

## ADMINISTRATIVE FUNCTIONS FOR STATE CHILDREN'S HEALTH INSURANCE PROGRAMS

Information compiled by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS), formerly known as the Health Care Financing Administration, indicates that all states perform some administrative functions for the children's health insurance program (CHIP) at the state level. Administrative functions include distributing applications, determining eligibility, calculating bills and cost sharing, and gathering and analyzing data. One state uses local social services agencies to determine eligibility and eight states use a third party, such as a nonprofit entity, to perform eligibility or other administrative functions. The data compiled by the CMS is shown in the table below.

<sup>1</sup> **Alabama** - The Alabama Department of Public Health contracts with the State Employees Insurance Board and independent contractors to perform eligibility determinations, enrollment functions, and premium collections.  
<sup>2</sup> **California** - The California Managed Risk Medical Insurance Board oversees the state's CHIP. Administrative functions are performed on a contract basis through a private vendor.  
<sup>3</sup> **Colorado** - The Colorado Department of Health Care Policy and Financing administers the state's CHIP and subcontracts with a private foundation for some administrative functions.  
<sup>4</sup> **Connecticut** - The Connecticut State Medicaid Agency contracts with the Connecticut Children's Medical Center and the Yale New Haven Children's Hospital for administration of the state's CHIP for children with special needs.  
<sup>5</sup> **Florida** - The state's CHIP is administered by the legislatively created Florida Healthy Kids Corporation, a not-for-profit organization supervised by a board of directors chaired by the Insurance Commissioner.  
<sup>6</sup> **Iowa** - The state's non-Medicaid CHIP is administered by a third party contracted with by the Iowa Department of Human Services.  
<sup>7</sup> **Michigan** - Michigan uses a private contractor to administer the state CHIP; however, final eligibility determination is made by state agency staff.  
<sup>8</sup> **Mississippi** - The Mississippi CHIP is administered by a state board; an outreach contractor supports and augments the state outreach activities.  
<sup>9</sup> **North Carolina** - The state CHIP is administered by the state Department of Health and Human Services; local departments of social services make eligibility determinations.
