#### 2025 SB 2221

#### Senate Workforce Development Committee Senator Mike Wobbema, Chairman January 31, 2025

Chairman Wobbema and members of the Senate Workforce Development Committee, I am Tim Blasl, President of the North Dakota Hospital Association (NDHA). I am here to testify in support of Senate Bill 2221. I ask that you give this bill a **Do Pass** recommendation.

This bill expands the qualifying criteria for the skilled workforce student loan repayment program. To be eligible to receive student loan repayment grants under the current program, an applicant must:

- 1) Have successfully completed an educational program from an institution of higher education;
- 2) Have a student loan with the Bank of North Dakota or other participating lender;
- Reside and work in North Dakota in an eligible high-demand or emerging occupation; and
- 4) Have met and continue to meet any requirements established in applicable state board of higher education procedures.

This bill would add that the third requirement is met if an applicant has completed a Master of Science degree in nursing while teaching four clinical credits per year and resides and works in the state in an occupation requiring the degree. Section two of the bill adds that a Master of Science degree in nursing, if the applicant teaches four clinical credits per calendar year, is a qualifying educational program for student loan repayment.

Hospitals support the bill because workforce is our number one challenge. We struggle to hire enough workers in almost all health care-related occupations, but nurses in particular are always in high demand. Anything we can do to encourage more people to go into nursing – and teach nursing – is beneficial. Expanding the list of those who qualify for student loan repayment as this bill does would be helpful to achieve that goal.

In summary, we support the bill and hope that you will give it a <b>Do Pass</b> recommendation.

Dear Chairman Ruby, Vice Chairman Frelich and the House Human Services Committee:

I am Melissa Moser, a resident of North Dakota and an Associate Professor at Lake Region State college. I am writing to request the inclusion of the Master of Nursing (MSN) degree in the Skilled Workforce Student Loan Forgiveness Program.

Nursing programs require instructors to hold a master's degree to ensure students receive high-quality education and training. This requirement is necessary for approval by the North Dakota Board of Nursing and other national nursing accrediting bodies. A master's degree provides nurse educators with the advanced knowledge and skills needed to teach complex nursing concepts and develop effective curricula. It also ensures they are up-to-date with the latest healthcare advancements, preparing students to meet the demands of the evolving healthcare environment. By maintaining high educational standards, nursing programs can produce competent graduates ready to provide excellent patient care and address the nursing shortage.

When I was hired in 2011 as a BSN, RN, I had to return to school to qualify for teaching at the college level. Since 2013, I have witnessed the critical need for qualified nurse educators firsthand. To effectively teach and support students in our nursing program, I completed my MSN in 2016. Unfortunately, I was not eligible for any loan forgiveness programs at that time, which placed a significant financial burden on my family and me.

#### 2025 SB 2221

Since then, I have pursued and completed a doctoral degree, entirely self-funded without any financial assistance from my employer or the state of North Dakota.

As a mentor for students in MSN programs specializing in nursing education, I have observed the financial struggles they face. Many of these students work full-time while pursuing their degrees, making them ineligible for traditional financial aid. This financial strain can be a significant barrier to completing their education and entering the field of nursing education. By including the Master of Nursing degree in the Skilled Workforce Student Loan Forgiveness Program, we can provide much-needed financial support to these dedicated individuals.

The shortage of nurse educators is a significant issue that impacts the entire healthcare system. According to the American Association of Colleges of Nursing (AACN), U.S. nursing schools turned away 65,766 qualified applicants in 2023 due to insufficient faculty, clinical sites, and other resources. The national nurse faculty vacancy rate is 7.8%, with most vacancies requiring or preferring a doctoral degree. Additionally, about one-third of the current nursing faculty workforce is expected to retire by 2025. This shortage limits the capacity of nursing programs and contributes to the broader nursing shortage.

By including the Master of Nursing degree in the Skilled Workforce Student Loan Forgiveness Program, we can encourage more nurses to pursue advanced degrees and careers in nursing education. This will help alleviate the faculty shortage and ensure that we can continue to educate and train the next generation of nurses.

Thank you for considering this important addition to the bill.

Chairman Ruby, Vice Chairman Frelich and the House Human Services Committee:

My name is Dr. Penny Briese, and I have been a registered nurse in North Dakota for more than 20 years. I am a certified healthcare simulationist and nurse educator at the University of Jamestown and the Director of Advocacy for the North Dakota Nurses Association (NDNA). Thank you for the opportunity to testify today in support of SB 2221.

As difficult as it has been to find qualified nurses to staff our hospitals, long-term care facilities and clinics here in North Dakota, it has been even more difficult to find and retain nurse educators to teach young people the art of nursing. The lack of nurse educators is a nationwide crisis, one that must be addressed if we are to sustain the workforce of our healthcare system. SB 2221 addresses North Dakota's pressing nursing shortage by integrating a master's program into the skilled workforce student loan repayment program. Quite often, it is merely the additional financial burden of pursuing a higher nursing degree that prevents nurses from returning to school, as they are often still paying student loans from obtaining their undergraduate nursing degree. This bill will encourage nurses to pursue master's level education by providing them with that essential financial assistance. These masters prepared nurses will be qualified to teach and, in return for financial assistance, will be required to work in North Dakota as an educator, teaching four clinical credits each year. The requirements of this bill will not only increase the pool of nurse educators but will also aid in the retention of our nursing workforce. Recipients of the financial assistance will also be required to live and work in North Dakota for a set period of time, hopefully becoming integrated in their communities and coming to love North Dakota as much as I do.

The NDNA is the sole professional organization representing all nurses in North Dakota and we are committed to implementing effective recruitment and retention strategies for our nursing workforce. This bill aligns with our mission: "to advance the nursing profession by promoting professional development and advocating for healthcare issues that impact both nurses and the public at large". SB 2221 supports this mission and would benefit nursing education by enabling nurses to pursue higher degrees, making them qualified to instruct and train new nurses right here in North Dakota.

I ask that you unanimously pass SB 2221 to ensure that North Dakota has enough nurse educators to train a more sustainable nursing workforce in our state. Thank you for your consideration of this matter.

My name is Julie Traynor. I am a nurse in ND and the Director of the Dakota Nursing Program Consortium. I am providing written testimony in support of Senate Bill 2221.

Over the past decade, I have found it increasingly more difficult to hire nursing faculty who are academically qualified to teach our students. A nursing faculty is required to have a master's degree or higher to teach in the classroom or to supervise RN students in the clinical area. Senate Bill 2221 will financially assist nurses to advance their degrees to become qualified to teach our nursing students. The bill adds a master's in nursing program to the skilled workforce student loan repayment program.

I have talked to many registered nurses with baccalaureate degrees who do not have the financial ability to fund a master's degree. There are many reasons, examples are: the nurse is the family's primary wage earner, they want to help fund their children's college educations, or they want to save for retirement. Tuition assistance provided by the skilled workforce student loan repayment program will make a difference in recruiting some of these nurses.

The Dakota Nursing Program partners and satellite locations are based in many rural areas where the nursing shortage is more intense than in urban areas. If we can get a few more nurse educators, we can educate more nurses. At one of our colleges, we have been trying to recruit a nurse educator for almost a year. This next fall, we may have to drop from two cohorts of students to one cohort of students for lack of faculty.

I ask for your support to pass SB 2221 to assist with growing a strong nursing workforce in North Dakota.

- SECTION 1. A new subsection to section 15-10-38.1 of the North Dakota Century Code is created and enacted as follows:
- The requirement under subdivision c of subsection 4 is met if an individual is enrolled in or has completed a master of science degree in nursing while teaching four clinical credits per year and resides and works in this state in an occupation requiring the degree.
  - **SECTION 2. AMENDMENT.** Subsection 4 of section 15-10-38.2 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:
    - 4. The state board of higher education and the workforce development council shall compile a list of qualifying educational programs annually. A qualifying educational program is:
  - a. Is a program resulting in attainment of an associate's degree or lower credential program that may be completed within four semesters, six quarters, or the final two years of a baccalaureate program. A qualifying educational program also must
