House Energy and Natural Resources Committee Testimony on SB 2309

North Dakota Game and Fish Department Bill Haase, Assistant Wildlife Division Chief February 6, 2025

Chairman Patten and members of the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee, my name is Bill Haase, and I serve as the Assistant Wildlife Division Chief for the North Dakota Game and Fish Department (Department). I appreciate the opportunity to testify today in support of SB 2309.

Expanding youth hunting opportunities is a top priority for the Department. In recent years, participation in the antlerless youth gun deer license has steadily increased. Currently, this opportunity is available to youth who turn 11, 12, or 13 in the year of the hunt and is limited to antlerless whitetail deer.

SB 2309 would provide the governor's proclamation with the flexibility to include antlerless mule deer in this season. This change would allow us to expand youth hunting opportunities in units where mule deer populations can support additional harvest.

For these reasons, the Department respectfully urges the committee to issue a "Do Pass" recommendation for SB 2309. Thank you for the opportunity to testify, and I am happy to answer any questions.

Testimony of Rita Goettle Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee 2-6-25

Chairman Patten and members of the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee. My name is Rita Goettle. I'm speaking today in favor of senate bill 2309.

I have been hunting for the past 2 years with a youth tag. Yet I still have not gotten my first deer. Why is that? Because I have only ever seen about 3 whitetails and they're either too far away for me to shoot or I'm just not in the right spot.

But where I hunt with my dad there are lots of mule deer. Like a lot!! And if I had a tag that allowed me to shoot a mullie, I would have gotten one my first year, and again this year. I've even had one lined up in my scope ready to shoot but just not able to pull the trigger. Multiple times! We were practicing of course so I would know what to do in case I saw a whitetail. But that never happened.

I have learned a lot in the youth hunt, and even saw my dad shoot a deer! A mullie deer, not a whitetail. He also shot buck this year, a mullie buck, not a whitetail buck. But I believe I could have learned more and had a better experience if I could have hunted mullie antlerless as well as whitetail antlerless.

Kurt Swenson, Beulah, ND District 33

Chairman Patten, Vice Chairman Kessel and members of the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee, my name is Kurt Swenson from Beulah. .

I am submitting this testimony in favor of SB 2309.

I have been perplexed over the years why the exceptional youth deer hunting season for youth ages 11, 12 and 13 was limited to whitetail deer only. Many of us live in areas that are dominated by mule deer or have sustainable huntable populations of mule deer and white-tail deer.

We open our land up for the youth deer hunting season every year, but were not able to offer the 11–13-year-olds an opportunity due to EHD decimating the whitetail population a few years back. Yet, we had excellent numbers of mule deer that could have been harvested by these youth, and the current statute denies them this opportunity. It also denies us as a landowner the ability to use this youth season to help manage the deer herd in our local area.

I respectfully ask you to vote DO PASS vote on SB 2309.

Good morning, Chairman Porter and members of the committee. For the record, Senator Justin Gerhardt serving District 34 in Mandan.

Today you have before you SB 2309. It's good to be here and I'm very excited to present this bill and ask that you give it a do pass so that we can increase the opportunities for youth to have successful and enjoyable hunting experiences in our great state.

SB 2309 is quite simple. Currently, youth ages 11, 12 & 13 in our state are entitled to a statewide antlerless whitetail deer tag. The intent of SB 2309 is to allow for the deer tag, or permit, to also include mule deer.

I've had wonderful opportunities to take three of my 4 kids out hunting for their first deer with the youth whitetail doe tag. We've made great memories and it's set that foundation for their continued interest in hunting. But throughout the past number of years, conversations with other friends of mine have often led to the question, "why whitetail only?" It even led me to call the game and fish department years ago and ask that very question, where the simple answer I was told was that only the legislature could make that sort of change. Looking back, I should have taken that further and contacted one of my legislators, but I didn't. You see, at that time, there were plenty of whitetail in the area, and making a legislative change seemed like something way out of anything I'd ever be able to accomplish. But here we are, years later, and a couple things have changed. The major change is Epizootic Hemorrhagic Disease (EHD) which most us of refer to as Blue Tongue, has taken a major major toll on the whitetail population in our area, and by area, I don't think it's incorrect to say, across thousands of square miles.

Four seasons ago, when I took my son on his first hunt, was right about the time EHD swept through the area southwest of Mandan where we typically hunt. He and I made it out one day that season and instead of coming home with a harvest, we came home with covid and crashed on the couch for the next week or two. In the next two hunting seasons we were unable to find an opportunity for him to make his first harvest. We traveled a hundred miles, one way, the opposite direction from where we typically hunt, to try to find some plots land and opportunity to bag his first deer, but with no success.

Now where we typically hunt, the mule deer have appeared to increase in numbers and increased their territory, I'd assume as they don't have to compete with the white tail that were

once there. We do come across a whitetail now and again, but most hunters are hesitant to shoot them, as we'd like to see their numbers recover.

So, with that, this bill, SB 2309 would give the game and fish department the ability to allow for any antlerless youth tags. It would also allow them to restrict those tags from being filled in units where they might be trying to protect the mule deer population. This was intended to mimic how the 14/15 year old "any" tag currently works, where the game and fish has a restricted tag for certain badlands units so as to best manage the herd in that area.

On a final note, my son was able to make his first deer harvest this past season. He shot a really nice mule buck that rivals some of the best of his mine. I've got pictures I'll proudly share.

Thank you Chairman Porter and committee members. I ask that you give SB 2309 a Do Pass. If you do have any questions for me, I'd be happy to try to answer them.
