House Bill No. 1404 provides updates to the North Dakota scholarship.

To summarize, the bill adds the following options for students meeting the indicators to qualify for the North Dakota Scholarship:

- In the Postsecondary Ready pathway, it provides students with the option of earning a score equivalent to a 24 on the ACT on the new NDA+ Assessment, which could then be used in place of receiving a score of 24 on the ACT.
- In the Workforce Ready pathway, it provides students with the option of earning a score equivalent to a 24 on the ACT on the new NDA+ Assessment, which could then be used in place of receiving a score of 24 on the ACT, the same as it would in the Postsecondary Ready section.
- The bill draft also removes some soon-to-be obsolete language in the Workforce Ready
 pathway relating to the ACT test that was used for accountability. Students will no longer
 have this option, as after this year's seniors graduate, there will be no more students that
 would have taken the ACT for accountability. Fortunately, students going forward will have
 the possibility of meeting this indicator by scoring proficient or better on the new NDA+
 exam.
- The bill draft also includes the option of completing two credits of a military coursework
 pathway as an additional option to be used for the additional indicators of the military ready
 pathway.

Testimony on House Bill 1404 Presented by Kaitlyn Allen, Director of Curriculum, NDCDE January 29, 2025

Chairman Heinert, members of the committee, thank you for the opportunity to speak before you today. My name is Kaitlyn Allen, and I serve as the Director of Curriculum at the North Dakota Center for Distance Education (NDCDE). I am here to provide testimony regarding House Bill 1404, specifically addressing the changes outlined on page 4 of the bill.

Traditionally, the North Dakota scholarship has aligned with the Choice Ready framework, ensuring students are prepared for post-secondary education, the workforce, or the military. The recent update from the ESSA Committee has formally incorporated the Military Pathway into this framework, providing students with a structured and high-quality option for pursuing careers in military service. My role today is to outline what this program will look like, ensuring a clear understanding of its quality, scope, and the benefits it provides to students and the state.

Overview of the Military Pathway Program

The Military Pathway Program allows students to complete two units within an approved sequence of courses designed to support their preparation for military service. These courses provide foundational knowledge, skill-building, and real-world applications aligned with military expectations. By completing these courses, students will develop critical skills in leadership, physical fitness, problem-solving, and career planning, all of which are essential for success in both military and civilian careers. The Military Pathway Program allows students to complete two units within an approved sequence of courses that support their preparation for military service. These courses include:

• Introduction to Military Careers – Provides an overview of military branches, career pathways, rank structures, and core responsibilities of service members.

Students explore the values, traditions, and leadership expectations within military environments. **What students gain:** A foundational understanding of military culture, career options, and expectations, helping them make informed decisions about military service.

- ASVAB Essentials: Skills for Military Success (Prerequisite: Introduction to Military Careers) – Prepares students for the ASVAB exam by strengthening skills in arithmetic reasoning, word knowledge, paragraph comprehension, and mechanical understanding. Success in this course helps students meet enlistment qualification requirements. What students gain: Improved testtaking strategies and subject-matter expertise that enhance their ability to achieve qualifying ASVAB scores for military enlistment. (Prerequisite: Introduction to Military Careers)
- Military Health & Fitness Covers physical fitness standards required for
 military service, including strength training, endurance exercises, and mental
 resilience. Students learn about the importance of nutrition, injury prevention,
 and military fitness assessments. What students gain: Physical conditioning,
 self-discipline, and resilience, ensuring they meet or exceed the physical
 readiness standards for military service.
- Career Foundations in Military Leadership (Prerequisite: ASVAB Essentials) –
 Focuses on leadership principles, teamwork, and ethical decision-making in
 military contexts. Students engage in scenarios that build communication,
 discipline, and problem-solving skills necessary for leadership roles. What
 students gain: Strong leadership, teamwork, and problem-solving abilities that
 prepare them for leadership roles within the military and beyond. (Prerequisite:
 ASVAB Essentials)
- Military Leadership Capstone (Prerequisite: Completion of three other Military Pathway courses) A culminating experience where students apply learned concepts through project-based activities, job shadowing, or mentorship with military personnel. This course provides hands-on insights into leadership responsibilities and career readiness in military service. What students gain: Practical experience and professional networking opportunities that enhance their readiness for military service and career advancement. (Prerequisite: Completion of three other Military Pathway courses)

These courses provide students with foundational knowledge of military structure, leadership, physical fitness, and career planning. The curriculum is designed in partnership with the North Dakota National Guard, ensuring that students gain real-world insights and preparation aligned with military expectations.

Current Implementation & Enrollment Capacity

- The **first course** in the Military Pathway Program has already launched, with 36 enrollments demonstrating student interest.
- Subject to NDCDE receiving its appropriations request the program has the
 capacity to support up to 1,500 enrollments at no cost to students or schools,
 ensuring accessibility and equity in military career preparation.

Key Benefits & Addressing Common Questions

1. Why offer a scholarship if students already receive financial benefits from the Guard?

- a. This program ensures that students who wish to pursue post-secondary education have a clear pathway to do so, whether they choose to enlist or seek further education. The scholarship provides flexibility in career planning and ensures multiple opportunities for student success.
- 2. What recruitment strategies will be used to engage students in the program?
 - a. We are finalizing a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the North
 Dakota National Guard to align recruitment efforts.
 - b. We will utilize similar pathways that the Guard already uses for recruitment, ensuring seamless access to interested students.
 - c. We will leverage our partnerships with public schools to increase awareness, especially among counselors.


3. How does this program align with broader education and workforce goals?

- a. One of the challenges that the military has cited with recruitment is "limited familiarity with the military in the general population"--this program allows students to gain this awareness.
- The curriculum is developed in-house, as no comparable program currently exists. This ensures North Dakota remains at the forefront of military career education.
- c. We have aligned program standards with DPI and military requirements, and we are working closely with the Education Standards and Practice Board (ESPB) to ensure quality instruction and teacher recruitment.

Conclusion

House Bill 1404 represents a critical step in expanding educational and career opportunities for North Dakota students. By formally integrating the Military Pathway into the Choice Ready framework, we are providing students with a clear, structured pathway toward military service, leadership development, and long-term career success. I urge you to support this bill to ensure North Dakota remains a leader in preparing students for military and workforce readiness.

Program's Mission

The Virtual Military Pathway Program is designed to prepare students for careers in military service and fulfill requirements under the North Dakota Choice-Ready Framework. With the recent ESSA Committee update, this program now fully integrates into the Choice Ready framework to support scholarship eligibility. The program provides structured, high-quality courses that enhance students' knowledge and skills in military-related areas, preparing them for future careers.



The North Dakota National Guard has been a key partner in the development of the Military Pathway Program. Their involvement includes:

- **Standards Review:** Providing expertise to ensure program standards align with real-world military expectations and career readiness goals.
- Course Development Support: Assisting with course content reviews to maintain relevance and accuracy in military education.
- Learning Coach Roles: The Guard will be Serving as mentors and learning coaches, offering guidance, support, and real-world insights to students pursuing the Military Pathway.

This collaboration ensures the program equips students with the knowledge, skills, and experiences needed to succeed in military service and beyond.


The program is wellprepared to support up to 1,500 enrollments at no cost* to students or schools. Through strategic marketing and partnerships, we aim to fully subsidize this number.

Chairman Heinert and Members of the Committee:

My name is Jim Upgren, Legislative Liaison and Assistant Director in the Office of School Approval and Opportunity with the Department of Public Instruction. I am here on behalf of the department to speak in support of HB 1404.

The North Dakota Scholarship is a \$6000 college scholarship awarded to students based on requirements met while in high school. Any student that meets all the requirements of the scholarship gets a scholarship, regardless of how many students qualify. The North Dakota Scholarship requirements are aligned with North Dakota's Choice Ready high school accountability and quality metrics, but they are written with rigorous expectations above and beyond what is required for the basic Choice Ready baseline graduation requirements. Every student that qualifies for the scholarship will graduate Choice Ready, but not necessarily every student that graduates Choice Ready will qualify for the scholarship.

We created the North Dakota Scholarship chart because this is the best way to illustrate the scholarship requirements for schools, students, and parents, and I have

included a copy of the chart with my testimony for your reference. To have a chance to qualify for the scholarship, students must first meet four of the eight Essential Skills at the top of the chart in the yellow section. At the bottom of the chart are three pathways in blue: Post-Secondary Ready (on the left), Workforce Ready (in the middle), and Military Ready (on the right). Students who have a 3.0 grade-point-average and have met the Essentials Skills section at the top of the chart, and then meet the requirements of at least two of the three pathways at the bottom of the chart qualify for the North Dakota Scholarship.

HB 1404 creates two additional options for students to meet the indicators of the ND Scholarship. The first of those options would allow students to substitute an equivalent score on the new NDA+ summative assessment for the testing requirement in the Postsecondary and Workforce Ready pathways. The second option creates a pathway of military courses that can be used in the Military Ready pathway. I will begin by talking about the option for the NDA+ summative assessment.

The Postsecondary Ready pathway currently requires students to have either an ACT score of 24 or higher or an SAT score of 1180 or higher, and the Workforce Ready pathway requires an ACT of 24, SAT of 1180, or scores of 5 or higher on each of the three WorkKeys assessments (Applied Math, Graphic Literacy, Workplace Documents). HB 1404 would allow our new summative accountability assessment, the North Dakota Academic Progression of Learning and Understanding of Students

(abbreviated as NDAPLUS, or NDA+) to meet this requirement if the student receives a scale score of equal or greater academic rigor to a 24 on the ACT. This can be found on page 1, lines 9 through 12 for the Postsecondary Ready pathway, and on page 2, lines 18 through 21 for the Workforce Ready pathway. Because this is the first school year in which the NDA+ summative assessment will be given, we do not yet know what that equivalent scale score will be, and this process will take a year or two. Stan Schauer, the director in our Office of Assessment, is present today and can answer any questions specific to the NDA+ or the procedure for determining an NDA+ summative assessment scale score that is of equivalent academic rigor to a 24 on the ACT.


The Military Ready pathway currently requires an ASVAB score of 50 or higher, a C or better in the required PE course, and two indicators from either the Postsecondary or Workforce Ready pathways. HB 1404 would allow a pathway of military courses to substitute for the requirement of having two indicators from the other two pathways. This can be found on page 4, lines 2 through 7. To meet the requirements of the military coursework pathway, a student would need to earn two credits from any combination of Introduction to Military Careers, ASVAB Essentials: Skills to Military Success, Military Health and Fitness, Career Foundations in Military Leadership, and Military Leadership Capstone. The North Dakota Center for Distance Education has begun to offer the first of these courses, and they were also recently added as an option under the Military Ready pathway for Choice Ready. This pathway

is an excellent way for students to learn more about the military and decide whether to pursue a career in the military.

One other thing that the bill does is that it removes some obsolete language regarding the ACT when used for accountability. One of the options students have for additional indicators under the Workforce Ready pathway is scoring proficient or better in both reading and math on the state's annual accountability assessment. Prior to the 2024-2025 school year, schools had the option to use the ACT as its accountability assessment. However, starting with the 2024-2025 school year, all students will take the new NDA+ summative assessment in tenth grade as the annual accountability assessment. Because the last cohort of students to take the ACT for accountability were juniors last year, the Class of 2025 would be the last class that could possibly use the ACT for accountability as one of its indicators. Therefore, the bill strikes language on page 3, lines 14 through 16, related to the use of the ACT for accountability, and this would take effect starting with the 2025-2026 school year.

NDDPI fully supports HB 1404 to allow students additional options that are the same level of rigor as the options currently available to qualify for the ND Scholarship. I request that the committee give HB 1404 a "Do Pass" recommendation.

Introduction and Testimony -- Cynthia Schreiber-Beck, District 25

House Bill No. 1404 provides updates to the North Dakota scholarship.

To summarize, the bill adds the following options for students meeting the indicators to qualify for the North Dakota Scholarship:

- In the Postsecondary Ready pathway, it provides students with the option of earning a score equivalent to a 24 on the ACT on the new NDA+ Assessment, which could then be used in place of receiving a score of 24 on the ACT.
- 2. In the Workforce Ready pathway, it provides students with the option of earning a score equivalent to a 24 on the ACT on the new NDA+ Assessment, which could then be used in place of receiving a score of 24 on the ACT, the same as it would in the Postsecondary Ready section.
- 3. The bill draft also removes soon-to-be obsolete language in the Workforce Ready pathway relating to the ACT test that was used for accountability. Students will no longer have this option, as after this year's seniors graduate, there will be no more students that would have taken the ACT for accountability. Fortunately, students going forward will have the possibility of meeting this indicator by scoring proficient or better on the new NDA+ exam.
- 4. The bill draft also includes the option of completing two credits of a military coursework pathway as an additional option to be used for the additional indicators of the military ready pathway.

Chairman Beard and Members of the Committee:

My name is Jim Upgren, Legislative Liaison and Assistant Director in the Office of School Approval and Opportunity with the Department of Public Instruction. I am here on behalf of the department to speak in support of HB 1404.

The North Dakota Scholarship is a \$6000 college scholarship awarded to students based on requirements met while in high school. Any student that meets all the requirements of the scholarship gets a scholarship, regardless of how many students qualify. The North Dakota Scholarship requirements are aligned with North Dakota's Choice Ready high school accountability and quality metrics, but they are written with rigorous expectations above and beyond what is required for the basic Choice Ready baseline graduation requirements. Every student that qualifies for the scholarship will graduate Choice Ready, but not necessarily every student that graduates Choice Ready will qualify for the scholarship.

We created the North Dakota Scholarship chart because this is the best way to illustrate the scholarship requirements for schools, students, and parents, and I have

included a copy of the chart with my testimony for your reference. To have a chance to qualify for the scholarship, students must first meet four of the eight Essential Skills at the top of the chart in the yellow section. At the bottom of the chart are three pathways in blue: Post-Secondary Ready (on the left), Workforce Ready (in the middle), and Military Ready (on the right). Students who have a 3.0 grade-point-average and have met the Essentials Skills section at the top of the chart, and then meet the requirements of at least two of the three pathways at the bottom of the chart qualify for the North Dakota Scholarship.

HB 1404 creates two additional options for students to meet the indicators of the ND Scholarship. The first of those options would allow students to substitute an equivalent score on the new NDA+ summative assessment for the testing requirement in the Postsecondary and Workforce Ready pathways. The second option creates a pathway of military courses that can be used in the Military Ready pathway. I will begin by talking about the option for the NDA+ summative assessment.

The Postsecondary Ready pathway currently requires students to have either an ACT score of 24 or higher or an SAT score of 1180 or higher, and the Workforce Ready pathway requires an ACT of 24, SAT of 1180, or scores of 5 or higher on each of the three WorkKeys assessments (Applied Math, Graphic Literacy, Workplace Documents). HB 1404 would allow our new summative accountability assessment, the North Dakota Academic Progression of Learning and Understanding of Students

(abbreviated as NDAPLUS, or NDA+) to meet this requirement if the student receives a scale score of equal or greater academic rigor to a 24 on the ACT. This can be found on page 1, lines 9 through 12 for the Postsecondary Ready pathway, and on page 2, lines 18 through 21 for the Workforce Ready pathway. Testimony on House Bill 1404 Presented by Kaitlyn Allen, Director of Curriculum, NDCDE March 12, 2025

Chair Beard, members of the committee, thank you for the opportunity to speak before you today. My name is Kaitlyn Allen, and I serve as the Director of Curriculum at the North Dakota Center for Distance Education (NDCDE). I am here to provide testimony regarding House Bill 1404 and to highlight the importance of this legislation in furthering military career readiness opportunities for North Dakota students.

Traditionally, the North Dakota scholarship has aligned with the Choice Ready framework, ensuring students are prepared for post-secondary education, the workforce, or the military. The recent update from the ESSA Committee has formally incorporated the Military Pathway into this framework, providing students with a structured and high-quality option for pursuing careers in military service. My role today is to outline what this program will look like, ensuring a clear understanding of its quality, scope, and the benefits it provides to students and the state.

Context and Development of the Military Preparation Program

The foundation for this initiative began with North Dakota's Choice Ready framework, which ensures that students graduate with a well-defined path toward post-secondary education, the workforce, or military service. As part of our ongoing commitment to expanding student options, we explored models in other states and identified Virtual Arkansas' Military Preparation Program as an innovative approach that could serve as a reference point. Inspired by this program, we developed North Dakota's own Military Preparation Program to provide a structured, high-quality curriculum that prepares students for military careers while integrating with existing Choice Ready indicators.

This program was built in collaboration with the North Dakota National Guard, ensuring alignment with military career expectations and post-secondary options. Our goal is to create a seamless transition for students considering military service while maintaining academic rigor and career readiness.

Overview of the Military Preparation Program

The Military Preparation Program consists of five courses with two required units (four courses) within an approved sequence designed to prepare students for success in military service. These courses provide foundational knowledge, skill-building, and real-world applications aligned with military expectations.

Course Sequence and Learning Outcomes:

- Introduction to Military Careers Provides an overview of military branches, career pathways, rank structures, and core responsibilities of service members.
 - What students gain: A foundational understanding of military culture, career options, and expectations to make informed decisions about service.
- **ASVAB Essentials: Skills for Military Success** (Prerequisite: Introduction to Military Careers) Strengthens skills in arithmetic reasoning, word knowledge, paragraph comprehension, and mechanical understanding to prepare students for the ASVAB exam.
 - What students gain: Improved test-taking strategies and subject-matter expertise to achieve qualifying ASVAB scores.
- Military Health & Fitness Covers physical fitness standards required for military service, including strength training, endurance exercises, and mental resilience.
 - What students gain: Physical conditioning, self-discipline, and resilience to meet or exceed military readiness standards.
- Career Foundations in Military Leadership (Prerequisite: ASVAB Essentials) Focuses on leadership principles, teamwork, and ethical decision-making in military contexts.
 - What students gain: Leadership, communication, and problem-solving skills essential for both military and civilian careers.
- **Military Leadership Capston**e (Prerequisite: Completion of three other Military Preparation Program courses) A culminating experience where students apply learned concepts through project-based activities, job shadowing, or mentorship with military personnel.
 - What students gain: Practical experience and networking opportunities to enhance career readiness.

This state-developed curriculum is unique—no comparable program currently exists in North Dakota. By embedding this coursework into our educational system, we are ensuring students gain exposure to military career options while developing essential leadership and workforce skills.

Current Implementation & Funding Request

- The first course in the program, Introduction to Military Careers, has already launched with 36 students enrolled—a strong indication of interest.
- NDCDE is seeking an appropriation to waive program costs for 100 students, ensuring equitable access for all North Dakota students interested in military careers.
- To date, we have \$192,000 allocated in our 25-27 budget for this initiative and have presented our budget request to the House.

Additionally, we are continuing to advocate for the North Dakota National Guard to secure the necessary Full-Time Equivalent (FTE) staff required to support program implementation effectively. This additional staffing is essential for ensuring long-term sustainability, student engagement, and program success.

Key Benefits & Addressing Common Questions


- 1. Why offer a scholarship if students already receive financial benefits from the Guard?
 - This program ensures that students who wish to pursue post-secondary education or military careers have flexible pathways available.
 - The scholarship removes financial barriers and encourages students to explore military careers with structured, high-quality coursework.
- 2. What recruitment strategies will be used to engage students?
 - Finalizing a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the North Dakota National Guard to align recruitment efforts.
 - Utilizing existing Guard outreach strategies to ensure seamless access for interested students.
 - Partnering with North Dakota schools and counselors to increase awareness of the program statewide.
- 3. How does this program align with broader education and workforce goals?
 - Military recruiters have identified "limited familiarity with the military in the general population" as a recruitment challenge—this program directly addresses that gap.
 - We have aligned program competencies with DPI and military standards, ensuring students gain relevant, applicable knowledge.
 - The curriculum supports workforce development by reinforcing leadership, discipline, and career planning—critical skills for military and civilian careers.

Conclusion

House Bill 1404 represents a critical investment in expanding educational and career opportunities for North Dakota students. By integrating the Military Preparation Program into the Choice Ready framework, we are equipping students with essential skills and knowledge while strengthening North Dakota's leadership in military career preparation.

We urge your support of this bill to ensure that students have access to high-quality, no-cost military education pathways, and that the program is adequately staffed for sustainable success.

- ASVAB Essentials; Skills for Military Success (1/2 credit, pre-req Introduction to Military Careers)
- Military Health & Fitness (1/2 credit)
- <u>Career Foundations in Military Leadership (1/2 credit,</u> pre-reg ASVAB Essentials)
- Military Leadership Capstone (1/2 credit, pre-req complete three other military pathway courses)

Under the Military Ready portion of the framework, students can demonstrate readiness by completing the following:

- Baseline Requirements:
 - ASVAB score of 31 or greater or military acceptance.
 - Quality citizenship with no expulsions or suspensions.
 - Physical fitness, evidenced by successful completion of PE courses (grade A, B, or C).
- Program-Specific Coursework: In addition to the baseline requirements, students would now have the option to complete two credits in the Military Pathway Program, which includes:
 - Introduction to Military Careers (0.5 credit)
 - ASVAB Essentials: Skills for Military Success (0.5 credit, prerequisite: Introduction to Military Careers)
 - Military Health & Fitness (0.5 credit)
 - Career Foundations in Military Leadership (0.5 credit, prerequisite: ASVAB Essentials)
 - Military Leadership Capstone (0.5 credit, prerequisite: three other Military Pathway courses)
- Additional Indicators Remain: Students can still meet Military Ready requirements by completing in lieu of pursuing the military pathway program:
 - Two or more credits in JROTC or Civil Air Patrol.
 - Two or more additional indicators from the Post-Secondary or Workforce pathways.

How many students can the program support?


The program is wellprepared to support up to 1,500 enrollments at no cost* to students or schools. Through strategic marketing and partnerships, we aim to fully subsidize this number.

Chair Beard and Members of the Committee: My name is Carter Gill and I am Vice President of Governmental Affairs for the North Dakota Student Association. I am here today in support of HB 1404.

The North Dakota Student Association is dedicated to ensuring that students have a voice at the table in policy that affects higher education. We consist of delegates from each of the 11 public North Dakota University System (NDUS) institutions, meeting monthly to engage students in discussions about North Dakota higher education policy. Since 1969, our mission has been to empower students, create collaboration between the student bodies of the North Dakota public universities, and to provide a student perspective on higher education policy.

This academic year, the NDSA passed NDSA-01-2425: A Resolution in Support of the NDSA's Legislative Priorities for the 25-27 Biennium, wherein one of our priorities is "Incentivizing students to attend NDUS institutions by increasing the affordability of the NDUS through supporting scholarships and grants comparable to others in the region and to workforce needs." Expanding the eligibility for students to qualify for the North Dakota Scholarship is a great way for prospective students to be able to access higher education and incentivize students to stay in North Dakota to earn their degree to enter the North Dakota workforce.

Personally, as a recipient, the North Dakota scholarship assisted my family and me with affording North Dakota's higher education.

The NDSA supports the bill as is and asks that this committee gives HB 1404 a DO PASS recommendation.
