WHEREAS, the extraction of critical minerals and rare earth elements from this state's lignite coal seams and associated deposits offers the state an opportunity to diversify its economy, create high-value careers, and establish itself as a leader in this emerging sector; and WHEREAS, value-added uses of lignite coal, such as activated carbon, synthetic graphite, critical mineral and rare earth element extraction, and advanced materials, demonstrate the versatility and economic potential of coal as a resource that extends beyond power generation; and WHEREAS, responsible development of these resources can be achieved by ensuring environmental stewardship, protecting freshwater supplies, and supporting land reclamation practices that align with prior land use and productivity; and

WHEREAS, the development and deployment of lignite coal technologies create economic diversification, expand market opportunities, and ensure the long-term sustainability of coal as a critical resource for North Dakota; and
