3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

SECTION 1. AMENDMENT. Section 50-24.4-29 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

50-24.4-29. Geropsychiatric facilities.

The department may select one or more skilled nursing homesfacilities within the state to operate a unit that exclusively provides geropsychiatric services. Admission to one of the skilled nursing homesfacilities that exclusively provides geropsychiatric services for the purpose of individuals receiving geropsychiatric services may be granted only after the state hospital has performed an evaluation of the individual being admitted which department indicates the individual, over the age of twenty one, is in need of nursing home geropsychiatric services the skilled nursing facility determines the individual meets the criteria for skilled nursing, and needs psychiatric behavioral health services. Admissions from the state hospital will be given first priority for admission to the units. If at any time the department determines that the number of approved geropsychiatric units that provide geropsychiatric services in the state is insufficient to meet the needs, the department may select a geropsychiatric unitadditional units based on the experience, qualification, and capacity of the skilled nursing homesfacilities that propose to provide geropsychiatric services. The state hospital may not offer geropsychiatric services through a unit set up exclusively to provide those services.



Chairman Lee, and members of the Human Services Committee, I am Pamela Sagness with the Department of Health and Human Services, Behavioral Health Division. I appear before you in support of Senate Bill No. 2081, which was introduced at the request of the Department.

The proposed changes in this Bill amend 50-24.4-29 regarding geropsychiatric facilities to align the language to current process. Current language requires the North Dakota State Hospital to have performed an evaluation of the individual being admitted to a geropsychiatric facility. Removing this language allows for avoidance of unnecessary evaluations by the North Dakota State Hospital. The proposed process aligns to improved patient care as an individual may transfer directly if already evaluated by another provider.

On lines 16-17 the Department requests to remove the language that prohibits the North Dakota State Hospital from offering "geropsychiatric services through a unit set up exclusively to provide these services". Although not currently planned, removing this section allows the Department to be responsive to future needs if there is not adequate service available in the private sector.

Earlier this week we met with the Long Term Care Association and would like to offer an amendment to clarify that admissions from the North Dakota State Hospital will be given first priority but that the Department does not generally oversee admission.



In 2024, 15.86% of North Dakotans were age 65 and over. According to the World Health Organization, 1 in 6 individuals in the world will be age 60 and over, forecasting a significant increase in need for long-term care options to adequately care for the aging population. Approximately 14.6% of the older population has a mental health condition. Due to additional medical conditions related with aging and additional risk factors, geropsychiatric facilities are a necessary component in the continuum of care to adequately serve this population.

Chairman Ruby, and members of the Human Services Committee, I am Pamela Sagness with the Department of Health and Human Services, Behavioral Health Division. I appear before you in support of Engrossed Senate Bill No. 2081, which was introduced at the request of the Department to amend ND Century Code 50-24.4-29 regarding Geropsychiatric Facilities.

The proposed changes in this Bill align the language to current process. Current language (lines 10-12) requires the North Dakota State Hospital to perform an evaluation of the individual being admitted to a geropsychiatric facility. Removing this language allows for avoidance of unnecessary evaluations by the North Dakota State Hospital. The proposed process (lines 12-14) aligns to improved patient care as an individual may transfer directly to a geropsychiatric facility if evaluated by a qualified provider.

The Department worked with the Long-Term Care Association on the language identified in lines 14-15 to clarify that admissions from the State Hospital will be given first priority.

On lines 19-20 the Department requests to remove the language that prohibits the State Hospital from offering "geropsychiatric services through a unit set up exclusively to provide these services". Although not currently planned, removing this section allows the Department to be responsive to future needs if there is not adequate service available in the private sector.

In 2024, 15.86% of North Dakotans were age 65 and over. According to the World Health Organization, 1 in 6 individuals in the world will be age 60 and over, forecasting a significant increase in need for long-term care options to adequately care for the aging population. Approximately 14.6% of this population has a mental health condition. House Human Services Senate Bill 2081

Testimony of Denise Harvey, Protection & Advocacy Program Director March 5, 2025

Chairman Ruby and members of the House Human Services. I am Denise Harvey, Director of Program Services for Protection & Advocacy (P&A). P&A is an independent state agency established in 1977 to assert and advance the human, civil, and legal rights of people with disabilities. The agency's programs and services seek to make positive changes for people with disabilities where we live, learn, work and play.

Protection & Advocacy opposes this bill. It is respectfully recommended that prior to any admissions to a unit that provides geropsychiatric services in a nursing home, consultation should be made with an agency such as a Center for Independent Living or another advocacy organization to determine eligibility for home and community-based services. For individuals with brain injury, consultation should be made with staff that work with home and community-based services/residential habilitation regarding options. Individuals, family members and agencies should be aware of the full continuum of care prior to considering nursing home placement for individuals. Input from the individual and the specific types of services available to meet needs should be considered during this process.

P&A opposes the bill language which allows for the department to expand the number of geropsychiatric units in skilled nursing homes at any time. This would increase the reliance on institutional care vs. home and community-based services. P&A recommends that home and

community-based services be built up in a robust manner to increase the number of persons living in the least restrictive environment in the community. At a minimum, language must be added to this bill which identifies a moratorium limiting the number of geropsychiatric units. Additional options should continue to be explored, to ensure that persons are in the most integrated settings possible in the community and for the state of ND to be in compliance with the Olmstead decision.

In addition, consultations should be made regarding the use of Assistive Technology (AT). AT is an option that maintains independence for persons with disabilities, including those with mental illness. AT can assist with needs to include medication management, wandering, mobility aids and the use of personal emergency response systems. AT can assist individuals to address issues related to their mental illness to include blocking or managing auditory hallucinations, calming, monitoring symptoms and identifying coping strategies.

There are individuals in our state who are eligible for care in a geropsychiatric unit at a nursing home level care but were able to obtain home and community-based services which has allowed them to successfully live independently with the needed support. An example is an individual that was in a nursing home prior to placement in a state institution and was not accepted at any nursing homes over a period due to symptoms related to a mental illness. With no other options available, a placement was sought out in an apartment setting with home and community-based services. It was found that the individual did not require nursing home care, and she was able to live successfully in an apartment. Another example is an individual at a state institution with mental illness and a brain injury with a history of numerous placements in nursing homes. Persons working with the individual were open to residential habilitation services which offers up to 24-hour care in a home setting for individuals with brain injury. This person successfully transitioned into an apartment setting, for the first time in close to a decade living successfully in the community.
