Good morning, Chairman Beltz and members of the House Agriculture Committee. I am Lukas Wagner, the Pesticide and Fertilizer Division Director here on behalf of Agriculture Commissioner Doug Goehring. I am here today in support of HB 1551 which is related to bio stimulants and beneficial substances.

The bill would create a new chapter in 4.1 of the North Dakota Century Code relating to the registration and regulation of beneficial substances. It would define beneficial substances and provide labeling standards that will allow the commissioner to regulate these products. This would help meet industry standards and identify product labeling guidelines. Similar changes to law are occurring in other states.

The term does not include a primary, secondary, or microplant nutrient or pesticides, demonstrated by scientific research to be beneficial to one or more species of plants, soil, or media.
- 13 2. "Brand" means a term, designation, trademark, product name, or other specific
   14 designation under which an individual beneficial substance is offered for sale.
- 15 <u>3.</u> "Bulk" means products in nonpackaged form.
- 4. "Distribute" means to import, consign, manufacture, produce, compound, mix, or blend

   substances in the state.

## Inspection, sampling, and analysis.

- 1. The commissioner may act through an authorized agent to sample, inspect, make analyses of, and test beneficial substances distributed within the state when it is necessary to determine if a beneficial substance complies within the provisions of this chapter. The commissioner may enter into or upon any point of distribution during operating hours upon notice and open and sample any bulk material, bundle, package, or other container containing or thought to contain a beneficial substance, and to inspect labels or access records pertaining to the distribution of the beneficial substance.
- The methods of analysis and sampling must be methods approved by the
   commissioner, including methods adopted by the journal of the association of
   agricultural chemists international.
- 3. A single package may constitute an official sample. In determining whether a fertilizer, fertilizer material, micronutrient, specialty fertilizer, soil amendment, or plant amendment beneficial substance is deficient, the commissioner may consider only the analysis of the official sample.
- 4. If the results of the commissioner's official analysis indicate a fertilizer, fertilizer material, micronutrient, specialty fertilizer, soil amendment, or plant amendment beneficial substance may be the subject of a penalty or other legal action, the commissioner shall forward the analysis to the registrant at least ten days before the report is submitted to the purchaser. If during the ten-day period, no adequate evidence to the contrary is made available to the commissioner by the registrant, the report becomes official.
- The commissioner shall retain an official sample found to be deficient for thirty days
   following the issuance of the analytical report.
- Upon request, the commissioner shall furnish to the registrant a portion of a sample found to be the subject of a penalty or other legal action.

Good morning, Chairman Luick and members of Senate Agriculture and Veteran Affairs Committee. I am Lukas Wagner, the Pesticide and Fertilizer Division Director here on behalf of Agriculture Commissioner Doug Goehring. I am here today in support of HB 1551, as amended, which is related to bio stimulants and beneficial substances.

The bill would create a new chapter in 4.1 of the North Dakota Century Code relating to the registration and regulation of beneficial substances. It would define beneficial substances and provide labeling standards that will allow the commissioner to regulate these products. This would help meet industry standards and identify product labeling guidelines. Similar changes to law are occurring in other states.

Chairman Luick and committee members, thank you for your consideration of HB 1551, as amended. I would be happy to answer any questions you may have.
