for all conditions determined to be service-connected.
- INDIVIDUAL UNEMPLOYABILITY (IU): The Veteran is receiving payment at the 100 percent rate, even though the combined service-connected evaluation is not 100 percent.

The Veteran's service-connected conditions cause him/her to be unable to obtain or maintain substantially gainful employment because of the Veteran's service-connected conditions. The Veteran must periodically certify continued unemployability, but if there is no scheduled future reduction or medical examination required, he/she may be considered by some states to be permanently and totally disabled.

Outcome of bill:

Align verbiage of NDCC with federal VA. Reduce confusion in future.

No additional benefit to veteran.

VA Benefit Details

SERVICE-CONNECTED DISABILITY: A condition incurred during or aggravated by military service, for which the Veteran is receiving VA benefits.

COMBINED SERVICE-CONNECTED EVALUATION: The Veteran's disability rating for all conditions determined to be service-connected.

CURRENT MONTHLY AWARD AMOUNT: The monthly monetary benefit paid to the Veteran or survivor receiving benefits under a VA program.

NON-SERVICE-CONNECTED PENSION: Benefit for a non-service connected Veteran who meets specific criteria, which include disability or age, wartime service, minimum length of service, and income restrictions. If a Veteran is eligible for service-connected benefits and pension benefits, VA will pay the higher benefit.

INDIVIDUAL UNEMPLOYABILITY (IU): The Veteran is receiving payment at the 100 percent rate, even though the combined service-connected evaluation is not 100 percent. The Veteran's service-connected conditions cause him/her to be unable to obtain or maintain substantially gainful employment because of the Veteran's service-connected conditions. The Veteran must periodically certify continued unemployability, but if there is no scheduled future reduction or medical examination required, he/she may be considered by some states to be permanently and totally disabled.

PERMANENT AND TOTAL (P&T) DISABILITY: The Veteran is considered by VA to be permanently and totally disabled because of his/her service-connected conditions.

SPECIAL MONTHLY COMPENSATION: The Veteran is receiving additional compensation for one or more of the following: a service-connected loss of or loss of use of one or more specific organs or extremities; a combination of severe disabilities; is 100 percent disabled and housebound, bedridden, or in the need of the aid and attendance of another person.

SPECIALLY ADAPTED HOUSING and/or SPECIAL HOME ADAPTATION GRANT: Grants provided by VA to service-connected veterans and service members to help build a new specially adapted house, to adapt a home they already own, or buy a house and modify it to meet their disability-related requirements.

Wartime Service Periods

Mexican Border Period: May 9, 1916, through April 5, 1917, for veterans who served in Mexico, on its borders or in adjacent waters.

World War I: April 6, 1917, through Nov. 11, 1918; for veterans who served in Russia, April 6, 1917, through April 1, 1920; extended through July 1, 1921, for veterans who had at least one day of service between April 6, 1917, and Nov. 11, 1918.

World War II: Dec. 7, 1941, through Dec. 31, 1946.

Korean War: June 27, 1950, through Jan. 31, 1955.

Vietnam War: Aug. 5, 1964 (Feb. 28, 1961, for veterans who served "in country" before Aug. 5, 1964), through May 7, 1975.

Gulf War: Aug. 2, 1990, through a date to be set by law or Presidential Proclamation.

Intent of this bill:

Establish the Month of May as "Military Appreciation Month".

Need for bill:

- As per congressional action in 1999: Each year, the president makes a proclamation reminding Americans of the important role the U.S. Armed Forces have played in the history and development of our country. May was chosen because it has many individual days marked to note our military's achievements, including
 - Loyalty Day May 1 (since 1955 Dwight D. Eisenhower) A day for declaring loyalty to the USA and acknowledge American history.
 - Victory in Europe (VE) Day commemorating the end of WWII in Europe: May 8, 1945
 - Children of Fallen Patriots Day (May 13)
 - o The anniversary of the death of Osama bin Laden (May 2, 2011)
 - Arlington National Cemetery was founded May 13, 1864.
 - Memorial Day: Observed the last Monday in May, Memorial Day honors those who lost their lives while in service to the United States during peace and war.
 - Military Spouse Appreciation Day: The Friday in May before Mother's Day, this special day was first recognized by President Ronald Reagan in 1984.
 - Armed Forces Day: On Aug. 31, 1949, Defense Secretary Louis Johnson announced the creation of an Armed Forces Day to replace separate Army, Navy and Air Force Days. The single-day celebration stemmed from the unification of the armed forces under one agency -- the Department of Defense.

Outcome of bill:

North Dakota would be in line with federal "Armed Forces month". ND Governor proclamation would be issued annually.
