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TESTIMONY SUPPORTING SB 2218

John Arnold, Deputy Insurance Commissioner Senate Industry and Business Committee January 27, 2025

Good afternoon, Chairman Barta and members of the Committee. My name is John Arnold, I am the Deputy Insurance Commissioner, and I stand before you today in support for SB 2218.

To provide some context, the Insurance Commissioner's office allocates \$2.4 million biennially to the North Dakota Firefighters Association (NDFA) through the Insurance Regulatory Trust Fund, as outlined in section 18-03-07. These funds are crucial in helping the NDFA fulfill its important mission of strengthening the state's fire services. Specifically, the NDFA plays a key role in developing and implementing a statewide fire education and training plan. They coordinate training at all levels to ensure that firefighters across North Dakota receive consistent, high-quality education. In addition, the NDFA oversees the certification process for firefighter training, ensuring that professional standards are maintained, and that safety is prioritized throughout the state.

A critical component of the NDFA's ability to carry out these responsibilities is having the proper infrastructure. The funds provided by SB 2218 will enable the NDFA to secure a permanent facility, which will not only support their current operations but also allow for future expansion as needed.

Our office fully supports the allocation of these funds from the Strategic Investment and Improvements Fund or (SIIF) and would like to note that there will be no additional administrative burdens or complications in managing this one-time funding to help the NDFA acquire a new building and offset associated costs.

Chairman Barta and members of the Committee, I respectfully request your favorable consideration and a Do Pass recommendation for SB 2218 and your continued support of the fire service.

Chairman Barta and Senate Industry and Business Committee members, Good Afternoon. My name is Robert Knuth, and I am the Training Director of the North Dakota Firefighters' Association. I want to thank you for considering Senate Bill 2218.

The North Dakota Firefighters' Association (NDFA) is a 501(c)(3) organization. We are accredited by the National Professional Qualifications Board, also known as the ProBoard. Our training and certification programs meet nationally recognized standards developed by the National Fire Prevention Association or NFPA. NDFA was established in 1884 before North Dakota became a state. Throughout our existence, the association's mission has been to provide opportunities to train and certify firefighters in the state. In 2017, a legislative study was conducted to codify the duties and roles of the North Dakota Firefighters Association. As a result of this study, Section 18-03-01.1 of the North Dakota Century Code now reads:

The North Dakota Firefighter's Association shall:

- 1. Develop and adopt a statewide fire education and training plan;
- Coordinate fire service training at all levels;
- 3. Establish procedures to govern the certification process for firefighter training.

NDFA is a mobile training organization that provides instruction and certification testing to individual departments. Due to the size of the state, having one centralized training facility is not feasible. 96% of our firefighters are volunteers with full-time jobs in their communities. In many cases, taking time away from work to travel, staying overnight, and the cost of fuel, meals, and lodging prevent many firefighters from traveling to receive vital training. NDFA has utilized federal and state grants for training props and equipment that must be stored securely to make this training available statewide. Some of which are temperature sensitive. Our current facility does not have the space to store these assets under one roof, forcing us to lease additional storage space.

Before 1996, the NDFA ran their business in the home offices of the elected executive board members. In 1996, our first Director was hired, and we began leasing office space. Since that date, we have moved offices several times to accommodate our growing mission and storage requirements. Last year, we were notified by our landlord that our lease, which was entered into in 2017, would see a substantial increase in cost when our renewal date for our main office building came up. In discussions with him, we found our rent amount would increase by approximately \$46,400.00 annually. This discussion led to an opportunity for us to relocate to a new facility that he was purchasing. This would be a lease, with the option to buy anytime. As part of the lease agreement, our current lease amount will remain the same until June 1, 2025, without a penalty for leaving our current lease, which would save over \$185,000.00 over the remaining life of the lease. His benefit is that he can lease our current location to a new tenant at the current market rate.

We have developed a three-phase project for our new location. Once completed, NDFA would have one building large enough for all our administrative offices, Storage space for all our equipment, and space for meetings and classes available for the state's south-central region. Phase one is purchasing the property and the existing office building, which is large enough to house our current offices. Phase two is constructing an addition large enough to hold all our equipment and props and provide enough space to conduct hands-on training indoors, regardless of weather conditions. Phase three is refurbishing the first-floor offices into meeting and classroom spaces.

NDFA was initially funded through appropriation in 1893 and through dues collected by member departments. NDFA has continued to receive appropriate funds and collect dues to this day. Our current appropriated funding comes from the Insurance Regulatory Trust fund. This funding is for training and certification testing provided at zero cost to the individual fire departments, administrative costs of providing these services, salaries for our employees, and leases for our offices and storage facilities. Each year, we meet the requirements of our Century Code mandate. However, we have not been able to accumulate any capital to move forward with our plan for our building. To this point, the NDFA Executive Board has met with Pace Fundraising to create and manage a capital campaign to raise funding for the project. We are confident that this campaign will be successful. However, the timeline for accruing funds to move forward would exclude the opportunity for us to acquire the property and building at its current price.

SB 2218 will provide the NDFA with the funding to provide the 20% needed to enter into a mortgage and purchase the property. Once this 20% is received, the NDFA will be able to complete phase one of our project. I have attached our budget to this testimony. This budget shows our current appropriation, estimated dues coming in, a small lease amount we receive from the ND Fire Marshal's office, and an amount awarded through the WSI-STEP grant program, which we use to fund specific training. Unfortunately, we cannot use these grant funds for the building. Under the NDFA Office line, we have put the estimated annual cost of what we would be paying in a mortgage if both Phase One and Phase Two were complete, even though we know Phase Two will not be completed before the end of 2025. We set that amount to show we would have a positive balance at the end of December, which is the estimated funding availability from our capital campaign, according to Pace Fundraising. This shows our ability to maintain our current funding and justify our request for one-time funding.

I have also attached a breakdown of our current rent amounts, comparing them to the new lease amounts if we were to stay at our current location, our estimated payments with a mortgage after Phase 1 is completed along with the additional storage building, and our estimated mortgage payment after Phase 2 is completed.



TESTIMONY SUPPORTING SB 2218

Doug Nelson, State Fire Marshal House Political Subdivisions Committee March 13th, 2025

Good afternoon, Chairman Longmuir and members of the Committee. My name is Doug Nelson, I am the State Fire Marshal, and I stand before you today in support for SB 2218.

To provide some context, the Insurance Commissioner's office allocates \$2.4 million biennially to the North Dakota Firefighters Association (NDFA) through the Insurance Regulatory Trust Fund, as outlined in section 18-03-07. These funds are crucial in helping the NDFA fulfill its important mission of strengthening the state's fire services. Specifically, the NDFA plays a key role in developing and implementing a statewide fire education and training plan. They coordinate training at all levels to ensure that firefighters across North Dakota receive consistent, high-quality education. In addition, the NDFA oversees the certification process for firefighter training, ensuring that professional standards are maintained, and that safety is prioritized throughout the state.

A critical component of the NDFA's ability to carry out these responsibilities is having the proper infrastructure. The funds provided by SB 2218 will enable the NDFA to secure a permanent facility, which will not only support their current operations but also allow for future expansion as needed.

The Insurance Department along with the State Fire Marshal's Office fully supports the allocation of these funds from the Strategic Investment and Improvements Fund or (SIIF) and would like to note that there will be no additional administrative burdens or complications in managing this one-time funding to help the NDFA acquire a new building and offset associated costs.

Chairman Longmuir and members of the Committee, I respectfully request your favorable consideration and a Do Pass recommendation for SB 2218 and your continued support of the fire service.

Testimony on Senate Bill 2218

Chairman Longmuir and members of the Committee, Good Morning. I want to thank you for considering Senate Bill 2218.

NDFA was established in 1884 in the Dakota Territory. Throughout their existence, the association's mission has been to provide opportunities to train and certify firefighters in the state. In 2017, a legislative study was conducted to codify the duties and roles of the North Dakota Firefighters Association. Century Code now states:

The North Dakota Firefighter's Association shall:

- 1. Develop and adopt a statewide fire education and training plan.
- 2. Coordinate fire service training at all levels.
- 3. Establish procedures to govern the certification process for firefighter training.

Before 1996, the NDFA was very poor in hands on equipment but rich in knowledge, but it had no home base office for the DVD's, Videos Tapes, Slide Decks, Overhead projection gels and general library materials which had to reside where the current Sec/Treas lived. This became more and more compounded after hiring a director and the NDFA was able to obtain grants for Burn Trailers, Liquid Fuels simulators, Collapse Search and Rescue, Grain Bin Rescue and many other scenarios type simulators. Rest assured that list only touches part of the equipment the NDFA now owns and maintains. Other pieces are delicate technologies such as secure computers for testing candidates for Pro Board, Fire Fighter 1, Fire Fighter 2 and Hazmat. They also own state of the art mobile based simulator that allow a near real experience of Driving an emergency vehicle and Pump Panel operations that allow a safe real time experience without the danger of operating a real vehicle and possibly causing damage to apparatus that now easily costs \$1,000,000 to replace and or 10's of thousands to repair. Naturally a director needed staff to coordinate, instruct with, and maintain these simulators and other equipment. It was obvious the requirements of building they occupied would also change. Relocation was the only means to find a building that would fit. Obviously, the need for central location to maintain, house and repair this equipment is not in question. The equipment needs to be in top condition when delivered to the instructors so they can focus on the instruction and hands on of the training and not waste time trying to repair or make the simulators work.

With this investment as requested from SIIF the State of North Dakota would afford the NDFA the opportunity to acquire an actual piece of real property that they could build on and configure as they need, with the result being an investment vs. paying rent and having to move as the need changes. Having seen the multiple phases, the NDFA has planned on additions it is also fiscally sound and enables the NDFA to continue providing the training and expand as the need arises without having to relocate. To top it off they can make the payment at a lower cost then the rent and provide for more training with the saved dollars. That to me sounds like a very good investment to the state.

Thank you for your time and consideration, please pass SB 2218 so we can continue to train and support our Firefighters. I will stand for any questions you may have.

Chairman Longmuir and House Political Subdivisions Committee members, Good Morning. My name is Robert Knuth, and I am the Training Director of the North Dakota Firefighters' Association. I want to thank you for considering Senate Bill 2218.

The North Dakota Firefighters' Association (NDFA) is a 501(c)(3) organization. We are accredited by the National Professional Qualifications Board, also known as the ProBoard. Our training and certification programs meet nationally recognized standards developed by the National Fire Prevention Association or NFPA. NDFA was established in 1884 before North Dakota even became a state. Throughout our existence, the association's mission has been to provide opportunities to train and certify firefighters in the state. In 2017, a legislative study was conducted to codify the duties and roles of the North Dakota Firefighters Association. As a result of this study, Section 18-03-01.1 of the North Dakota Century Code now reads:

The North Dakota Firefighter's Association shall:

- 1. Develop and adopt a statewide fire education and training plan;
- 2. Coordinate fire service training at all levels;
- 3. Establish procedures to govern the certification process for firefighter training.

By Century code we are also required to conduct annual fire schools. This past February, our 71st annual State Fire School was held in Minot with over 900 individual firefighters, fire chiefs, and fire instructors attending. We also conduct Regional Fire Schools which rotate to different departments who open their doors to their regional mutual aid departments.

Due to the size of the state, having one centralized training facility is not feasible. NDFA is a mobile training organization that provides instruction and certification testing to individual departments at zero cost. Our current funding allows us to do this, so the individual departments do not have to spend their limited budget on necessary training. 96% of our firefighters are volunteers with full-time jobs in their communities. In many cases, taking time away from work to travel, staying overnight, and the cost of fuel, meals, and lodging prevent many firefighters from traveling to receive vital training. NDFA has utilized federal and state grants for training props and equipment that must be stored securely to make this training available statewide. Some of which are temperature sensitive. Our current facility does not have the space to store these assets under one roof, forcing us to lease additional storage space.

Before 1996, the NDFA ran their business in the home offices of the elected executive board members. In 1996, our first Director was hired, and we began leasing office space. Since that date, we have moved offices several times to accommodate our growing mission and storage requirements. Last year, we were notified by our landlord that our lease, which was entered into in 2017, would see a substantial increase in cost when our renewal date for our main office building came up. In discussions with him, we found our rent amount would increase by approximately \$46,400.00 annually. This discussion led to an opportunity for us to relocate to a new facility that he was purchasing. This would be a lease, with the option to buy anytime. As part of the lease agreement, our current lease amount will remain the same until June 1, 2025, without a penalty for

leaving our current lease, which would save over \$185,000.00 over the remaining life of the lease. The benefit to him is that he can lease our current location to a new tenant at the current market rate.

We have developed a three-phase project for our new location. Once completed, NDFA would have one building large enough for all our administrative offices, storage space for all our equipment, and space for meetings and classes available for the state's south-central region. Phase one is purchasing the property and the existing office building, which is large enough to house our current offices. Phase two is constructing an addition large enough to hold all our equipment and props and provide enough space to conduct hands-on training indoors, regardless of weather conditions. Phase three is refurbishing the first-floor offices into meeting and classroom spaces.

NDFA was initially funded through appropriation in 1893 and through dues collected by member departments. NDFA has continued to receive appropriate funds and collect dues to this day. Our current appropriated funding comes from the Insurance Regulatory Trust Fund. This funding is for training and certification testing provided, again, at zero cost to the individual fire departments, administrative costs of providing these services, salaries for our employees, and leases for our offices and storage facilities. Each year, we meet the requirements of our Century Code mandate. However, we have not been able to accumulate any capital to move forward with our plan for a permanent home. To this point, the NDFA Executive Board has met with Pace Fundraising to create and manage a capital campaign to raise funding for the project. We are confident that this campaign will be successful. However, the timeline for accruing funds to move forward would exclude the opportunity for us to acquire the property and building at its current price.

SB 2218 will provide the NDFA with the funding to provide the 20% needed to enter into a mortgage and purchase the property. Estimates right now show that our mortgage payment will be over \$1,000.00 less then what our lease amount would be monthly. Once this 20% is received, the NDFA will be able to complete phase one of our project. I have attached our budget to this testimony. This budget shows our current appropriation, estimated dues coming in, a small lease amount we receive from the ND Fire Marshal's office, and an amount awarded through the WSI-STEP grant program, which we use to fund specific training. Unfortunately, we cannot use these grant funds for the building. Under the NDFA Office line, we have put the estimated annual cost of what we would be paying in a mortgage if both Phase One and Phase Two were complete, even though we know Phase Two will not be completed before the end of 2025. This shows we would have a positive balance at the end of December, which is the estimated funding availability from our capital campaign, according to Pace Fundraising. This shows our ability to maintain our current funding and justify our request for one-time funding.

I have also attached a breakdown of our current rent amounts, comparing them to the new lease amounts if we were to stay at our current location, our estimated payments with a mortgage after Phase 1 is completed along with the additional storage building, and our estimated mortgage payment after Phase 2 is completed.
