Good afternoon, Chairman Beard and Education Committee

For the record Senator Don Schaible, District 31, here to introduce SB 2149. This bill is to create an opportunity for schools on our Air Force Bases to take advantage of low interest school construction loans just like the rest of our school districts. There are differences in our current law that prevents Air Base school construction from participating in our current low interest loan fund for most of the money for construction does not come from property tax and must be voted on by the residence of the district. My understanding of school building on bases funded mostly by federal dollars is requested and approved by a priority list by the Air Force. It was not many years ago, the Air Force did a needs study of all the schools on Air Force Bases and created a priority list for school building needs. If selected for the school building is approved at an 80% Federal and a 20% local match, our state's AFBs would need to come up with the 20% match. Since our AFB's don't have property tax to leverage, the only money they would be available would be the in-lieu of money that we freed up a few sessions ago which would not be enough to cover the 20% requirement.

Both of our bases are on the higher end of the list, and it is very likely that Grand Forks AFB may be selected very soon. The problem that this creates is that there is a local contribution of 20% that would put a financial burden on the Air Force base school. The intent of this bill is to make a 2% loan available to our Air Force Bases when they are selected from the priority list. That way, when approved, they could proceed with construction and spread the local portion of that cost over a period of 20 years just like the rest of our schools.

Now let's walk through the bill. The added language in Sec 1 Sub Sec 3-page 1 line 16 exempts Air Force Bases from this language and adds language in Sub Sec 4 line 8-17 on page 2, the working conditions of this loan. The language in Sub Sec 6 creates the timeline for the loan. Sub Sec 6 clarifies that the Superintendent of Public Instruction reviews the loan applications. Sub Sec 7, Letter C set the loan amount of up to \$20 million. The deleted language on page 3 lines 27 through page 4 lines 8 is the removal of language that is obsolete because of language changes of last session. The deleted language, pg 3 lines 27 through pg 4 line 8 is obsolete language that is no longer needed.




My name is Terry Brenner, and I am the Superintendent of Grand Forks Public School District #1 and Grand Forks Air Force Base School District #140.

Grand Forks Public School District #1 has a unique relationship with the Grand Forks Air Force Base School District #140 through a Joint Powers Agreement to provide educational services to the students of the Grand Forks Air Force Base since the construction of the installation. Although the Grand Forks Public School District provides educational services, capital construction is the responsibility of the Grand Forks Air Force Base School District. The Grand Forks Air Force Base School District does not have the financial capacity to build without access to low-interest financing.

Our students are a part of families who live, work, and learn in communities across the world. When they come to Grand Forks Air Force Base, they encounter a 1961 building with deferred maintenance challenges (a story known to schools across our state). While other schools in the state have access to the school construction assistance revolving loan fund, which provides low-interest financing, the Grand Forks Air Force Base school does not. SB 2149 will extend the same low-financing support to our military families to modernize their schools.

This request is timely as the Grand Forks Air Force Base School District was recently invited to participate in a cost-sharing arrangement with the Department of Defense to replace the Twining Elementary and Middle School building. Under this arrangement, the federal government will cover 80% of the project's cost. The Grand Forks Air Force Base School District must consider financing the 20% match, and as a small school district, having access to the low-interest revolving loan fund will ensure a viable 30-year option to accommodate current and future missions.

As the Grand Forks Air Force Base School District is poised for this opportunity, Minot Air Force Base School District is also approaching eligibility. While Grand Forks AFB is #70 on this list, Minot is #90 and may receive the same invite to the program in a few years. Including schools on military installations within this federal program ensures equity and support for all North Dakota students, including those in military families.

The Grand Forks Air Force Base is poised for significant growth, with new missions and opportunities on the horizon. A critical component of supporting this growth is ensuring robust educational facilities for the families stationed there. The replacement of the Twining Elementary and Middle School building will enhance the educational experience for these families and reflect North Dakota's commitment to serving military communities.
