TESTIMONY OF

Aaron Carranza, Division Director, Regulatory Division

Chairman Patten, and members of the Senate Energy and Natural Resources committee, I am Aaron Carranza the Regulatory Division Director of the Department of Water Resources. I'm here today to provide testimony in support of SB 2044.

This bill is an effort by the Department of Water Resources (Department) to enhance and optimize services provided.

Currently, the question of whether a Watercourse (N.D.C.C. § 61-01-06(1)) is constituted may be asked of the Department of Water Resources by any water resource district. Water resource districts may also perform this analysis independently of the Department. Typically, the Department's workload and the prioritization of active permitting requests results in an extended processing time for the requests that come into the Department directly.

This bill proposes transitioning the Department from the primary request and determination role into an appeal remedy for any aggrieved party by a state or state political subdivision's watercourse determination. In addition, the new language makes clear the administrative appeal remedy for any Department decision resulting from the proposed appeal.

North Dakota Administrative Code ch. 89-15-01 outlines the process and considerations that would guide any watercourse determination in the state. The Department also created the attached graphic to help with understanding the determination process.





Aaron Carranza, Division Director, Regulatory Division

Chairman Porter, and members of the House Energy and Natural Resources committee, I am Aaron Carranza, Regulatory Division Director of the Department of Water Resources. I'm here today to provide testimony in support of SB 2044.

This bill is one of the red tape reduction efforts being pursued by the Department of Water Resources (Department) this session and seeks to amend the current process under North Dakota Century Code (N.D.C.C.) § 61-01-06(1) relating to "watercourse determinations."

Currently, the question of whether a watercourse is constituted may be asked of the Department by any water resource district. Water resource districts may also perform a watercourse determination independently of the Department.

When the Department is requested to perform a watercourse determination, the Department's workload and the prioritization of active permitting requests, ahead of watercourse determinations, results in an extended processing time for the watercourse determination requests.

This bill proposes transitioning the Department from the primary request and determination role into an appeal remedy for any party aggrieved by a state or state political subdivision's watercourse determination. In addition, the new language makes clear the administrative appeal remedy for any Department decision resulting from the proposed appeal of a Department decision.

The Department recently developed North Dakota Administrative Code ch. 89-15-01 to outline the process and considerations that would guide any watercourse determination in the state. The Department also created the attached graphic to help with understanding the determination process.




