Chairman Patten, members of the committee, on behalf of the Energy & Environmental Research Center (EERC) we appreciate this opportunity to offer comments regarding Senate Bill 2188. The EERC is a leading developer of cleaner, more efficient energy and environmental technologies to address critical energy challenges. Since its inception in 2021, the Clean Sustainable Energy Authority (CSEA) has played an important role in our shared goal of developing technological advancements and deploying innovative energy projects in the State of North Dakota.


As of 2022, North Dakota was 8th in total energy production, producing 4.114 quads of energy – over 4 trillion BTUs. The state has the 3rd highest per capita GDP in the nation and has the 8th lowest retail electric prices. The success we have enjoyed in powering our state, region, and nation is a testament to the legislature's forward thinking and investment in energy research and development. The establishment of the CSEA provided important assistance to move projects past the development pathway and to commercialization, where North Dakotans can realize the benefits of jobs, energy production, and tax revenues.

The EERC has leveraged competitive funding through the CSEA to advance many important initiatives for North Dakota's energy industry. CSEA funds have supported the development of a front-end engineering and design study for postcombustion carbon capture at the Coal Creek Station, North Dakota's single largest electric generation plant, as well as work to expand the Dickinson renewable fuels refinery through sustainable aviation fuel. The CSEA has supported proposals from other technology developers to expand and improve North Dakota's energy industries such as green pig iron, long-duration energy storage for lithium-ion batteries, a largescale gas-to-liquids plant, commercial deployment of carbon capture and sequestration from a North Dakota ethanol facility, and many value-added energy projects. The funding allocated by Senate Bill 2188 will allow the CSEA to continue advancing new technologies that will enhance the production of clean sustainable energy and maximize North Dakota's energy resources and the benefits they provide to all North Dakotans.

In short, the CSEA has been instrumental to the success of our energy industries, and will continue to play a critical role going forward. Thank you again for the opportunity to offer comments, and we appreciate the sponsors of this legislation for their continued support of the CSEA.

SECTION 3. AMENDMENT. Section 54-63.1-07 is amended and reenacted as follows:

54-63.1-07. Clean sustainable energy fund – Continuing appropriation – Line of credit – Loans – Repayments.

- 1. There is created in the state treasury the clean sustainable energy fund. The fund consists of all moneys transferred to the fund by the legislative assembly; loan proceeds; interest upon moneys in the fund; principal and interest payments to the fund; and donations, grants, and other contributions received by the commission for deposit in the fund. All moneys in the fund are appropriated to the commission on a continuing basis to provide grants, loans, and other financial assistance and for administrative and operating costs of the authority and program pursuant to the provisions under this chapter.
- 2. Any bond proceeds deposited in the fund must be used for loans or loan guarantees. The Bank of North Dakota shall deposit in the fund all principal and interest paid on the loans made from the fund. The Bank may use a portion of the interest paid on the outstanding loans as a servicing fee to pay for administrative costs, not to exceed one-half of one percent of the amount of the interest payment. The fund must be audited annually pursuant to section 6-09-29, and the cost of the audit must be paid from the fund.
- 3. The Bank of North Dakota shall extend a line of credit to the industrial commission to support loans or loan guarantees issued from the clean sustainable energy fund. The line of credit may not exceed three hundred ninety million dollars, and the interest rate associated with the line of credit must be the prevailing interest rate charged to North Dakota governmental entities. The industrial commission shall repay the line of credit from moneys available in the clean sustainable energy fund derived from payments received on loans issued under this chapter or other sources. If the moneys available from the clean sustainable energy fund on June 30, 2025 June 30, 2029, are not sufficient to repay the line of credit, the industrial commission shall request from the legislative assembly a deficiency appropriation to repay the line of credit or the industrial commission may repay the line of credit from other funds, as appropriated by the legislative assembly.
- 4. The industrial commission may access the line of credit to the extent needed through June 30, 2025 June 30, 2029, to provide funding as authorized by the legislative assembly to support loans or loan guarantees issued from the clean sustainable energy fund. Any moneys borrowed from the Bank of North Dakota pursuant to this section must be transferred to the clean sustainable energy fund to support loans or loan guarantees.



CSE Process Flow For Project Review and Approval



BND Funding Legislature Funding & Repayment of CSEA

- The Legislature established the CSEA program and provided for a loan option administered by BND. By statue, the loans provide a fixed Interest Rate of 2% with a term determined by BND.
- As established, the Legislature is committed to repaying the Line of Credit to BND.
- The statue established a \$250m revolving loan fund that was increased to \$390M is the 2023 session.
- As opposed to cash, the legislature chose to utilize a line of credit from BND for initial funding. The CSEA revolving loan fund draws on the line of credit from BND when a borrower draws on the loan.

2021 Legislature Created CSEA in 54-63.1



- The CSEA Revolving Loan Fund replicates the structure of the IRLF and School Construction.
- The Legislature provides initial funding and then repayment of loans provides for the "revolving" component of the fund.
- In this instance, instead of cash into the fund the Legislature used a BND line to provide initial funding which is now repaid with cash.



The industrial commission shall repay the line of credit from moneys available in the clean sustainable energy fund derived from payments received on loans issued under this chapter or other sources. If the moneys available from the clean sustainable energy fund on June 30, 2025 June 30, 2029, are not sufficient to repay the line of credit, the industrial commission shall request from the legislative assembly a deficiency appropriation to repay the line of credit or the industrial commission may repay the line of credit from other funds, as appropriated by the legislative assembly.
- 4. The industrial commission may access the line of credit to the extent needed through June 30, 2025 June 30, 2029, to provide funding as authorized by the legislative assembly to support loans or loan guarantees issued from the clean sustainable energy fund. Any moneys borrowed from the Bank of North Dakota pursuant to this section must be transferred to the clean sustainable energy fund to support loans or loan guarantees.
