- 1 Amendment to HB 1369: Addressing Declining Enrollment with a 3-Year Rolling
- 2 Average of Weighted Student Units
- 3 Good morning, Chairman Heinert, members of the House Education Committee. My
- 4 name is Mike McNeff, and I serve as the superintendent of Rugby Public School District.
- 5 I am here to propose an amendment to HB 1369 that addresses the challenges faced
- 6 by school districts experiencing declining enrollment. This amendment seeks to
- 7 implement a 3-year rolling average for Weighted Student Units, or WSU, to ensure
- 8 greater stability and predictability in school funding.
- 9 Weighted Student Units are an essential metric in school funding formulas designed to
- 10 reflect the varying costs of educating different student populations. Unlike Average Daily
- 11 Membership (ADM), which simply counts total enrollment, WSU assigns additional
- weight to students who require specialized programs or resources. These include
- 13 students in special education, English language learners, at-risk populations, alternative
- education programs, and even those impacted by school size. This approach ensures
- that funding is distributed more equitably and reflects the diverse needs of districts.
- 16 The proposed amendment would allow districts to calculate funding based on the
- 17 greater of a 3-year rolling average WSU or the previous year's WSU if they experienced
- a decline in ADM from the prior year. This adjustment prevents districts from
- 19 experiencing sudden reductions in funding due to enrollment declines, while still
- 20 allowing them to benefit from growth if enrollment stabilizes or increases. By applying
- 21 the current per-pupil payment to the higher of these two figures, the formula becomes
- 22 more adaptable to district realities.
- 23 Let's use Rugby as an example to illustrate how the proposed amendment would work.
- In the 2024-2025 fiscal year, Rugby's Weighted Student Units (WSU) is 642.48. In the
- 25 previous two years, Rugby's WSU was 655.77 in 2023-2024 and 642.97 in 2022-2023.
- 26 When averaged over these three years, the rolling WSU comes out to 647.07. Now, if
- 27 Rugby's projected WSU for 2025-2026 drops further to the projected 640, the funding
- 28 formula under this amendment would use the higher figure of 647.07 (the 3-year rolling
- 29 average) instead of the projected 640. This ensures the district receives funding based
- 30 on a more stable and representative figure, rather than an abrupt reduction. This
- 31 adjustment helps mitigate the financial impact of declining enrollment, allowing the
- 32 district to maintain critical programming, staffing, and resources without making
- 33 immediate and drastic cuts.
- 34 Without this adjustment, districts facing declining ADM encounter serious challenges. A
- drop in ADM leads to a loss of funding, even though fixed costs such as transportation,
- 36 facilities, and staffing remain constant. This creates a misalignment between financial

- 37 reality and community expectations. Teachers, for instance, often hear about a 3%
- increase in per-pupil funding and understandably anticipate salary or benefit increases.
- 39 However, for districts with declining ADM, those increases are absorbed by the loss of
- 40 enrollment, creating a financial disconnect. Additionally, abrupt drops in WSU force
- 41 districts to make sudden cuts to programs and staff, disrupting services and negatively
- 42 impacting student outcomes.
- 43 I reached out to Adam Tescher to request detailed information for all school districts in
- North Dakota. Using the data he provided, I created a spreadsheet to determine the
- 45 fiscal note for the previous two fiscal years, which I will share at this link. Based on my
- analysis, approximately 80 districts experienced a decline in ADM over the past two
- 47 fiscal years (FY24 and FY25). This summary highlights my findings and outlines the
- 48 potential fiscal impact if the proposed amendment had been in effect during this period.

- Based on my analysis, the fiscal impact for the previous two fiscal years would have
- 55 been \$11,590,892.

- 56 In conclusion, the proposed amendment to HB 1369 provides a practical and equitable
- 57 solution to the challenges of declining enrollment. By allowing funding to be calculated
- using the greater of a 3-year rolling WSU average or the previous year's WSU, it
- 59 ensures stability and predictability for districts while allowing them time to "right size"
- and adjust their budgets accordingly. I urge you to support this amendment and help
- build a more sustainable and equitable funding system for schools across North Dakota.

- 2 Superintendent, Bismarck Public School District.
- 3 I wish to support HB 1369 and applaud the efforts to provide substantial financial
- 4 support to your public schools to ensure every public school child in the great state
- of North Dakota is provided the educators, programs, and services they need to be
- 6 Choice Ready, graduate, and succeed.
- 7 I could provide testimony on the overall foundation payment and a desire to see the
- 8 Legislature be more supportive, but I want to share some points on the formula that
- 9 are more precise.
- 10 I would like you to consider amendments to address a rapidly growing population
- and the services they need to become productive members of our workforce. This
- consideration is for your support of English Language learners. Bismarck Public
- School, as of last Friday, had 645 enrolled EL students. EL students are put into
- levels based on their proficiency, starting with Newcomer/Level 1, up to Level 6.
- Last year, BPS saw a 73% increase in Level 1 students. This year, that increase is
- another 47% resulting in now 170 Newcomer/Level 1 students. BPS has 100 level 2
- students; the rest are level 3 or greater. You can see that 41% of our EL students are
- classified as Newcomer or Beginning.
- 19 What does that mean for our educators and students? Level 1 students commonly
- 20 have little or no English skills. They come in all shapes and sizes, from kindergarten
- to high school students. Many assume that we only need to provide translation
- through an interpreter or electronic device and we can accommodate these children
- while we teach them English. That may be some of our kids, but not all. We have
- many new students who are entering our schools as Newcomers, that are not only

- learning English but they are also learning their native language. These new students,
- 2 can speak their home language, but due to lack of schooling or other factors, they
- 3 cannot read their home language. So we are, in some cases, not only teaching these
- 4 children English but also providing support to learn their home language. Without
- 5 the ability to read their native language, even written translation becomes a
- 6 significant challenge.
- 7 What I am asking is that you consider expanding the weighting factor for EL students
- 8 to make Levels 1, 2, and 3 the same weight as Level 1 is today (.40). This would
- 9 help support the services that are being stretched in many of our districts as we
- welcome in a more diverse workforce from around the nation.
- 11 My second ask for you and the committee is to consider the impact of student
- behavioral health needs on our schools. I will not get into the stories as you have
- heard those already, but those needs are not adequately funded as many districts
- build robust systems of care for these students. In BPS, we have building-level
- interventions, additional mental health staff, and ever-expanding out-of-building
- programs such as RenewEd. Would the committee consider providing all schools
- additional funding to address these needs within the At-Risk factor in the formula.
- At the present time the factor is .025 and the number of students is determined by
- the number of students between 3<sup>rd</sup> to 8<sup>th</sup> grade that receive free or reduced-price
- 20 meals. At risk students are not just those that receive free or reduced-price meals. In
- 21 addition, in a world where fewer and fewer families are even completing those
- applications, the factor is not representing the need. Would you consider changing
- 23 this to a factor applied to our entire student population?
- 24 Thank you for considering these important aspects to the funding formula.

HB 1369 – Weighted Average Daily Membership, Dr. Marcus Lewton, Superintendent, Dickinson Public Schools.

Members of the House Education Committee,

My name is Marcus Lewton, and I am the Superintendent of Dickinson Public Schools. I am here today to testify in favor of support of HB 1369. In addition, I would like the committee to consider increasing the weighted funding measure for English Learner (EL) students. The need for enhanced support is critical as our district, along with many others in the state, have experienced a significant increase in the number of students requiring EL services.

In the fall of 2023, Dickinson Public Schools had 160 EL students. That number has now more than doubled to 329 EL students. Currently, we receive approximately \$360,000 in weighted funding from the state for EL students. However, our hard costs for EL services this year exceed \$900,000. If we were able to hire the necessary EL instructors & support staff to meet the recommendations of the North Dakota Department of Public Instruction (DPI), our costs would approach \$2 million. The gap between funding and actual needs is placing immense strain on our resources.

Our growing EL population is closely tied to our local economy. A quick survey of our Adult Education EL students revealed that many families have moved to Dickinson due to employment in the oil and construction industries. Their children, however, often face immense challenges. Many of our recently arrived EL students are classified as Level One on the state WIDA assessment. These students frequently come from backgrounds with little or no formal education. Some middle and high school students do not know how to read or write in their native language, which compounds the difficulty of teaching them English.

To illustrate the challenges, I want to share two stories from our schools. In October, I spoke with a secondary teacher who was celebrating a small but meaningful success with one of her EL students. The student was beginning to understand key English words and could complete two-digit addition and subtraction. However, the teacher explained how difficult it was to use translation devices with this student because the student's native dialect was not supported. When I suggested having the student type their questions in their own language, the teacher reminded me, "Marcus, this child doesn't know how to read or write in their own language."

Last month, I stepped in as a principal at one of our elementary schools and worked with an older elementary student who had recently been suspected of being trafficked by local law enforcement. This young girl had faced significant trauma and adverse childhood experiences. She struggled socially and academically, and when I sat down with her, it was clear she was already more than five years behind her peers. We spent time together working on basic numbers and letters. While this was a small step forward, her situation underscores the immense challenges faced by many of our EL students.

Despite these obstacles, our EL students and their families are some of the hardest-working members of our community. They take jobs that our local employers can't fill and are willing work long and hard hours. They support their teachers and want what is academically best for

their children. The high cost of providing adequate education for these students, however, is straining our district's budget. We are being forced to divert funds from other students to meet the requirements of the law.

Currently, Dickinson Public Schools has 329 EL students. Of those, 126 are identified as level One, of which 70 are newcomers. These are students who have little or no use of the English Language. As I mentioned earlier, some of them have no formal education experience. We also have 38 level Two, and 80 level three EL students, according to last years numbers. These three levels are students with the greatest need and support to help master the English language.

I'm here today to ask you to consider increasing the weighted funding factor for EL students. Please consider increasing the formula for level two and three students to the same weight at Level 1, which is .40. Doing so would provide districts like ours with the resources needed to adequately support these students and ensure their success.

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- section 15.1-29-15. The proceeds of this levy must be deposited into a special fund known as the tuition fund and used in accordance with this subsection. The proceeds may not be transferred into any other fund.

  The board of a school district may levy no more than five mills on the taxable valuation.
  - 5. The board of a school district may levy no more than five mills on the taxable valuation of the district, pursuant to section 57-15-15.1, for purposes of developing a school safety plan in accordance with section 15.1-09-60. The proceeds of this levy must be deposited into a special fund known as the school safety plan fund and used in accordance with this subsection.
  - 6. Nothing in this section limits the board of a school district from levying:
    - a. Mills for a building fund, as permitted in sections 15.1-09-49 and 57-15-16; and
    - b. Mills necessary to pay principal and interest on the bonded debt of the district, including the mills necessary to pay principal and interest on any bonded debt incurred under section 57-15-17.1 before July 1, 2013.
  - SECTION 5. TRANSFER FOUNDATION AID STABILIZATION FUND TO SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION ASSISTANCE REVOLVING LOAN FUND. The office of management and budget shall transfer the sum of \$100,000,000 from the foundation aid stabilization fund to the school construction assistance revolving loan fund during the biennium beginning July 1, 2025, and ending June 30, 2027.
- SECTION 6. EFFECTIVE DATE. Section 4 of this Act is effective for taxable years beginning after December 31, 2024.

NDCEL Testimony in favor of HB 1369 with request for amendments:

Chairman Heinert and members of the committee. I am here today in testimony of support with some requests for revision on the basis of need in this bill.

**Per Pupil Payment:** Our first request is to shift to a 4% / 4% increase in the per pupil payment. Rationale: At the last interim ed-funding meeting, it was indicated that the increased input from the Common Schools Trust Fund as well as K12 turnback from last session would result in the ability to do a 4/4 with no increased input from the general fund.

**Declining Enrollment:**We have a need to address declining enrollment that many of our districts are experiencing. To account for this we have this definition amendment request:

- 1 15.1-27-03.1. WEIGHTED AVERAGE DAILY MEMBERSHIP DETERMINATION.
  - (a) **Definition of ADM:** For the purposes of state education funding, "Average Daily Membership" (ADM) shall be defined as the total aggregate membership of students over a given period divided by the number of days in that period. It is determined to be based on on-time funding or three year rolling average or whatever is greater
- 2 (b) Three-Year Rolling Average Calculation: Notwithstanding any other provision of law, for the purpose of determining state aid, a three year rolling average shall be computed by averaging the ADM of the district for the current school year and the ADMs of the two immediately preceding school years.
  - © On-Time Funding: Notwithstanding any other provision of all, for the purpose of determining state aid, on-time funding is based on the student ADM count as of the North Dakota Department of Public Instruction Fall Enrollment Report.

**English Language Learners:** We have discussed often (and I have individuals from the field here to discuss specific school based instances) we have a tremendous need for additional funding for EL and for our at-risk student population. The proceeds of this levy must be deposited into the school district's general fund and used in accordance with this subsection. The proceeds may not be transferred into any other fund.
- The board of a school district may levy no more than twelve mills on the taxable valuation of the district, for miscellaneous purposes and expenses. The proceeds of this levy must be deposited into a special fund known as the miscellaneous fund and



- used in accordance with this subsection. The proceeds may not be transferred into
   any other fund.
  - The board of a school district may levy no more than three mills on the taxable valuation of the district for deposit into a special reserve fund, in accordance with chapter 57-19.
  - 4. The board of a school district may levy no more than the number of mills necessary, on the taxable valuation of the district, for the payment of tuition, in accordance with section 15.1-29-15. The proceeds of this levy must be deposited into a special fund known as the tuition fund and used in accordance with this subsection. The proceeds may not be transferred into any other fund.
    - 5. The board of a school district may levy no more than five mills on the taxable valuation of the district, pursuant to section 57-15-15.1, for purposes of developing a school safety plan in accordance with section 15.1-09-60. The proceeds of this levy must be deposited into a special fund known as the school safety plan fund and used in accordance with this subsection.
    - 6. Nothing in this section limits the board of a school district from levying:
      - a. Mills for a building fund, as permitted in sections 15.1-09-49 and 57-15-16; and
      - b. Mills necessary to pay principal and interest on the bonded debt of the district, including the mills necessary to pay principal and interest on any bonded debt incurred under section 57-15-17.1 before July 1, 2013.

SECTION 5. TRANSFER - FOUNDATION AID STABILIZATION FUND TO SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION ASSISTANCE REVOLVING LOAN FUND. The office of management and budget shall transfer the sum of \$100,000,000 from the foundation aid stabilization fund to the school construction assistance revolving loan fund during the biennium beginning July 1, 2025, and ending June 30, 2027.

SECTION 6. EFFECTIVE DATE. Section 4 of this Act is effective for taxable years beginning after December 31, 2024.

#### Amendment to HB 1369

**SECTION 1. AMENDMENT.** Section 15.1-27-03.1 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

15.1-27-03.1. Weighted average daily membership - Determination.

- a. **Definition of Average Daily Membership:** For the purposes of state education funding, "Average Daily Membership" (ADM) shall be defined as the total aggregate membership of students over a given period divided by the number of days in that period. It is determined to be based on on-time funding or three-year rolling average or whatever is greater
- c. Three-Year Rolling Average Calculation: Notwithstanding any other provision of law, for the purpose of determining state aid, a three-year rolling average shall be computed by averaging the Average Daily Membership (ADM) of the district for the current-school year and the Average Daily Memberships of the two limmediately preceding school years.
- c. On-Time Funding: Notwithstanding any other provision of all, for the purpose of determining state aid, on-time funding is based on the student Average Daily membership count as of the North Dakota Department of Public Instruction Fall Enrollment Report.
- <u>Section 2.</u> 1. For each school district, the superintendent of public instruction shall multiply by:
  - a.1.00 the number of full-time equivalent students enrolled in an extended educational program in accordance with section 15.1-32-17;
  - b. 0.60 the number of full-time equivalent students enrolled in a summer education program, including a migrant summer education program;

  - 6. Nothing in this section limits the board of a school district from levying:
    - a. Mills for a building fund, as permitted in sections 15.1-09-49 and 57-15-16; and
    - Mills necessary to pay principal and interest on the bonded debt of the district, including the mills necessary to pay principal and interest on any bonded debt incurred under section 57-15-17.1 before July 1, 2013.

SECTION 6. TRANSFER - FOUNDATION AID STABILIZATION FUND TO SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION ASSISTANCE REVOLVING LOAN FUND. The office of management and budget shall transfer the sum of \$100,000,000\$75,000,000 from the foundation aid stabilization fund to the school construction assistance revolving loan fund during the biennium beginning July 1, 2025, and ending June 30, 2027.

**SECTION 7. EFFECTIVE DATE.** Section 4 of this Act is effective for taxable years beginning after December 31, 2024.

- 1 HB 1369 Weighted Average Daily Membership by Dr. Jeff Fastnacht,
- 2 Superintendent, Bismarck Public School District.
- 3 Good Morning Chairman Beard, and members of the Senate Education Committee.
- 4 I stand in support of HB 1369 and applaud the efforts to provide substantial financial
- support to your public schools to ensure every public school child in the great state
- of North Dakota is provided the educators, programs, and services they need to be
- 7 Choice Ready, graduate, and succeed.
- 8 I could provide testimony on the overall foundation payment and a desire to see the
- 9 Legislature be supportive by providing a 3%-3% increase this next biennium, but I
- want to share some points on the formula that are more precise.
- I would like you to consider amendments to address a rapidly growing population
- and the services they need to become productive members of our workforce. This
- consideration is for our English Language learners. Bismarck Public School, as of
- mid-January, had 645 enrolled EL students. EL students are put into levels based on
- their proficiency, starting with Newcomer/Level 1, up to Level 6. Last year, BPS
- saw a 73% increase in Level 1 students. This year, that increase is another 47%
- resulting in now 170 Newcomer/Level 1 students. BPS has 100 level 2 students; the
- rest are level 3 or greater.
- 19 What does that mean for our educators and students? Level 1 students commonly
- 20 have little or no English skills. They come in all shapes and sizes, from kindergarten
- to high school students. Many assume that we only need to provide translation
- through an interpreter or electronic device and we can accommodate these children
- while we teach them English. That may work for some of our EL kids, but not all.

- 1 We have many Newcomers, who are not only learning English but they are also
- 2 learning their native language at the same time. These students can speak their home
- language, but due to lack of schooling or other factors, they cannot read their home
- 4 language. Without the ability to read their native home language, even written
- 5 translation becomes a significant challenge.
- I am asking that you consider expanding the weighting factor for EL students to
- 7 make Levels 2 and 3 the same weight as Level 1 is today (.40). This would help
- support the services that are being stretched in many of our districts as we welcome
- 9 in a more diverse workforce from around the nation.
- In addition to base funding at 3% and 3%, adjustments of to the EL weighting factors, I would conclude by stating I support any increase to the special education weighting factor. The state took much appreciated strides last year to increase
- funding for this population, which has resulted in more services being provided to
- our students. I will stand finally supporting a 3-year rolling average for ADM
- calculation. Having worked in the largest school in the state, and previously in one
- of the smallest, a rolling average would provide needed financial stability in our
- smallest schools.

## **HB 1369 Testimony**

Chairman Beard and Members of the Senate Education Committee, for the record my name is Brandt Dick, President of the ND Small Organized Schools. I am here today to support HB 1369, a piece of legislation that provides funding for K-12 Public Schools in the State of North Dakota.

I have handed out worksheets for Glen Ullin school district as I am working with them during the 2024-25 school year to show how SB 1369 provides support for Glen Ullin school district, and other districts that have similar stories, districts that are unfortunately seeing a decline in enrollment.

Please look at the very bottom of page 1 of the worksheet listed from the payment month of October 2024-25. You see that the preliminary numbers of anticipated revenue from the state of ND was \$1.56 million dollars. Once the final enrollment numbers were inserted, the payment month of March 2024-25 shows what Glen Ullin will receive for the 2024-25 school year, \$1.31 million, a \$250,000 decrease in revenue, due to the decrease in enrollment from 140 students used to derive the revenue in October, to the actual number of students of 135 students in March, along with decreases in transportation and a greater deduction in line 35.

The third worksheet shows how the provision in HB 1369 that allows for a three-year enrollment average would benefit Glen Ullin School District. If you look at the bottom number on page one of the Preliminary Projections House Version worksheet, one will notice the changes provided would provide an anticipated revenue of \$1.56 million, back to the preliminary numbers from this past October. The Preliminary Projections House Version also has the changes that would be made if HB 1214 and HB 1381 are passed.

Glen Ullin School Board made the decision to advertise for an elementary teacher, but not hire until the Board knows if the changes in the bills listed above are signed into law, as a \$250,000 difference in revenue is something the board will have to determine if the district can afford to hire that position, or if they will have to combine classrooms, something the community does not want to see implemented.

I urge this committee to support SB 1369 and recognize its value in funding K-12 Public School Districts. Thank you for your time and consideration. I will stand for questions.

Good morning, Chairman Beard and members of the Senate Education committee. Hello, my name is Juan, I am a 3<sup>rd</sup> grader at Wishek Public School. I came to Wishek from San Julián, Jalisco, Mexico when I was 3 years old. I want to share with you today the successes I have made at Wishek Public School.

When I first started school, I did not know any English. It was a challenging time, but also an exciting one, because I knew I was starting something new. I am so grateful to all the teachers who helped me along the way, especially Mrs. Weber, Ms. Scherbenske, and Mrs. Kuntz. Their support has made a huge difference for my sister and I as we adapted and learned English to be able to succeed and achieve personal milestones. I am now able to speak English with much more confidence.

Thanks to the teachers and staff at Wishek Public School, I was able to learn how to speak English and better understand this new place that I now call home. I do not have enough words to thank everyone for what they have done for me and my family.

Good morning, Chairman Beard and members of the Senate Education committee. Hello, my name is Regina Rodriguez Garcia. I'm from San Julián, Jalisco, México. I'm 15 years old.

When I first moved to Wishek in August 2018, I was only 8 years old and could only recognize colors and a few numbers in English. I was both excited and extremely nervous to start school as a 3rd grader. The day I walked into the classroom, I could feel all eyes on me. I felt so anxious, especially because I couldn't speak English. That's when my teacher pulled out a computer to help translate everything for me. She would speak for me as I typed out what I wanted to say. Even though I didn't understand what they were saying, thanks to my teacher and the staff at Wishek Public School, I learned English in just six months. I went from not understanding anything to being able to speak English.

All of this is thanks to the teachers I'm going to mention: Miss Scherbenske, Mrs. Kuntz, Mrs. Bettenhausen, and our principal, Miss Bosch.

I also remember how Mrs. Bettenhausen would pull me out of class to teach me English one-onone. There were times when I struggled, but I learned so much, and I will never be able to thank our school enough for all they did, not only for me but also for my brother Juan.

I also want to mention how repeating a year in 4th grade helped me tremendously. When I first got to 4th grade, I had over 25 classmates, and my teacher just couldn't give me the support I needed. That's why we made the decision for me to repeat the year, and it was so helpful. Because of that decision, I'm now an 8th grader, and I owe so much of my growth and success to the education I received at Wishek Public School.

Good morning, Chairman Beard and members of the Senate Education committee. My name is Shawn Kuntz, and I am the Superintendent of Wishek Public School District #19 in Wishek, North Dakota. Today, I will present testimony in four parts. While we advocate for public school funding, particularly in specialized areas like English Language Learner (ELL) services, our primary goal is to showcase the successes occurring in public schools throughout North Dakota.

As I mentioned earlier, the word "success" is central to my message, and I will return to it later. To begin, I would like to invite my interventionist, Ms. Kalli Scherbenske, and two of our students, to speak.

#### [Ms. Scherbenske and Regina and Juan speaks]

Now, I circle back to that important word: success. I stand before you as a proud superintendent, proud of my staff, school board, coaches, and community for the incredible successes we achieve every day—successes that extend far beyond the individual but reflect our collective efforts. Today, we demonstrated one part of public education that many people may be unaware even exists. This is a testament to the potential within every public school, and I am confident that public schools across North Dakota could share similar success stories.

Unfortunately, these successes are often overshadowed by a flawed system established 25 years ago with No Child Left Behind, a concept that I argue has roots going back even further to the early 1980s with the A Nation At Risk report that detailed the inadequate education that was taking place in public schools during the 1970's. However, today's focus is on funding.

In my district, 4% of our student population requires ELL services. With a total of 250 students, that translates to 10 students needing additional, specialized instruction, which significantly impacts our staffing needs. Currently, we receive an additional .21 adjusted daily membership (ADM) for ELL services, which, when multiplied by the school size weighting factor of 1.24, results in approximately \$2,883.15 for ELL funding. Unfortunately, this amount is insufficient given our actual needs.

Finding qualified employees in rural areas is a challenge we all understand. When we cannot hire locally, we must contract services, which comes with high costs—particularly travel fees. Moreover, the quality of services is often better when we can employ staff who are present in the building and community rather than relying on distant contractors.

We have been fortunate to have Ms. Scherbenske join our team, and her contributions exemplify the type of success we strive for.

In closing, I want to reiterate the importance of success. What we demonstrated here today—whether through ELL students, special education, or general education—occurs across every public school, and it is the essence of what we do. We educate all students with the tax dollars we receive, alongside state and federal oversight.

The achievements we celebrate today reflect a significant success for Wishek Public School and North Dakota public education. However, if you were to evaluate us solely based on test

scores—often the only metric discussed—you might not recognize this success. I urge you to consider that it may not be the schools failing, but rather the instruments we use to measure success that warrant reevaluation.

In closing, thank you for the opportunity to share our story, and for your commitment to serving the educational needs of North Dakota.

Good morning, Chairman Beard and members of the Senate Education Committee. My name is Kalli Scherbenske, and I sincerely appreciate the opportunity to speak with you today. I am here to share my testimony in support of public-school funding, particularly for English Language Learners (EL) students.

I work as an interventionist at Wishek Public School in Wishek, North Dakota, my alma mater, where I graduated from high school. This district holds a special place in my heart, and I am passionate about its future. Today, I want to share my experiences teaching English Language Learners (ELs) and highlight how crucial public funding is for schools like Wishek Public.

My teaching career began in 2018 at Bismarck Public Schools, where I spent five years as a classroom teacher. In the spring of 2023, I made the difficult decision to leave teaching and return home to help with my family's cattle ranch. At that time, I had no plans to return to the classroom. However, everything changed when I received a call from Mr. Shawn Kuntz, the superintendent at Wishek Public Schools. He asked me to apply for a position at Wishek, and while I wasn't seeking full-time teaching opportunities due to my ranching responsibilities, I agreed to take on a part-time role. Little did I know, that decision would profoundly impact both my career and my life.

I started in the fall of 2023 as an interventionist, working with a diverse group of students across multiple grade levels, including English Language Learners from kindergarten through 12th grade. At the start of the school year, this group included nine EL students, and I had the privilege of working closely with them, including students such as Regina and Juan. Although I had worked with EL students before, this was my first experience in a more individualized, one-on-one setting.

As the school year progressed, my passion for working with these students only deepened. Teaching English Language Learners is unlike any other teaching experience. Each student presents unique challenges and needs, which makes it hard to always have the right resources at hand. But the resilience these students show, overcoming daily obstacles, is nothing short of inspiring.

Having taught both in traditional classrooms and now in small-group or one-on-one settings, I've gained a deeper appreciation for the importance of specialized teachers, particularly English Language instructors. In every classroom, students have diverse strengths and weaknesses. But for EL students, particularly newcomers, the challenge is even greater. Imagine entering a classroom where you cannot communicate effectively, these students can quickly feel lost and isolated. That is why having specialized English Language teachers, whether full-time or part-time, is absolutely essential. EL students deserve the support, time, and services necessary to help them succeed academically.

One critical issue that demands attention is the disproportionate emphasis placed on state standardized tests for English Language Learners (ELs). These tests fail to capture the true depth of an EL student's progress. Their growth cannot and should not be reduced to a single test score. Real achievements occur in the day-to-day advancements that are often invisible in standardized testing. The success of EL students is not confined to the narrow window of test periods; it is

evident in their continuous development, through the steady increase in their language proficiency, the growing self-confidence they exhibit, and the new opportunities they create for themselves both academically and socially.

In March of 2024, I made the decision to further my commitment to supporting these students by applying to graduate school to pursue my Master's in TESOL (Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages). Every day, my goal is to ensure that I, along with my fellow educators, meet the individual needs of each EL student.

In closing, public-school funding is not just an investment in schools, it is an investment in the future of every student, including English Language Learners. With the right resources, training, and support, we can empower these students to thrive, not just academically, but in every aspect of their lives. Thank you for your time, and for supporting the future of our students.

#### Testimony Before the Senate Education Committee HB 1369 Monday, March 17, 2025

Chairman Beard and members of the Senate Education Committee, I am ND United president, Nick Archuleta, and I am here today to urge a *do pass* recommendation for HB 1369 and to respectfully request an amendment to HB 1369 that increases the allocation to the K-12 Funding Formula from 2 percent each year of the coming biennium to 4 percent each year of the coming biennium.

Members of the Committee, as I am sure you know, North Dakota's schools have not been immune from the inflation that has increased the cost of about everything these past few years. Inflation has driven up the costs of everything that schools need to function well. While inflation has eased, it is still at a stubborn 2.9%, and given the current state of the global economy, easing inflation is certainly not a guarantee. At the last interim education funding committee meeting, it was noted that given the increased contribution from the Common Schools Trust Fund and other factors, a 4 and 4 increase was quite doable.

Mr. Chairman, in the past 10 years, food prices are up 31.5%. Gas prices are up 43.7%. Teachers' salaries have increased just 1.68% per year from 2013-2024. I am confident that North Dakota can do better than 2 and 2 for schools and professionals who do the hard and important work of educating our future.

With that, Chairman Beard, and members of the Committee, I urge a do pass recommendation for HB 1369 and respectfully ask that you consider an amendment to increase the allocation to 4% for each year of the upcoming biennium.



#### 1 HB 1369 – The Need for Increased Per Pupil Funding, SPED, and EL Support

- 2 Chair and Members of the Committee,
- 3 I come before you today to urge this body to reconsider the proposed 2% per-pupil increase in
- 4 HB 1369 and the lack of growth in funding for Special Education (SPED) and English
- 5 Learner (EL) services. Our public schools are among the best in the nation, yet they are
- 6 operating under significant financial strain—struggling to meet the needs of students with
- 7 increasingly limited resources.

#### 8 A History of Underfunding

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- 9 In 2013, when North Dakota's school funding formula was revamped, the legislature recognized
- 10 that per-pupil funding should increase by at least 3% annually to keep pace with inflation.
- 11 Yet, the reality has been starkly different:
  - Over the past 12 years, per-pupil funding has increased by an average of only 1.85% per year—well below inflation and far from what was projected to sustain quality education.
    - Over the past 10 years, teacher salaries have grown by an average of just 1.68% per year—a rate that lags significantly behind other sectors and makes recruitment and retention an increasing challenge.
    - Meanwhile, SPED funding remains stagnant at only 35% of actual costs, and EL funding continues to be severely underfunded, leaving districts struggling to provide critical services.

#### 21 The Funding Disparity in HB 1369

- 22 While K-12 public schools are being asked to operate under a 2% per-pupil increase, the
- 23 conversation around state funding includes:
  - State employees projected to receive a 4% increase,
    - Higher education receiving a 4% increase,
  - A push to fund ESA (Education Savings Accounts) or voucher programs, which
    would direct public funds away from the 93% of North Dakota students who attend
    public schools.
- 29 If public schools receive **only 2%**—with no increase for SPED or EL—while other areas of
- 30 government and education receive **double that amount**, it sends a clear message about our
- 31 priorities. Adding to this concern, the same legislature that rejected funding for school meals
- 32 for children is now considering shifting money toward ESAs, while claiming that public
- 33 schools are not being harmed in the process. That is a difficult narrative for the voters of
- North Dakota to align with.



#### 1 The Urgent Need to Act

- 2 North Dakota's public schools have consistently delivered **outstanding results** despite these
- 3 funding constraints. We rank #2 in the nation for math achievement in grades 4 and 8 and
- 4 have demonstrated incredible innovation in education. But excellence cannot be sustained on
- 5 **inadequate funding**.

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- We cannot continue to expect great educators to remain in this profession when their pay increases lag behind other sectors year after year.
- We cannot meet the diverse needs of students if SPED and EL programs remain painfully short on funding.
- We cannot ask public schools to do more with less while simultaneously diverting public dollars elsewhere.

#### 12 A Call to Invest in Public Schools, Not Just Talk About It

- Public education is the backbone of our communities, workforce, and economy. If we believe in
- its value, we must fund it accordingly. A 2% increase simply does not reflect the reality of
- inflation or the growing needs of our students and educators.
- 16 I respectfully urge you to:
- 17 Increase the per-pupil funding beyond 2% to reflect inflationary needs.
- 18 Commit to additional funding for SPED and EL services so students receive the support
- 19 they require.
- 20 Prioritize public school investment over ESA programs that divert funds from the 93%
- 21 of students in public schools.
- Voters in North Dakota understand the value of strong public schools. They will also recognize
- 23 when the funding narrative does not align with the realities in their communities.
- 24 Thank you for your time and your commitment to North Dakota's students and educators.

# HB 1369 Testimony of Amy De Kok Senate Education Committee March 17, 2025

Chairman Beard and members of the Senate Education Committee, my name is Amy De Kok, and I am the Executive Director for the North Dakota School Boards Association (NDSBA). NDSBA represents all 168 public school districts and their governing boards. I am here in support of HB 1369 with a few additional requests. As a strong advocate for K-12 public education, NDSBA appreciates the Legislature's commitment to ensuring that all students in North Dakota receive a quality education through a well-funded and equitable school finance system. HB 1369 is a crucial piece of legislation that seeks to sustain and enhance our public education funding. While we fully support its intent, I respectfully urge the committee to consider amending the bill in the following ways:

#### **Increase Per-Pupil Payment to 4% Annually**

The current version of HB 1369 provides for a 2% increase in per-pupil funding for each year of the 2025-2027 biennium. However, given the available financial resources, I respectfully request that the committee increase the per-pupil payment by 4% each year. North Dakota has a unique opportunity to make this adjustment without requiring additional general fund dollars due to increased revenue streams:

- Higher input from the Common Schools Trust Fund provides a significant boost to education funding.
- K-12 turnback funds from last session create additional capacity to enhance per-pupil funding while maintaining fiscal responsibility.

A 4% increase would allow schools to better address inflationary pressures, attract and retain high-quality educators, and provide the necessary resources for student success.

#### **Increase EL and SPED Weighting Factors**

In addition to adjusting the per-pupil increase, I urge the committee to increase the weighting factors for English Learners (EL) and special education students in the funding formula. These student populations require additional resources and support services to ensure they receive the quality education they deserve. By adjusting these weighting factors, school districts will be better equipped to:

- Hire and retain qualified EL and SPED educators.
- Provide necessary instructional and support services.
- Address the growing demand for specialized education programs.

#### **Restore \$100 Million for School Construction Loans**

HB 1369 currently provides for a \$75 million transfer from the Foundation Aid Stabilization Fund to the School Construction Assistance Revolving Loan Fund. However, this amount was originally proposed at in the bill's initial draft. I respectfully request that the committee amend the bill to restore the full \$100 million transfer to better meet the ongoing and urgent facility needs of school districts, particularly in rural areas.

Many schools, especially in rural North Dakota, are operating in outdated or deteriorating buildings that no longer meet modern safety, efficiency, or instructional standards. Rising construction costs make it difficult for districts to finance necessary renovations or new construction. Providing low-interest loans through the School Construction Revolving Loan Fund enables districts to address these needs without placing an excessive burden on local taxpayers. Restoring the original \$100 million allocation would provide a stronger and more flexible funding source for school districts in desperate need of facility improvements.

#### Conclusion

By amending HB 1369 to: (1) increase per-pupil funding by 4% annually, (2) enhance EL and special education weighting factors, and (3) restore the full \$100 million transfer for school construction loans, the Legislature can make a lasting impact on North Dakota's public education system. These adjustments are fiscally responsible, address the real needs of our students and educators, and ensure that schools—especially in rural areas—have the resources and infrastructure necessary to provide a high-quality learning environment.

I respectfully ask for your consideration of these amendments and appreciate your dedication to the future of North Dakota's students. Thank you for your time and commitment to strengthening our public education system.

Good morning, Chairman Beard and members of the Senate Education Committee. My name is Mike McNeff, and I serve as the superintendent of Rugby Public Schools. I appreciate the opportunity to testify today in support of HB 1369. An amendment was added on the House side to include a 3-year rolling average for Average Daily Membership (ADM) to provide greater stability and predictability in school funding. I will share some information on why that is important for declining enrollment schools such as mine.

Additionally, I urge this committee to support a 3% and 3% increase in the per-pupil payment, ensuring that all school districts whether growing, stable, or declining in enrollment have the necessary resources to sustain quality education.

Importance of the 3-year rolling average for ADM:

ADM is the foundation of the school funding formula, determining the total number of students enrolled and generating per-pupil payments that fund staffing, programming, and student services. Many districts across North Dakota experience fluctuations in enrollment, which can lead to unpredictable funding levels year over year.

The amendment allows districts to calculate funding based on the greater of a 3-year rolling average ADM or the previous year's ADM if they experienced a decline in enrollment. This adjustment prevents districts from experiencing sudden reductions in funding due to enrollment declines, while still allowing them to benefit from growth if enrollment stabilizes or increases. By applying the current per-pupil payment to the higher of these two figures, the formula becomes more adaptable to district realities.

Let's use Rugby as an example to illustrate how the proposed amendment would work. In the 2025-2026 fiscal year, Rugby's projected ADM is 561.73. In the previous three years, Rugby's ADM was 581.1 in FY23, 575.21 in FY24, and 578.05 in FY25. Under the current system, funding for FY26 would be based on 561.73 ADM, reflecting the full decline in enrollment. However, with this amendment, funding would instead be calculated using the 3-year rolling average of 578.12 ADM, providing greater stability. This ensures the district receives funding based on a more stable and representative figure, rather than facing an abrupt reduction. By preventing steep, immediate cuts, this adjustment helps mitigate the financial impact of declining enrollment, allowing the district to maintain critical programming, staffing, and resources without making sudden reductions.

Without this adjustment, districts facing declining ADM encounter serious challenges. A drop in ADM leads to a loss of funding, even though fixed costs such as transportation, facilities, and staffing remain constant. This creates a misalignment between financial reality and community expectations. Teachers, for instance, often hear about a 2% increase in per-pupil funding and understandably anticipate salary or benefit increases. However, for districts with declining ADM, those increases are absorbed by enrollment losses, creating a financial disconnect. Additionally, abrupt drops in ADM force districts to make sudden cuts to programs and staff, disrupting services and negatively impacting student outcomes.

Recommendation: A 3% and 3% Increase in Per-Pupil Funding While this amendment provides stability for declining enrollment districts, it does not address the broader financial challenges facing all North Dakota schools. Rising costs due to inflation, salary competitiveness, and student service demands require additional support.

In conclusion, the 3-year rolling average ADM amendment in HB 1369 provides a necessary solution for school districts navigating declining enrollment. It stabilizes funding and allows for better long-term planning. Additionally, a 3% and 3% per-pupil increase ensures that all districts, regardless of enrollment trends, can meet the rising costs of education.

I appreciate your time and consideration and respectfully urge your support for this amendment and an increase in per-pupil funding. I am happy to answer any questions.

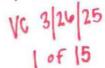

A district's baseline 13 funding consists of: 14 All state aid received by the district in accordance with chapter 15.1-27 during the 15 2018-19 school year; 16 An amount equal to the property tax deducted by the superintendent of public 17 instruction to determine the 2018-19 state aid payment; 18 An amount equal to seventy-five percent of the revenue received by the school

5	SECTION 2. AMENDMENT. Section 15.1-27-35 of the North Dakota Century Code is
6	amended and reenacted as follows:
7	15.1-27-35. Average daily membership - Calculation.
8	1. Average daily membership is calculated at the conclusion of the school year by adding
9	the total number of hours that each student in a given grade, school, or school district
10	is in attendance at the school's physical plant during a school calendar and the total
11	number of hours that each student in a given grade, school, or school district is absen
12	during a school calendar, and then dividing the sum by:
13	a. Nine hundred sixty-two and one-half hours for elementary school students; or
14	b. One thousand fifty hours for middle and high school students.
15	2. For purposes of calculating average daily membership:
16	a. A student enrolled full time in any grade from one through twelve may not exceed
17	an average daily membership of 1.00. The membership may be prorated for a
18	student who is enrolled less than full time.
19	b. A student enrolled full time in an approved regular education kindergarten
20	program may not exceed an average daily membership of 1.00. The membership
21	may be prorated for a student who is enrolled less than full time.
22	c. A student enrolled full time, as defined by the superintendent of public instruction
23	in an approved early childhood special education program may not exceed an
24	average daily membership of 1.00. The membership may be prorated for a
25	student who is enrolled less than full time.
26	d. A student enrolled full time in virtual instruction is calculated at an average daily
27	membership of 1.00. The membership may be prorated for a student who is
28	enrolled less than full time.
29	3. For purposes of determining state aid pursuant to section 15.1-27-04.1, average daily
30	membership is the greater of:
31	a. The amount calculated in subsections 1 and 2 of this section: or

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b. The average of the amounts calculated in subsections 1 and 2 of this section for the prior three years.

SECTION 2. AMENDMENT. Section 15.1-32-19 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

# 15.1-32-19. Boarding care costs - Reimbursement of school district.

The superintendent of public instruction shall reimburse a student's school district of residence an amount equal to eighty percent of the room and board costs paid by the district for a student with disabilities who is placed in a facility that is located either within or outside of the student's school district of residence in order to receive special education services. The student's school district of residence is liable for any room and board costs in excess of those reimbursed as provided in this section. The placement of a student with disabilities in a public or private facility will be made by a school district and approved by the superintendent of public instruction. The placement superintendent of a student with disabilities in congregate care will be made in a facility designated by public instruction may consult with the commissioner of the department of health and human services on congregate care facilities.

SECTION 3. AMENDMENT. Section 48-01.2-02.1 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

# 48-01.2-02.1. Public improvement construction threshold.

- The threshold for bidding construction of a public improvement is two hundred fifty thousand dollars. The threshold for procuring plans, drawings, and specifications, and bonding from an architect or engineer for construction of a public improvement is two hundred fifty thousand dollars.
- 2. Notwithstanding the thresholds in subsection 1, if the state or a political subdivision undertakes the construction of a public improvement and there is reason to believe that engineering or architectural services are necessary to protect the health, safety, or welfare of the public, the state or political subdivision shall consider consulting with an engineer or architect.

SECTION 4. AMENDMENT. Section 48-01.2-10 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

## 48-01.2-10. Bonds from contractors for public improvements.

- 1. Unless otherwise provided under this chapter, a governing body authorized to enter a contract for the construction of a public improvement in excess of two hundred fifty thousand dollars shall take from the contractor a bond before permitting any work to be done on the contract. The bond must be for an amount equal at least to the price stated in the contract. The bond must be conditioned to be void if the contractor and all subcontractors fully perform all terms, conditions, and provisions of the contract and pay all bills or claims on account of labor performed and any supplies, and materials furnished and used in the performance of the contract, including all demands of subcontractors. The requirement that bills and claims be paid must include the requirement that interest of the amount authorized under section 13-01-14 be paid on bills and claims not paid within ninety days. The bond is security for all bills, claims, and demands until fully paid, with preference to labor and material suppliers as to payment. The bond must run to the governing body, but any person having a lawful claim against the contractor or any subcontractor may sue on the bond.
- A governing body may not require any person required to provide a surety bond to obtain the surety bond from a specified insurance or surety company or insurance producer or to submit financial data to the company or producer.

**SECTION 5. AMENDMENT.** Section 57-15-14.2 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

#### 57-15-14.2. School district levies.

- 1. The board of a school district may levy a tax not exceeding the amount in dollars that the school district levied for the prior year, plus twelve percent, up to a levy of seventy mills on the taxable valuation of the district, for any purpose related to the provision of educational services. The proceeds of this levy must be deposited into the school district's general fund and used in accordance with this subsection. The proceeds may not be transferred into any other fund.
- The board of a school district may levy no more than twelve mills on the taxable valuation of the district, for miscellaneous purposes and expenses. The proceeds of this levy must be deposited into a special fund known as the miscellaneous fund and

- used in accordance with this subsection. The proceeds may not be transferred into
   any other fund.
  - The board of a school district may levy no more than three mills on the taxable valuation of the district for deposit into a special reserve fund, in accordance with chapter 57-19.
  - 4. The board of a school district may levy no more than the number of mills necessary, on the taxable valuation of the district, for the payment of tuition, in accordance with section 15.1-29-15. The proceeds of this levy must be deposited into a special fund known as the tuition fund and used in accordance with this subsection. The proceeds may not be transferred into any other fund.
  - 5. The board of a school district may levy no more than five mills on the taxable valuation of the district, pursuant to section 57-15-15.1, for purposes of developing a school safety plan in accordance with section 15.1-09-60. The proceeds of this levy must be deposited into a special fund known as the school safety plan fund and used in accordance with this subsection.
  - 6. Nothing in this section limits the board of a school district from levying:
    - a. Mills for a building fund, as permitted in sections 15.1-09-49 and 57-15-16; and
    - b. Mills necessary to pay principal and interest on the bonded debt of the district, including the mills necessary to pay principal and interest on any bonded debt incurred under section 57-15-17.1 before July 1, 2013.

# SECTION 6. TRANSFER - FOUNDATION AID STABILIZATION FUND TO SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION ASSISTANCE REVOLVING LOAN FUND. The office of management and budget shall transfer the sum of \$75,000,000 from the foundation aid stabilization fund to the school construction assistance revolving loan fund during the biennium beginning July 1, 2025, and ending June 30, 2027.

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**SECTION 7. EFFECTIVE DATE.** Section 4 of this Act is effective for taxable years beginning after December 31, 2024.

The superintendent of public instruction may consult with the commissioner of the department of health and human services on congregate care facilities. The placement of a student with disabilities in congregate care will be made in a facility designated by the department of health and human services.

SECTION 6. TRANSFER - FOUNDATION AID STABILIZATION FUND TO SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION ASSISTANCE REVOLVING LOAN FUND. The office of management and budget shall transfer the sum of \$75,000,000 from the foundation aid stabilization fund to the school construction assistance revolving loan fund during the biennium beginning July 1, 2025, and ending June 30, 2027.

**SECTION 6 7**. **EFFECTIVE DATE.** Section 4 of this Act is effective for taxable years beginning after December 31, 2024.

Subject: Request to add funding line item for low income open enrolled out-of-district at-risk students attending public schools in neighboring districts to their residential district

Honorable Members of the North Dakota State Senate Education Committee,

We are writing to urge your support for the addition of a funding line item in HB1369 to add a funding formula line item to provide financial assistance to educating districts where at least 40% of the total enrollment or two hundred or more students enrolled are low-income, open-enrolled, out-of-district, atrisk students attending from an adjacent neighboring residential school district.

Currently, school districts across North Dakota enroll out-of-district students through the open enrollment process, some are at-risk students who need additional support to succeed. While these students are welcomed into neighboring districts, the Title I funding generated by out of district students will now remain with their home district, not the district providing education. This creates a large gap in resources available to the educating districts, who are responsible for the academic success of these students.

Some of these students come from low-income households and require additional support; it is crucial that the district providing their education have adequate funding to meet their needs. Without such financial support, schools may be forced to divert resources from other programs, potentially diminishing the quality of education for all enrolled students.

By adding a line item in HB1369 to allocate funding for these students, we can ensure that such districts are properly equipped to serve all students, particularly those who are at-risk and in need of extra attention and resources. This additional funding will help bridge the gap, ensuring equitable opportunities for every student, regardless of their district of residence.

The proposed language addition is as follows:

 0.30 times the average daily membership of at-risk open-enrolled students attending a public school, where at least 40% of the total enrollment or 200 or more students are open-enrolled at-risk students from an adjacent neighboring residential school district; these open-enrolled students must be certified as eligible for free meals under the Community Eligibility Provision at the educating school.

Thank you for considering this important issue. We respectfully urge you to support this amendment to HB1369 in order to provide the necessary resources for the educational success of all North Dakota students.

The department of public instruction, center for distance education, state library, school for the deaf, and North Dakota vision services - school for the blind may not spend funds appropriated in the new and vacant FTE pool line item in section 1 of this Act, but may request the office of management and budget to transfer funds from the new and vacant FTE pool line item to the salaries and wages line item or the center for distance education line item within each respective subdivision in accordance with the guidelines and reporting provisions included in House Bill No. 1015, as approved by the sixty-ninth legislative assembly.

EXEMPTION - UNEXPENDED APPROPRIATION - STATE LIBRARY.** The sum of \$150,000, appropriated from the general fund to the state library for building renovations in subdivision 3 of section 1 of chapter 45 of the 2023 Session Laws, is not subject to the provisions of section 54-44.1-11. Any unexpended funds from this appropriation are available for building renovations during the biennium beginning July 1, 2025, and ending June 30, 2027.

SECTION 19. EXEMPTION - UNEXPENDED APPROPRIATIONS - SCHOOL FOR THE
DEAF. The sum of \$800,000, appropriated from special funds, derived from trust fund
distributions, rents, and service revenue, to the school for the deaf for boiler replacement,
pneumatic controls, and a fire alarm system in subdivision 4 of section 1 of chapter 45 of the
20 2023 Session Laws, is not subject to the provisions of section 54-44.1-11. Any unexpended
funds from this appropriation are available for boiler replacement, pneumatic controls, and a fire
alarm system during the biennium beginning July 1, 2025, and ending June 30, 2027.

**SECTION 20. STATE AID TO PUBLIC LIBRARIES.** The grants line item in subdivision 3 of section 1 of this Act includes \$1,737,582 for aid to public libraries, of which no more than one-half may be expended during the fiscal year ending June 30, 2026.

**SECTION 21. AMENDMENT.** Section 15.1-02-02 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

The bond must be conditioned to be void if the contractor and all subcontractors fully perform all terms, conditions, and provisions of the contract and pay all bills or claims on account of labor performed and any supplies, and materials furnished and used in the performance of the contract, including all demands of subcontractors. The requirement that bills and claims be paid must include the requirement that interest of the amount authorized under section 13-01-14 be paid on bills and claims not paid within ninety days. The bond is security for all bills, claims, and demands until fully paid, with preference to labor and material suppliers as to payment. The bond must run to the governing body, but any person having a lawful claim against the contractor or any subcontractor may sue on the bond.
- 2. A governing body may not require any person required to provide a surety bond to obtain the surety bond from a specified insurance or surety company or insurance producer or to submit financial data to the company or producer.

- Unless otherwise provided under this chapter, a governing body authorized to enter a contract for the construction of a public improvement in excess of two hundred fifty thousand dollars shall take from the contractor a bond before permitting any work to be done on the contract. The bond must be for an amount equal at least to the price stated in the contract. The bond must be conditioned to be void if the contractor and all subcontractors fully perform all terms, conditions, and provisions of the contract and pay all bills or claims on account of labor performed and any supplies, and materials furnished and used in the performance of the contract, including all demands of subcontractors. The requirement that bills and claims be paid must include the requirement that interest of the amount authorized under section 13-01-14 be paid on bills and claims not paid within ninety days. The bond is security for all bills, claims, and demands until fully paid, with preference to labor and material suppliers as to payment. The bond must run to the governing body, but any person having a lawful claim against the contractor or any subcontractor may sue on the bond.
- A governing body may not require any person required to provide a surety bond to obtain the surety bond from a specified insurance or surety company or insurance producer or to submit financial data to the company or producer.

**SECTION 5. AMENDMENT.** Section 57-15-14.2 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

    - b. Mills necessary to pay principal and interest on the bonded debt of the district, including the mills necessary to pay principal and interest on any bonded debt incurred under section 57-15-17.1 before July 1, 2013.

# SECTION 6. TRANSFER - FOUNDATION AID STABILIZATION FUND TO SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION ASSISTANCE REVOLVING LOAN FUND. The office of management and budget shall transfer the sum of \$75,000,000\$100,000,000 from the foundation aid stabilization fund to the school construction assistance revolving loan fund during the biennium beginning July 1, 2025, and ending June 30, 2027.

**SECTION 7. EFFECTIVE DATE.** Section 45 of this Act is effective for taxable years beginning after December 31, 2024.

The requirement that bills and claims be paid must include the requirement that interest of the amount authorized under section 13-01-14 be paid on bills and claims not paid within ninety days. The bond is security for all bills, claims, and demands until fully paid, with preference to labor and material suppliers as to payment. The bond must run to the governing body, but any person having a lawful claim against the contractor or any subcontractor may sue on the bond.
- A governing body may not require any person required to provide a surety bond to obtain the surety bond from a specified insurance or surety company or insurance producer or to submit financial data to the company or producer.

In place of amendment (25.0716.04003) adopted by the Senate, Reengrossed House Bill No. 1369 is amended by amendment (25.0716.04007) as follows:

SECTION 2. AMENDMENT. Section 15.1-32-19 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

15.1-32-19. Boarding care costs - Reimbursement of school district.

The superintendent of public instruction shall reimburse a student's school district of residence an amount equal to eighty percent of the room and board costs paid by the district for a student with disabilities who is placed in a facility that is located either within or outside of the student's school district of residence in order to receive special education services. The student's school district of residence is liable for any room and board costs in excess of those reimbursed as provided in this section. The placement of a student with disabilities in a public or private facility will be made by a school district and approved by the superintendent of public instruction. The placement superintendent of a student with disabilities in congregate care will be made in a facility designated bypublic instruction may consult with the commissioner of the department of health and human services on congregate care facilities.

SECTION 3. AMENDMENT. Section 15.1-36-02 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

15.1-36-02. Coal development trust fund - Board of university and school lands -School construction projects - Unanticipated construction projects and emergency repairs - Loans.

- Up to sixty million dollars from the coal development trust fund is available to the board of university and school lands for loans under this section.
- To be eligible for a loan under this section, the school district must demonstrate a need based on an unanticipated construction project, an unanticipated replacement project, an emergency repair, or a legislatively defined condition, and the board of a school district shall:
  - Obtain the approval of the superintendent of public instruction for the construction project under section 15.1-36-01; and

- c. If a loan made to a school district is payable solely from the district's allocation of the oil and gas gross production tax in accordance with section 57-51-15, the terms of the loan must require the state treasurer withhold the dollar amount or percentage specified in the loan agreement, from each of the district's oil and gas gross production tax allocations, in order to repay the principal and interest of the evidence of indebtedness. The state treasurer shall deposit the amount withheld into the fund from which the loan originated.
- d. Any evidence of indebtedness executed by the board of a school district under this subsection is a negotiable instrument and not subject to taxation by the state or any political subdivision of the state.
- 6. For purposes of this section, a "construction project" means the purchase, lease, erection, or improvement of any structure or facility by a school board, provided the acquisition or activity is within a school board's authority.

**SECTION 4. AMENDMENT.** Section 15.1-36-08 of the North Dakota Century Code as amended by section 1 of Senate Bill No. 2149, as approved by the sixty-ninth legislative assembly, is amended and reenacted as follows:

# 15.1-36-08. School construction assistance revolving loan fund - Bank of North Dakota - School construction projects - Continuing appropriation.

- The school construction assistance revolving loan fund is a special revolving loan fund administered by the Bank. The fund consists of all moneys appropriated or transferred to the fund by the legislative assembly, all interest or other earnings of the fund, and all repayments of loans made from the fund.
- Moneys in the fund, interest upon the moneys in the fund, and payments to the fund of principal and interest are appropriated to the Bank on a continuing basis for the purpose of providing low-interest school construction loans and for paying administrative costs, in accordance with this section.

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- 3. For a school construction project not located on an air force base, to be eligible for a loan under this section, the board of a school district shall:
  - Propose a new construction or remodeling project with a cost of at least one million dollars and an expected utilization of at least thirty years;
  - Obtain the approval of the superintendent of public instruction for the project under section 15.1-36-01;
  - c. (1) Publish in the official newspaper of the district the information regarding the proposed estimated additional millage and the dollar increase per one thousand dollars of taxable valuation in accordance with section 21-03-13 along with the notice of the election in accordance with section 21-03-12 or along with the initial resolution in accordance with subsection 7 of section 21-03-07; and
    - (2) Post the information on the school district's website before the date of the election or during the protest period in accordance with chapter 21-03;
  - d. Receive authorization for a bond issue in accordance with chapter 21-03; and
  - e. Submit a completed application to the Bank.
- 4. For a school construction project located on an air force base, to be eligible for a loan under this section, the board of the school district shall:
  - a. Propose a new construction or remodeling project on an air force base which has a cost of at least one million dollars and an expected utilization of at least thirty years;
  - b. Obtain the approval of the superintendent of public instruction for the project under section 15.1-36-01;
  - Obtain all necessary federal authorizations and funding commitments for the project; and
  - d. Submit a completed application to the Bank.
- 5. The superintendent of public instruction shall designate, until June 30, 2027, or until a loan is made as identified in this section, twenty million dollars of funds available for loans in the school construction assistance revolving loan fund for a loan to provide matching funds for the construction of facilities on an air force base.

1 -The superintendent of public instruction shall review loan applications based on a 2 prioritization system that includes a review of all applications filed during the 3 twelve-month period preceding April first and gives consideration to: 4 Student occupancy and academic needs in the district: 5 b. The age of existing structures to be replaced or remodeled; 6 C. Building design proposals that are based on safety and vulnerability 7 assessments; 8 d. Community support; 9 e. Cost; and 10 f. Any other criteria established by the superintendent of public instruction, after 11 consultation with an interim committee appointed by the legislative management. 12 If the superintendent of public instruction approves the loan, the Bank shall issue a 7.6. 13 loan from the school construction assistance revolving loan fund. For a loan made 14 under this section: 15 If the school construction project totals less than seventy-five million dollars, the 16 maximum loan amount for which a school district may qualify is fifteen million ten 17 million dollars. However, if a school district's unobligated general fund balance on 18 the preceding June thirtieth exceeds the limitation under section 15.1-27-35.3. 19 the loan amount under this section may not exceed eighty percent of the project's 20 cost up to a maximum loan amount of twelve million eight million dollars: 21 If the school construction project totals seventy-five million dollars or more, the b. 22 maximum loan amount for which a school district may qualify is thirty 23 million twenty million dollars. However, if a school district's unobligated general 24 fund balance on the preceding June thirtieth exceeds the limitation under section 25 15.1-27-35.3, the loan amount under this section may not exceed eighty percent 26 of the project's cost up to a maximum loan amount of twenty-four millionsixteen 27 million dollars; 28 If the school construction project is on an air force base, the maximum loan 29 amount for which the school district may qualify is the lesser of twenty percent of 30 the project cost or twenty million dollars;

- d. The term of the loan is twenty years, unless the board of the school district requests a shorter term in the written loan application; and
- e. The interest rate of the loan may not exceed two percent per year.
- f. A district with a school construction loan secured on the open bond market may apply to refinance the loan when callable with the school construction assistance revolving loan fund under this subsection.
- 8.7. The Bank may adopt policies and establish guidelines to administer this loan program in accordance with this section. The Bank may use a portion of the interest paid on the outstanding loans as a servicing fee to pay for administration costs which may not exceed one-half of one percent of the amount of the interest payment. The Bank shall deposit principal and interest payments made by school districts for loans under this section in the school construction assistance revolving loan fund. The fund must be audited annually pursuant to section 6-09-29, and the cost of the audit must be paid from the fund.

**SECTION 5. AMENDMENT.** Section 48-01.2-02.1 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

### 48-01.2-02.1. Public improvement construction threshold.

- The threshold for bidding construction of a public improvement is two hundred <u>fifty</u> thousand dollars. The threshold for procuring plans, drawings, and specifications, and <u>bonding</u> from an architect or engineer for construction of a public improvement is two hundred <u>fifty</u> thousand dollars.
- Notwithstanding the thresholds in subsection 1, if the state or a political subdivision
  undertakes the construction of a public improvement and there is reason to believe
  that engineering or architectural services are necessary to protect the health, safety, or
  welfare of the public, the state or political subdivision shall consider consulting with an
  engineer or architect.

**SECTION 6. AMENDMENT.** Section 48-01.2-10 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

#### 48-01.2-10. Bonds from contractors for public improvements.

 Unless otherwise provided under this chapter, a governing body authorized to enter a contract for the construction of a public improvement in excess of two hundred fifty

thousand dollars shall take from the contractor a bond before permitting any work to be done on the contract. The bond must be for an amount equal at least to the price stated in the contract. The bond must be conditioned to be void if the contractor and all subcontractors fully perform all terms, conditions, and provisions of the contract and pay all bills or claims on account of labor performed and any supplies, and materials furnished and used in the performance of the contract, including all demands of subcontractors. The requirement that bills and claims be paid must include the requirement that interest of the amount authorized under section 13-01-14 be paid on bills and claims not paid within ninety days. The bond is security for all bills, claims, and demands until fully paid, with preference to labor and material suppliers as to payment. The bond must run to the governing body, but any person having a lawful claim against the contractor or any subcontractor may sue on the bond.

 A governing body may not require any person required to provide a surety bond to obtain the surety bond from a specified insurance or surety company or insurance producer or to submit financial data to the company or producer.

**SECTION 7. AMENDMENT.** Section 57-15-14.2 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

#### 57-15-14.2. School district levies.

- 1. The board of a school district may levy a tax not exceeding the amount in dollars that the school district levied for the prior year, plus twelve percent, up to a levy of seventy mills on the taxable valuation of the district, for any purpose related to the provision of educational services. The proceeds of this levy must be deposited into the school district's general fund and used in accordance with this subsection. The proceeds may not be transferred into any other fund.
- 2. The board of a school district may levy no more than twelve mills on the taxable valuation of the district, for miscellaneous purposes and expenses. The proceeds of this levy must be deposited into a special fund known as the miscellaneous fund and used in accordance with this subsection. The proceeds may not be transferred into any other fund.

- The board of a school district may levy no more than three mills on the taxable valuation of the district for deposit into a special reserve fund, in accordance with chapter 57-19.
- 4. The board of a school district may levy no more than the number of mills necessary, on the taxable valuation of the district, for the payment of tuition, in accordance with section 15.1-29-15. The proceeds of this levy must be deposited into a special fund known as the tuition fund and used in accordance with this subsection. The proceeds may not be transferred into any other fund.
- 5. The board of a school district may levy no more than five mills on the taxable valuation of the district, pursuant to section 57-15-15.1, for purposes of developing a school safety plan in accordance with section 15.1-09-60. The proceeds of this levy must be deposited into a special fund known as the school safety plan fund and used in accordance with this subsection.
- Nothing in this section limits the board of a school district from levying:
  - a. Mills for a building fund, as permitted in sections 15.1-09-49 and 57-15-16; and
  - b. Mills necessary to pay principal and interest on the bonded debt of the district, including the mills necessary to pay principal and interest on any bonded debt incurred under section 57-15-17.1 before July 1, 2013.

SECTION 7. TRANSFER - FOUNDATION AID STABILIZATION FUND TO SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION ASSISTANCE REVOLVING LOAN FUND. The office of management and budget shall transfer the sum of \$75,000,000 from the foundation aid stabilization fund to the school construction assistance revolving loan fund during the biennium beginning July 1, 2025, and ending June 30, 2027.

**SECTION 8. EFFECTIVE DATE.** Section 47 of this Act is effective for taxable years beginning after December 31, 2024. Sections 1, 2, 5, and 6 of this Act are effective July 1, 2025.

SECTION 9. EMERGENCY. This Act is declared to be an emergency measure.

- The interest rate of the loan may not exceed two percent per year. e.
- f. A district with a school construction loan secured on the open bond market may apply to refinance the loan when callable with the school construction assistance revolving loan fund under this subsection.
- The Bank may adopt policies and establish guidelines to administer this loan program in accordance with this section. The Bank may use a portion of the interest paid on the outstanding loans as a servicing fee to pay for administration costs which may not exceed one-half of one percent of the amount of the interest payment. The Bank shall deposit principal and interest payments made by school districts for loans under this section in the school construction assistance revolving loan fund. The fund must be audited annually pursuant to section 6-09-29, and the cost of the audit must be paid from the fund.

SECTION 5. AMENDMENT. Section 48-01.2-02.1 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

## 48-01.2-02.1. Public improvement construction threshold.

- The threshold for bidding construction of a public improvement is two hundred fifty thousand dollars. The threshold for procuring plans, drawings, and specifications, and bending from an architect or engineer for construction of a public improvement is two hundred fifty thousand dollars.
- 2. Notwithstanding the thresholds in subsection 1, if the state or a political subdivision undertakes the construction of a public improvement and there is reason to believe that engineering or architectural services are necessary to protect the health, safety, or welfare of the public, the state or political subdivision shall consider consulting with an engineer or architect.

SECTION 6. AMENDMENT. Section 48-01.2-10 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

## 48-01.2-10. Bonds from contractors for public improvements.

Unless otherwise provided under this chapter, a governing body authorized to enter a contract for the construction of a public improvement in excess of two hundred fifty

thousand dollars shall take from the contractor a bond before permitting any work to be done on the contract. The bond must be for an amount equal at least to the price stated in the contract. The bond must be conditioned to be void if the contractor and all subcontractors fully perform all terms, conditions, and provisions of the contract and pay all bills or claims on account of labor performed and any supplies, and materials furnished and used in the performance of the contract, including all demands of subcontractors. The requirement that bills and claims be paid must include the requirement that interest of the amount authorized under section 13-01-14 be paid on bills and claims not paid within ninety days. The bond is security for all bills, claims, and demands until fully paid, with preference to labor and material suppliers as to payment. The bond must run to the governing body, but any person having a lawful claim against the contractor or any subcontractor may sue on the bond.

 A governing body may not require any person required to provide a surety bond to obtain the surety bond from a specified insurance or surety company or insurance producer or to submit financial data to the company or producer.

**SECTION 7. AMENDMENT.** Section 57-15-14.2 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

#### 57-15-14.2. School district levies.

- 1. The board of a school district may levy a tax not exceeding the amount in dollars that the school district levied for the prior year, plus twelve percent, up to a levy of seventy mills on the taxable valuation of the district, for any purpose related to the provision of educational services. The proceeds of this levy must be deposited into the school district's general fund and used in accordance with this subsection. The proceeds may not be transferred into any other fund.
- 2. The board of a school district may levy no more than twelve mills on the taxable valuation of the district, for miscellaneous purposes and expenses. The proceeds of this levy must be deposited into a special fund known as the miscellaneous fund and used in accordance with this subsection. The proceeds may not be transferred into any other fund.

- The board of a school district may levy no more than three mills on the taxable valuation of the district for deposit into a special reserve fund, in accordance with chapter 57-19.
  - 4. The board of a school district may levy no more than the number of mills necessary, on the taxable valuation of the district, for the payment of tuition, in accordance with section 15.1-29-15. The proceeds of this levy must be deposited into a special fund known as the tuition fund and used in accordance with this subsection. The proceeds may not be transferred into any other fund.
  - 5. The board of a school district may levy no more than five mills on the taxable valuation of the district, pursuant to section 57-15-15.1, for purposes of developing a school safety plan in accordance with section 15.1-09-60. The proceeds of this levy must be deposited into a special fund known as the school safety plan fund and used in accordance with this subsection.
  - 6. Nothing in this section limits the board of a school district from levying:
    - a. Mills for a building fund, as permitted in sections 15.1-09-49 and 57-15-16; and
    - b. Mills necessary to pay principal and interest on the bonded debt of the district, including the mills necessary to pay principal and interest on any bonded debt incurred under section 57-15-17.1 before July 1, 2013.

SECTION 7. TRANSFER - FOUNDATION AID STABILIZATION FUND TO SCHOOL

CONSTRUCTION ASSISTANCE REVOLVING LOAN FUND. The office of management and budget shall transfer the sum of \$75,000,000 from the foundation aid stabilization fund to the school construction assistance revolving loan fund during the biennium beginning July 1, 2025, and ending June 30, 2027.

**SECTION 8. EFFECTIVE DATE.** Section 47 of this Act is effective for taxable years beginning after December 31, 2024. Sections 1, 2, 5, and 6 of this Act are effective July 1, 2025.

**SECTION 9. EMERGENCY.** This Act is declared to be an emergency measure.
