TESTIMONY OF

Sherry Neas, Director, Shared Services Division

Chairman Longmuir and members of the committee. My name is Sherry Neas, Director of the Shared Services Division in the Office of Management and Budget (OMB). I appear today in support of HB 1198.

This bill adds a new section to the Parks and Park Districts law regarding cooperative purchasing. We appreciate the opportunity to work with Representative Warrey, the bill sponsor, and the North Dakota Parks and Recreation Association on an amendment.

State procurement law in chapter 54-44.4 currently enables park districts to use cooperative purchasing contracts established by the OMB. The amendment makes it clear that a park district does not need a joint powers agreement to participate in the OMB cooperative purchasing contracts.

The bill creates new authority for park districts to participate in other types of cooperative purchasing agreements through a joint powers agreement.

OMB supports cooperative purchasing, but we are not staffed to execute all the needed cooperative purchasing agreements for all levels of state government and political subdivisions. The amended bill makes it clear that there are multiple sources of authority for park districts to join cooperative purchasing contracts.

Mr. Chairman and committee members, this concludes my testimony. I ask your support for HB 1198. I would be happy to answer any questions.

Testimony of Cole Higlin North Dakota Recreation & Park Association To House Political Subdivisions In Support to HB 1198 Friday, January 24, 2025

Chairman Longmuir and members of the Committee, my name is Cole Higlin, and I am the public policy chair of the North Dakota Recreation & Park Association (NDRPA). We represent more than 900 members, primarily park districts, and work to advance parks, recreation and conservation for an enhanced quality of life in North Dakota.

On behalf of North Dakota's park districts, I express support for House Bill 1198 which provides clarity as to how park districts are allowed to engage in cooperative purchasing. My understanding is that an amendment is going to be brought forward to provide further clarity to the language, allowing park districts to participate in cooperative purchasing contracts with OMB, cooperative purchasing contracts with another state, and cooperative purchases pursuant to a joint powers agreement.

Cooperative purchasing allows political subdivisions to pool buying power, securing competitive prices and favorable terms. This bill would allow park districts to leverage this model, unlocking cost savings that can be reinvested in our facilities, programs and services for the communities we serve. By providing clarity to how park districts can participate in cooperative purchasing, the bill would help ensure efficiency and transparency in the process, all while maintaining compliance with existing rules and regulations.

We ask the committee to support this bill as an important step toward enhancing the effectiveness of park districts statewide. Thank you for the opportunity to express our support.

Sherry Neas, Director, Shared Services Division

Chairman Roers and members of the committee. My name is Sherry Neas, Director of the Shared Services Division in the Office of Management and Budget (OMB). I appear today in support of engrossed HB 1198.

This bill adds a new section to the Parks and Park Districts law regarding cooperative purchasing. The bill creates new authority for park districts to participate in other types of cooperative purchasing agreements.

This bill was amended by the House and we appreciated the opportunity to work with Representative Warrey, the bill sponsor, and the North Dakota Parks and Recreation Association on an amendment. The amendment was required because current state procurement law in chapter 54-44.4 enables park districts to use cooperative purchasing contracts established by the OMB without a joint powers agreement.

OMB supports cooperative purchasing and has many contracts park districts can use. OMB is not staffed to execute all the needed cooperative purchasing agreements for all levels of state government and political subdivisions.

The engrossed bill makes it clear that there are multiple sources of authority for park districts to join cooperative purchasing contracts.

Testimony of Cole Higlin North Dakota Recreation & Park Association To Senate State and Local Government In Support to HB 1198 Friday, March 7, 2025

Chair Roers and members of the Committee, my name is Cole Higlin, and I am the public policy chair of the North Dakota Recreation & Park Association (NDRPA). We represent more than 900 members, primarily park districts, and work to advance parks, recreation and conservation for an enhanced quality of life in North Dakota.

On behalf of North Dakota's park districts, I express support for House Bill 1198 which provides clarity as to how park districts are allowed to engage in cooperative purchasing. This legislation addresses the challenges park districts face in securing cost-effective goods and services by streamlining the purchasing process and expanding opportunities for savings.

HB 1198 clarifies that park districts do not need a joint powers agreement to access cooperative purchasing contracts through the Office of Management and Budget (OMB), making it easier and faster for districts to utilize these contracts.

Additionally, the bill grants park districts the authority to participate in cooperative purchasing agreements established by other states, allowing them to tap into broader vendor options and potential discounts, such as Sourcewell which is through Minnesota.

Importantly, the bill also retains and clarifies the option for park districts to enter into joint powers agreements with other political subdivisions.

By removing administrative barriers, enhancing access to cooperative purchasing contracts, and preserving flexibility, HB 1198 will help park districts save taxpayer dollars, improve efficiency, and better serve their communities.
