

CARES Funding Results

DCS RECEIVED ADDITIONAL FEDERAL FUNDS FOR THE ESG AND CSBG PROGRAMS TO ASSIST WITH THE CHALLENGES OF THE PANDEMIC.

- CSBG received an additional \$4,209,178.50, and from these funds:
 - Community Action Agencies have assisted 4,984 low-income clients in 2020 and 2021. In 2022, all 7 CAA's successfully spent down their allocations.
 - An additional \$5,142,580 was received to provide support to the ESG grant.

Testimony for HCR 4001
Senate Appropriations Committee
January 15, 2025

Good afternoon, Chairman and members of the committee. My name is Ben Faul, and I serve as the CSBG (Community Services Block Grant) program administrator for the Division of Community Services within the Department of Commerce.

The CSBG program is a federal grant that provides funds to our communities through seven community action agencies. These agencies implement anti-poverty programs that aim to revitalize low-income communities and empower individuals and families to become self-sufficient. We receive funding from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services and distribute it to the agencies through a formula approved by the agencies themselves.

In 2022 and 2023, North Dakota's CSBG program supported 36,579 unduplicated individuals. This included:

- 2,537 people who obtained safe and affordable housing,
- 13,130 children (ages 0-17),
- 6,047 people with disabilities,
- 4,890 uninsured individuals, and
- 1,218 veterans through our SSVF (Supportive Services for Veteran Families)
 This was made possible by \$3.7 million in funding for 2023, an increase from \$3.6 million in 2022.

In addition, our agencies successfully closed out the CSBG CARES Act funds in 2022-2023, spending the remaining balances of the \$4.2 million granted in 2020. Numerous client testimonials shared how this funding helped families facing job loss, food insecurity, and caregiving challenges during a difficult time. Community action agencies stepped up to meet the needs of our most vulnerable residents, providing stability and relief

For 2024, CSBG funding increased to \$3.8 million. The total number of individuals served is still being compiled but will be included in our annual report, which will be released by the end of March 2025. I wanted to include a few testimonies from our agencies that detail impact the CSBG program has made:

 Ruby (alias). The Senior Companion and Representative Payee programs helped Ruby (alias), a vulnerable senior, regain financial stability and secure access to food, healthcare, and other basic needs after relocating to North Dakota with no local support.

- Sam (alias). The Helping Hands program assisted Sam, a cancer patient in rural North Dakota, with critical home improvements, including accessible steps and a ramp for safe entry to his home.
- A client facing eviction and financial strain due to a long commute received critical support through CAP. Gas vouchers, groceries, and vehicle repairs helped them maintain their living situation and meet basic needs. The client also applied for housing closer to Grand Forks to reduce commuting costs, demonstrating a commitment to long-term stability. This agencies' assistance played a vital role in stabilizing their situation and empowering them to build a more sustainable future.

As we move into 2025 and beyond, our agencies continue to respond to community needs. Our state association, CAPND, is leading the rollout of a rental assistance program, called HOME ARP, with full support from the state CSBG office. This program directly addresses the findings of our 2023 statewide needs assessment, which identified rental assistance as the top priority across all regions. While the program offers more resources, it targets a smaller, more focused group of individuals, providing goal-oriented, personalized support to help them transition into stable housing. This initiative will strengthen communities and enhance individuals' ability to achieve self-sufficiency.

Thank you for the opportunity to share this update on the CSBG program and its impact on North Dakota and its importance to our residents. I am happy to answer any questions the committee may have at this time.

SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 4001

LEGISLATIVE HEARING FOR FEDERAL BLOCK GRANTS

Mr. Chairman and members of the Senate Appropriations Committee, for the record my name is Levi Kinnischtzke and I am a fiscal analyst at the Legislative Council. I am here to present on **Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 4001**. I am neither for nor against the resolution, and am here only to provide information regarding the resolution.

In August 2024, the Legislative Council contacted state agencies that receive federal funds to determine which agencies receive block grants that require legislative hearings. The results, which were presented to the Legislative Management's Budget Section in September 2024, revealed that only one block grant required a public hearing to be held by the Legislative Assembly - the community services block grant administered by the Department of Commerce Division of Community Services.

The community services block grant provides funds for services and activities for the poor, particularly the elderly, homeless individuals, and migrants. Services include housing, health, nutritious food, and self-sufficiency.

The Department of Commerce anticipates receiving approximately \$7 million of federal funds through the community services block grant program during the 2025-27 biennium, the same as estimated to be received during the 2023-25 biennium.

Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 4001 authorizes the Budget Section of the Legislative Management to hold the required legislative hearings on state plans for the receipt and expenditure of new or revised block grants passed by Congress. This would run through September of 2027. This resolution is the same as what has been passed for at least the last 9 bienniums.
