POTENTIAL APPROACHES TO ENCOURAGE VOLUNTEERISM

The following table provides a summary of the feedback received from presenters at the August 20, 2025, meeting of the Emergency Response Services Committee in response to a request for ways to encourage volunteerism in the state.

Mr. Mike Sandy, Manager/Paramedic, Oakes Volunteer Ambulance Service	 Review the allocation method for state grants to promote grants to small ambulance services
	 Review the funding formulas related to how for-profit and nonprofits are funded through existing formulas
Mr. Chris Estes, Sheriff, Dickey County	Provide health insurance to volunteers
	 Help volunteers find housing through low-interest rate loan programs
	 Allow a volunteer who serves for 20 years or more to receive a retirement benefit
Mr. Charles Russell, Director, Division of Emergency Management, Dickey County	 Provide additional ways to recognize volunteers, similar to the existing approach of issuing red license plates to identify volunteers
	Provide health insurance to volunteers
Mr. Travis Bateman, Director, Badlands Search and Rescue	Provide health insurance or discounted insurance to volunteers
	Offer property tax incentives to volunteers
	 Provide mortgage assistance subsidies to help volunteers pay for housing
Mr. Dennis Goebel, Chief Executive Officer, Southwest Healthcare Services	 Allow volunteers to apply hours logged volunteering toward scholarships or advance health care career requirements
	 Create an atmosphere of comradery and positive culture for volunteers
	 Compensate volunteers for wages lost from a primary position while absent due to volunteer activities
Ms. Jessica West, Manager, Emergency Medical Services, Southwest Healthcare Services	 Create an informational program for the public to increase the public awareness of the benefits provided by emergency medical services (EMS) volunteers
	 Increase the availability of EMS-related training offered through career and technical education (CTE) in high schools
	 Designate EMS as an "essential function" similar to fire or law enforcement services
Mr. Mark Reinert, Board President, McVille Community Ambulance Services	Increase compensation available to EMS personnel
	Provide insurance coverage for EMS volunteers
Mr. Corey Johnson, Assistant Chief, Williston Fire Department	Raise funds to support public safety through a dedicated sales tax
	 Offer counseling services to law enforcement, fire, and EMS personnel
	• Create a permanent interim Emergency Response Services Committee in statute

Presenter	Ways to Encourage Volunteerism
Mr. Brian Paulson, Vice President, North Dakota Fire Chief's Association	Establish an executive branch committee focused on bolstering EMS services and volunteerism and allow the Governor to appoint relevant stakeholders
	Increase insurance reimbursement rates
	Educate the public on benefits provided by EMS personnel
	Provide affordable emergency medical technician training, including CTE at the high school level
	Provide a pension to volunteers based on length of service
	• Increase the amount available to levy for fire service districts from 5 mills to 7 or 10 mills and increase the maximum mill rate from 13 to 15 mills
	Develop leadership materials to help guide fire districts on responsibilities and duties
	Compensate fire department leadership personnel and volunteers for the time spent training, responding to calls, and administrative duties
